

# From the Pastor's Desk

To All Who Long For Heaven,

A pastor was on his deathbed in a coma when he suddenly opened his eyes and said to his daughter, "I see heaven." She said, "Tell me about it." To which he replied, "All I can tell you is my sermons never did it justice. I saw your mother. I saw Jesus. It was all so beautiful."

A pastor who had been faithful preaching God's word all of his life couldn't describe heaven with any human accuracy. This means as hard as I try my any attempt I may peruse in projecting a glimpse of heaven fall far short in describing its true grandeur.

In our travels, Leslie and I have had many opportunities to stand in awe of God's creation. But as magnificent as these are, these are nothing compared to what awaits us on the other side. I remember hearing a preacher speaking about Jesus' words in John 14:2, 3 where He said: In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? 3 And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also.

The preacher went on to say If this earth really took six days to create and an accurate year of Jesus' ascension is 33AD this means He's been preparing heaven for 1,983 years. Therefore, living in this world is like living in a garbage can in comparison.

Yes, God is able to do more than we can ask or think! What a wonderful promise to think about as we begin a new day, a new week, a new month, or a new year. The fact that God is able to do anything and everything should give us hope for the future. We need to constantly remind ourselves that His power is *not* limited.

"According to His power" is an enormous statement. Think about that. What do we know happened according to His power? The world was brought into existence. said, "Let there be light," and appeared. He created the heavens. Adam and Eve became flesh and blood. Christ rose from the dead!

What a sight that will be! It will be greater than we can hope or imagine. So don't miss out. The ticket for getting there comes in trusting Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior.

# From the Pastor's Desk (con't)

Paul in 1 Thessalonians 4 exhorts us to live by this hope. Beginning with vs 13 **But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers, about those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope.**For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep. For this we declare to you by a word from the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

So in spirit of these words I exhort you with the words of Paul in 2 Corinthians 5:17 *Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.*


### **Attention All Men!!**

n 2018, the Neighbors in Need special mission offering and grant pool committee examined the ways in which it could spotlight, the UCC identity and missional initiative: 3 Great Loves campaign, LOVE OF NEIGHBOR. Emmaus United Church of Christ, in Vienna, Virginia, applied and received a \$3,500 NIN grant to aid them to work for justice within their community. They partnered with VOICE (Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement) in hopes of a securing the outcome they desired.

Emmaus UCC senior pastor, Rev. Kristen McBrayer shares, "In 2018 we set out to listen to our neighbors. We learned that the greatest concerns in our schools this year are student support for mental health counselors as well as the retention of 'good teachers'. From these listening sessions and meetings with key leaders, we set forth an agenda to increase the funding for mental health counselors so that students have a 250:1 ratio. This ratio is the minimum needed to provide basic support for our students. Retaining our best teachers is key to the suc-

cess of our school system. Increasing teacher pay is essential to this goal."

Additionally, Rev. McBrayer reports, "In October, 1,300 people from our VOICE institutions met with Virginia's Governor and Attorney General to ask for their support on our agenda. Among those present were more than 600 students, parents, and teachers concerned about our schools. The Governor continues to work with VOICE on funding for mental health and good teacher pay and we believe the ground work we did in 2018 has set the stage for some big wins for our students in the 2019 budget cycle and general assembly."

As people of faith, we are encouraged to advocate for all those who are marginalized by institutional systems as well as individuals. Being able to use one's voice, even at the ballot box, is a key to fulfilling that biblical missional mandate. We are proud to have been a partner with Emmaus UCC as they embarked to make a difference in their community to aid their neighbors in need.
