## EASTER

"Easter" comes from an old English word related to dawn and shining. At Easter we stand in light of the Resurrection to see a new creation, transformed by the grace and glory of God. We celebrate the presence and power of the risen Christ in his Church, proclaiming his good news through Word and Sacrament. We rejoice in the gift of the Holy Spirit, who is the "Lord and giver of life." In the fullest sense, Easter is a new way of life.

The Resurrection of the Lord is the center of the Christian year. The good news shared this day and every Sunday is the very heart of the gospel. Easter is something like the keystone of an arch—the top and center stone upon which all the others lean and depend—in terms of both its theological significance and its relation to other festivals and seasons.

The date for Easter changes from year to year as it is calculated in relation to the phases of the moon. Since the Council of Nicaea in 325, Western Christians have celebrated Christ's resurrection on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the spring equinox (March 21), occasionally shifting the date to the following week to avoid coinciding with the Jewish Passover. This elaborate computation means Easter may take place as early as March 22 or as late as April 25. Eastern Christians use a different set of astronomical tables based on the Julian calendar, not the Gregorian; thus, the Catholic/ Protestant and Orthodox celebrations of Eater typically occur on different Sundays.

As with Christmas, Easter refers not only to a single day, but to a season of celebration in the Christian year. The season of Easter spans fifty days between the Resurrection of the Lord and the Day of Pentecost. The seven weeks of Easter make up a "week of weeks" (seven times seven); a symbol in time of the fullness and abundance of God's grace. In ancient practice, fasting and kneeling were forbidden during the weeks of Easter. In this most joy-full season, we celebrate the great mystery of our faith: that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. May you faith-fully experience this joy this Easter season!

Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"... When it was
evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house were locked
for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you."

After he said this, he showed them his hands

and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit."

John 20.18a, 19-22

To the Saints of Community Presbyterian Church engaged in God's mission, greetings; According to John's witness in the Gospel bearing his name, Mary Magdalene was first at the tomb on the Sunday morning following Jesus' Friday crucifixion. Noticing that the tomb was no longer sealed by the stone, she went and found Peter and the other disciple (the one whom Jesus loved) and declared that "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Perhaps she suspects grave robbery. Peter and the other disciple head out running for the tomb, both eventually noting the remains of the wrappings that had embraced Jesus' body in death, while not yet fully understanding the transformation that was taking place.

Mary Magdalene returns to the tomb, encountering two "angels" inside and a solitary man outside. She persists with her question regarding the missing body. The man calls her by name and Mary Magdalene recognizes the voice. "Rabboni!" she exclaims. Jesus instructs her to go to the disciples and share her experience. While doing so, they are joined behind locked doors by Jesus, who offers them the blessing

of shalom—of peace and wellbeing—in the midst of their fear. He "breathed on them" bestowing the gift of the Holy Spirit, the same action as the fulfillment of the creation of humankind in Genesis The act symbolized the new, spiritual life of the re-created community, the Easter community that is known as Christians. This is the ongoing gift of Easter: you and I are equipped by the Spirit to witness with word and ways how Jesus' resurrection means life re-created.

Thank you for your witness to God's mission in the person of Jesus through the passion and purpose of the Holy Spirit and for your witness to God's Way in the world as you love God and neighbor and yourself, and for your presence in the Community Presbyterian Church.

ONE OF THE BLESSINGS OF EASTER: ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING
One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) began in 1946 when Episcopal Bishop Henry Knox
Sherill sought to raise \$1 million in relief for persons ravaged by World War II. In 1947
Presbyterians joined the effort as did many other denominations in 1949. On March 26,
1949, at 10 PM major networks broadcast "One Great Hour", featuring President
Truman, musicians, and actors. A request was made of listeners to make a sacrificial
offering to their own places of worship the next morning. Some 75,000 churches
participated.

OGHS is one of four designated offerings—and the largest—of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Its purpose remains the same: to collect an offering for those in need. Around the world, millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity. Funds collected through the PCUSA OGHS offering go towards Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) (32%), Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP) (36%), and Self-Development Of People (SDOP) (32%). These mission units of the PCUSA all work to serve individuals and communities in need, providing safety, sustenance, and hope.

PDA is the emergency and refugee program of the PCUSA. Nationally, the Emotional and Spiritual Care Ministry helps strengthen leaders to care for their communities supporting recovery from wildfires, tornadoes, flooding, hurricanes and storms. Internationally, PDA projects provide support for socially ostracized communities around the globe.

PHP takes action to alleviate hunger, care for creation, and the systemic causes of poverty so all may be fed, and in 2021 gave 80 grants totaling nearly \$1 million supporting these issues in 23 countries, including the United States.

**SDOP** works with low-income communities to overcome oppression and injustice within the United States and the world.
