From the Pastor's Desk

To All Who Long For His Appearance,

There is a story of a Scottish fishing vessel returning home after many days at sea. As they neared the shore, the sailors gazed eagerly toward the dock where a group of their loved ones had gathered. The skipper looked through his binoculars and identified some of them: *"I see Bill's Mary, and there is Tom's Margaret and David's Anne."* One man became concerned because his wife was not there. Later, he left the boat with a heavy heart and hurried up the hill to his cottage. As he opened the door, she ran to meet him, saying, *"I have been waiting for you!"* He replied with a gently rebuke, *"Yes, but the other men's wives were WATCHING for them."*

Sunday, December 2nd begins the Season of Advent as well as the commencement of the Church New Year. Advent is marked by a spirit of expectation, of anticipation, of preparation, of longing. In all of God's people exists a yearning for deliverance from the evils of the world. This is reflected through the cries of the Israelite slaves in Egypt as they out from their bitter oppression. It is the cry of those who have experienced the tyranny of injustice in a world under the curse of sin, and yet who have hope of deliverance by a God who has heard the cries of oppressed slaves and brought deliverance!

It is that hope which brings the people of God the anticipation of a King who will rule over them with truth and justice and righteousness. It is that hope that once anticipated, and now anticipates anew, the reign of the Anointed One, the Messiah, who will bring peace and justice and righteousness to this fallen world.

Part of the expectation also anticipates a judgment on sin and a calling of the world to accountability before God. We long for God to come and set the world right! Yet, as the prophet Amos warned, the expectation of a coming judgment at the *"Day of the Lord"* may not be the day of light that we might want, because the penetrating light of God's judgment on sin will shine just as brightly on God's people.

The season of Advent has come to be celebrated more in terms of expectation or anticipation. Yet, the anticipation of the Coming of the Messiah throughout the Old Testament and Judaism was not in connection with remembrance of sins. Rather, it was in the context of oppression and injustice, the longing for redemption, not from personal guilt and sin but from the systemic evil of the world expressed in evil empires and tyrants. It is in that sense that all creation groans for its redemption as we witness the evil that so dominates our world (Rom 8:18-25).

Of course, there is the problem of longing for vindication from an evil world when we are contributors to that evil. This is the power of the images of Amos when he warns about longing for the "*Day of the Lord*" that will really be a day of darkness (Amos 5:18-20). Still, even with Amos' warning the time of Advent is one of expectation and anticipation, a longing for God's actions to restore all things and vindicate the righteous. This is why during Advent Christians also anticipate the Second Coming as a twin theme of the season. So for the Christian who longs for the return of Jesus it is a time filled with a joyous sense of expectancy as we await the return of King Jesus.

I find it of great interest that the church New Year correlates with the first Sunday of Advent. The year begins with great jubilation as it focuses on the Messiah's arrival in Advent which then slowly fades into somber reflection which focuses on what we have done to the very one whose arrival we have so eagerly anticipated, on Good Friday. And through that reflection we can finally be ready to hear the Good News of the Gospel on Resurrection Sunday! So there is great profit in following the church year from that perspective!

So, we celebrate with gladness the great promise in the Advent, yet knowing that there is also a serious tone as the theme of threat is added to the theme of promise. This is reflected in some of the Scripture readings for Advent, in which there is a strong prophetic tone of accountability and judgment on sin. But this is also faithful to the role of the Coming King who comes to redeem and rule over His people, and finally implement judgment upon this sinful world.

Because of the dual themes of threat and promise, Advent is a time of preparation that is marked by prayer. Advent's prayers are prayers of humble devotion and commitment, prayers of submission, prayers for deliverance, prayers from those walking in darkness awaiting and anticipating the arrival of the Great Light (Isa 9)!

The spirit of Advent is expressed well in the parable of the bridesmaids who are anxiously awaiting the coming of the Bridegroom (Matt 25:1-13). There is profound joy at the Bridegroom's expected coming. And yet a warning of the need for preparation echoes through the parable. But even then, the prayer of Advent is still:

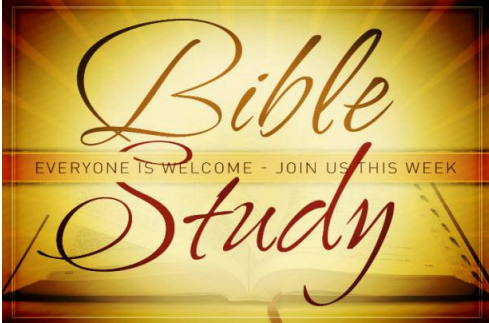
Come, O Come, Immanuel,
