#### STRATEGY INSPIRED BY HOPE AND THE HOLY SPIRIT

You may have heard the classic line, "Hope is not a Strategy." With that in mind, your church session met Jan. 19 to begin developing a strategy for our congregation to "Survive And Thrive."

Also knowing that a strategy conceived without hope as an inspiration is lifeless and potentially doomed, the group was indeed fueled by hope for the future and focused on your church's Mission to Love Our Neighbors.

You may have seen the white expo boards in the fellowship hall leading into the church sanctuary. Those are the notes we took as we brainstormed goals for the church for the coming year and beyond. They turned out to be specific, measurable, attainable, relevant and time bound.

Our strategy building path started from within, then looked outward. We examined attainable objectives to goals at church services, fellowship events, etc., then looked for ways to take that "spirit" and use it to Love Our Neighbors and collaborating with neighboring congregations, organizations and individuals.

#### WITHIN THE CHURCH

This portion of the strategy begins with reinforcing the fact we are open for worship, welcoming and reconnecting with people who have left this congregation over the past several years and/or have not been able to attend due to COVID.

Calls are being made being to connect with folks and update Membership/Friends lists.

Re-establishing fellowship events which are social outlets and revitalize members, friends, and neighbors will get increased attention in the coming year.

Your involvement in church services is encouraged. During the past two years with COVID and more recently after the passing of our dear Pastor Anderson, we have had to limit the number of folks participating in conducting our services. The time has come to reinvigorate our participation - so you will see signup sheets for ushers, coffee hour set up, greeters, and communion set up.

When visitors come through our church doors, we want to have people enthusiastically and warmly greet them and help them feel welcome and at home. Encouraging folks to sign our visitor book, including their addresses, will enable us to follow up with a card. We are looking into the potential of providing visitors with a "Peace Candle" as a symbol of our love for them as our "neighbors."

#### OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Speaking of candles, we don't want to hide ours under a bushel, no! We are going to let it shine!

An effort is under way to make our church services available on Zoom/YouTube – not to replace the in-person experience, but rather to make the services available to those of you who are away from the Northwoods for the winter, or have moved to warmer climes, or closer to family, but still want to stay in touch with LdF CPC. A recorded service also enables those who have been unable to attend *temporarily*, for myriad reasons, to tune in and worship.

# <u>Caritas</u>

Asking for our prayers, volunteer time and financial support to continue its work serving our neighbors, Caritas Chairman Dick Bruesehoff visited Community Presbyterian Church (CPC) to share Caritas' mission.

In recognition of the important service **Caritas** provides, CPC presented Mr. Bruesehoff a Missions check for \$2,000.00.

Due to limited time and a lengthy annual meeting agenda that day, Mr. Bruesehoff did not share many examples of how **Caritas** cares for clients. Please read the attached **Caritas Impact Statement** to learn some of the ways **Caritas** supported our community July through December of 2021:

## Caritas Impact Statement. July - December 2021

As many individuals, families, and organizations have had to do during the pandemic, Caritas also has adapted, changed, and been flexible. Thanks to an amazing group of volunteers and dedicated donors, Caritas has been able to continue to support our community in many ways during the second half of 2021. We have continued to operate on site with a limited number of volunteers, but also assist clients by phone as needed.

Housing was a big need in the second half of 2021. We assisted 15 clients with rent and paid for hotel rooms for several individuals facing temporary homelessness.

Transportation remained an issue. 11 clients were assisted with car repairs, and three car payments were made. Vehicle plates or registration was paid for four individuals, and two clients got needed oil changes. A car insurance payment was made for one client.

Help with utilities continues to be a big need. Ten clients received help paying electric bills. We also assisted several clients to establish payment plans, making catching up easier. Propane tanks were filled for two clients. One client asked us to help her pay for a long overdue furnace check, and two additional clients needed help paying water and sewer bills. One garbage bill was paid, as well as a new holding tank pump, and water pump repair.

Groceries, Save More gift cards, and personal products were provided to several clients, and referrals were made to the food pantry. Household items, furniture and a refrigerator were provided to three families, thanks in part to a new collaborative agreement with Restore in Rhinelander. A similar agreement is in the works for the thrift shop in Saint Germain.

Clothes were needed by several families and the St. Matthias Thrift Shop was there for some. One family who needed winter wear for four children was provided with these items from Walmart. Christmas presents for kids were a source of concern for four families, and Caritas stepped in to help. One medical bill was paid.

School helpers - nurses and counselors - are often in the position to see unmet needs in school-age children, and often provide help with their own money. This year Caritas provided gift cards to school helpers at the three area elementary schools and Lakeland Union High School. These gifts were met with so much joy and gratitude. In addition to financial aid, many clients were also referred to other area agencies, and we are grateful for their support. Some clients, more than anything, needed to be heard - to tell their story to someone who would listen and offer kindness and caring. So at the end of another successful and gratifying year, we once again express our sincere thanks to our wonderful volunteers, generous donors, and amazing sister organizations. It is truly a gift to be able to do this work.

The ATTIC Resale Shop has been a tremendous means for members and friends of LdF CPC to stay involved and love our neighbors. People have continued to donate items, organize goods for sale, staff the shop during business hours and connect with our neighbors. Pam Fraboni and crew got the ATTIC reopened this past year and with generous donations from the Anderson family and folks throughout the area, significant funds were provided to our Missions effort. Income (100 percent) from the ATTIC was turned back around to helping neighbors through a variety of organizations. (see Jan. Newsletter). This part of our church strategy must continue.

What else can we do to love our neighbors? Our 2022 strategy will include looking at ways to develop more ties to our LdF tribal community. Here are some of the ways: offer use of the church building, develop a youth connection (i.e. homework club), alcohol and drug use support, and Deacons fund help and outreach. The session will be working with members of the congregation and tribal leaders to see what we can do as a neighbor by meeting expressed needs.
