### More being revealed

As the summer leaves fall, a member reflects on the change that comes with sunshine

STEP SIX: Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

We recently started to go through a change of season, from fall into winter, and of course this means that I have had to put my shorts and sandals away for another year. It is a sad time. Or is it? Our Steps say that it isn't. How is that possible? I'm very fortunate to be able to have some time in the morning to guietly ease into the day. While having my coffee, I can look out into our yard and the woods behind our house. This fall I've been watching the leaves fall with some sadness at first, but then I realized that as they fell, I was able to see more of the woods being revealed as the green curtain changed to brown and then finally fell; allowing me to see into the depth of the woods and see some of the trees that had been hidden from view. Not all of the leaves fall; some manage to hang on long past their use. Sound familiar? Don't we hang on to things long past their use? One of the trees is a really beautiful and very tall holly. When it first appeared, I couldn't see any of the berries that usually cover it. It dawned on me that the reason I couldn't see them was because they hadn't turned their usual bright red. There is a good explanation for that; they had been living in the shade from all the other trees. Once the leaves began to fall, the sun was able to find its way through and shine directly on the berries, and they began to ripen. There is a purpose for these berries; once they have ripened they will become important winter food for the migrating birds. Soon there will be hundreds of birds in this tree for days feasting on the delicious fruit (delicious to them that is) for the necessary energy to continue their journey.

Isn't that what we have to do, bring our character traits into the sunlight so that God, with our willingness and cooperation, removes the ones that are no longer of any value to us? Some of these may be covering up the traits within us that God had intended us to use in the first place. Just like the berries, there are things about us that have value and have been covered by others so the sun couldn't shine through.

How does this happen for us? First we must identify all of our character traits, both good and not so good with the aid of another person, and find those things about us that have been the underlying cause of our troubles. This process is critical for us to go through. As I was warned very early in my recovery, and it motivated me to continue the process, "the same person will drink again." Fortunately I had a good sponsor who was able to guide me with his experience and encouraged me to continue the process. He also encouraged me to listen and learn from the experience of others. He told me that I could find the information I needed by attending Step meetings on a regular basis, and I've been doing that ever since.

This isn't all that we have to do, because like the holly tree, our character traits are still in the shade, and of course we are still hanging on to them. There is some

thing else that we have to do; we have to become "entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character." We can't do this by ourselves. Haven't we tried this before and failed before? Some of us have tried to stop doing harmful things over and over and still failed. "There was always one more attempt—and one more failure." We thought we were failures, but we weren't; we just hadn't discovered that we can't do this task alone.

Maybe we should learn from nature and learn to let go, as hard as it is to do. Unlike the trees, we have help available to us; we don't have to "do it myself." There are two Steps that we can take that will relieve us of those things that have driven us to drink. Step Six asks us a question. Can we live without these (defects) today? Unlike the tree, our calendar is one day, while the tree's is 365. We can do almost anything for one day, but 365? If we can answer yes, then as in Step Seven, we can ask God to "remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows."


Did you notice that part of our request includes a daily plan? Our job is to be useful, just like the tree. Once the berries have ripened, it provides necessary food for the birds. Once our defects have been removed (for today), our remaining qualities allow us to be useful and to be productive contributors to our community. We shouldn't be too excited about the word remove; it doesn't mean obliterate. These defects have a habit of sneaking back into our lives when we least expect them. Just like the leaves, they will reappear in the spring and the cycle will start all over again. Lucky for us, our cycle is only 24 hours.

You might ask yourself, Why go through all this trouble? There is a clue that our cofounder, Bill W., gave us and it can be found in the "Twelve and Twelve": "It is a spiritual axiom that every time we are disturbed, no matter what the cause, there is something wrong with us." How is this a clue? The word is disturbed. The trick is to remain undisturbed. If we can do that, then there is nothing for booze to fix. The process is learning how to let go of those things that cause the disturbance in the first place.

Just like the trees, if we can let go of those things that are covering our true nature, then we can continue to be useful members of our community and the world around us. Isn't that just what we wanted all along?







- 6. And, to act upon any suggestions be any group, through its representatives, that would be of potential benefit to our area groups.
