From the Pastor's Desk

Greetings in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ,

"In the city of Pasadena, California a man was waiting for an appointment. He had just finished working at Pasadena's famous Rose Garden. At the appointment, someone commented: 'I know where you were. You were in the Rose Garden. The perfume of the roses has stayed with you.' The sweetness of the aroma of Christ remains upon those who fellowship with His body (the Church)."

In our society, there is a misnomer when the word church is used in that many of us envision a building in our mind's eye. A building is a structure with a roof and walls standing more or less permanently in one place, such as a house or factory. Yet in Ephesians 5:25 Paul says, "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave Himself up for her...."

Are we to believe that Paul suggests that Jesus died for some permanent structure, such as a house or a factory? I believe we see the absurdity in such an assumption. No, Jesus died for His people, those who make up the Church.

Theologically speaking there are three facets of the Church: The first is the visible church which is composed of all who profess faith in Jesus and their children; the second is the invisible Church which is comprised of those who genuinely belong to Jesus; finally there exists the Church Triumphant, which is made up of all who, throughout their life, fought the good fight, finished the race set before them and kept the faith. They have received the crown of righteousness that awaits all who die in the faith (2 Timothy 4:7-8)

Just as our bodies are comprised of many cells working together to reproduce and persevere for the purpose of our survival, the church is made up of individuals working together to reproduce and persevere right here in the life of Immanuel Union Church. Therefore, we are not meant to live the Christian life in a vacuum. We are meant to find support, fellowship, and the opportunity to serve in health of the fellowshipping community that Jesus has placed us at IUC. That is why the writer of Hebrews exhorts us each of us in this way: "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another"

We need each other on a daily basis. Not just weekly or seasonally. I feel that those who neglect the Sunday assembly of the fellowshipping body are not only neglecting their own body, but the entire Body as well. The church gets cheated out of the blessings that are offered through their attendance, i.e.. "The spurring of one another on toward love and good deeds..."

From the Pastor's Desk (con't)

I realize that for us who live in the North, summer comes as a long sought after reward for braving the effects of the cold winters. It's easy to fall victim to a mentality which justifies the neglect of Sunday morning Worship for seemingly more important rewards, such as the beach, the mountains, or even the backyard pool and grill. But there is nothing more important than the Worship of the Living God! We should enjoy the beautiful summer days that God appoints to us as a gift, but let's not neglect the giver of the gift of our recreation.

In Deuteronomy 8 before bringing the Old Testament Church into the Promised Land, God through the Moses, warns them of falling into a similar form of neglect.

For example in verse 10 Moses warns, ¹⁰ When you have eaten and are satisfied, praise the LORD your God for the good land he has given you. ¹¹ Be careful that you do not forget the LORD your God, failing to observe his commands, his laws and his decrees that I am giving you this day. ¹² Otherwise, when you eat and are satisfied, when you build fine houses and settle down, ¹³ and when your herds and flocks grow large and your silver and gold increase and all you have is multiplied, ¹⁴ then your heart will become proud and you will forget the LORD your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery...

¹⁷ You may say to yourself, "My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me." ¹⁸ But remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth, and so confirms his covenant, which he swore to your ancestors, as it is today.


With this in mind, I will leave you with this story: Long, long ago in a village of crafty and careful peasants, the village Chief arranged a great community Celebration. He prepared a great Oak Keg and told each family to pour their best wine from a wineskin into the Keg. He said that if each one supplied him with their best, there would be sufficient amounts for all, and of the best quality. One crafty peasant thought: "if everyone else puts in their best wine, no one will notice if I just pour in water. Let the others put in their best wine. My little bit won't be missed." Finally on the day of the Celebration, the Oak Keg was tapped, and only water poured out. Everyone thought that their contribution was so small that it wouldn't be missed. And so there was nothing at all.

Remember **YOU** are the Church, not the building, and as such you are missed! You are a necessary entity in our worship experience (*But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be.* (1 Cor. 12:18).
