PSK31:

Possibly the hottest mode in amateur radio today.

Are you looking for an inexpensive way to further your enjoyment of your amateur radio hobby? Then you might want to look at PSK31 (*An acronym for Phase Shift Keying, 31 Hz wide*). This has to be the hottest mode to hit amateur radio in quite some time.

Peter Martinez (G3PLX), the father of AMTOR, developed PSK31 from an original idea by SP9VRC. He wanted to bring back the excitement to keyboard-to-keyboard conversation. PSK31 is a digital mode that only uses a sliver of band width and offers terrific performance even under weak-signal conditions." Some hams experimenting with PSK31 state it outperforms all other amateur modes for weak-signal work...including CW! You can literally communicate with stations you cannot even hear. This mode is not new. It has been around for a few years but didn't become popular until Martinez developed free software that works with a PC sound card. Suddenly it is the most popular mode since SSB! There is no requirement for synchronization or handshaking like the TOR modes so roundtable discussions and nets can be held on the same frequency. PSK31 requires a PC capable of running a 16 bit sound card, a stable radio that tunes in 1 Hz increments, computer software, and a few parts for the connection between the radio and the computer: two shielded cables, two resistors, and suitable connectors. Software is available for download at <http://www.psk31.com>. Additional information about interfacing the radio to your computer, information about the PSK31, and links to even more information is also available at this site. Be sure to check out this site. If you do not have Internet access, you can contact me and I will help you get the software and any information you may need.

There have been some questions about whether hams are permitted to use PSK31. The answer is "YES". The FCC amended Section 97.309(a) in 1995 (order DA95-2106) in response to an ARRL inquiry, "to clarify that amateur stations may use any digital code that has its technical characteristics publicly documented." (Thanks: ARRL Letter Online February 12, 1999.)

If you haven't tried the digital modes yet, don't hesitate to check this one out. You will not be disappointed.

License Restructuring

The FCC announced a new license structuring for Amateur Radio! I still admire those Hams that have had their licenses for many years and who worked very hard to obtain their licenses. I know how hard they sweated and worked. I do believe that the new license structure will benefit the hobby, and help to keep all the frequencies we currently enjoy. And yes, like you, I wonder how hard the job will be to keep our frequencies clean. I just know that many of us will have to set good examples to those Hams new to the hobby.

Many of you already know the information I am going to include here, but I thought those that have not seen the information on the license restructuring would enjoy having this. Please forgive me if you already have this information.

The operating privileges of the license held will not change. So, if an Advanced Class license is currently held, those Advanced Class privileges will not change. If you are a Technician and would like to upgrade to General, you can take the 5 wpm code test and the General Class written exam now, then apply for a General Class upgrade on or after April 15, 2000. The same holds true for those upgrading from Advanced to Extra Class, by taking the Extra Class written exam now, then applying for the upgrade on or after April 15. To upgrade from General to Extra, both the Advanced and Extra written exams must be taken. Those holding a Technician Plus license obtained before March 31, 1987, after completing the paperwork on or after April 15, will be advanced to General Class. Anyone testing on or after April 15, 2000 will obtain one of three license classes (Technician, General, or Extra), depending


on which tests are taken.

Please remember, if you test now, then submit your Certificate of Successful Completed Examination (CSCE) on or after April 15, you will still have to pay the normal VE session fee (\$6.65) when you submit your paperwork for the upgrade.

As everyone understands at this time, the tests will become harder on April 15. If you can, try to make one of the testing sessions offered in your area. There will be sessions each month at various locations in Spokane, Coeur d' Alene, Colville, Sandpoint, Pendleton, and Walla Walla. For more information about testing sites, contact any of our net control operators for additional information.
