A Love Letter To The Saints of Community Presbyterian Church

When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offense at me."

Matthew 11.2-6

To the Saints of Community Presbyterian Church engaged in God's mission, greetings;

This comes from the Gospel reading for Sunday, December 11th this year. In the season of Advent, the first two Sundays look forward to the end of time. On the third Sunday, the focus shifts to John the Baptist, the one whom Christian tradition witnesses to as the "new Elijah", who was to appear before the Messiah. Matthew shares this dialogue as a part of this witness, as John, imprisoned and not yet beheaded, wonders about who Jesus is.

The text reflects Matthew's influence and how it was crafted after Jesus' resurrection. John inquires as to whether Jesus is the Messiah (or Christ: the anointed one), a term that would not have been used for Jesus during his earthly life. Matthew is clear in his narrative how he understands Jesus to be the Messiah because of how persons' lives have been transformed physically: emphasizing Jesus as a healer; and spiritually: with "good news" brought to the poor (in Matthew this term refers equally to persons who are "poor of spirit"). Have you wondered how John received Jesus' reply?

As we make our way towards the annual celebration of Jesus' birth, the one whose life, death and resurrection would result in his acclamation as the Messiah/Christ (Hebrew and Greek terms, respectively) of God, what kind of "anointed one" are you expecting/desiring? What do you want/need Jesus to be, and how does that fit with Jesus' self-revelation to his cousin (per Luke) John? I recognize it's challenging given how we know how the story turns out. Yet the question is still important and useful: "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another", the question reflecting our own hopes, the answer, Jesus' self-understanding.

Thank you for your witness to God's mission in the person of Jesus through the passion and purpose of the Holy Spirit and for your witness to God's Way in the world as you love God and neighbor and yourself, and for your presence in the Community Presbyterian Church.

The Season Of Christmas

CPC Missions Report (December 2022)

Your Missions committee is committed to working with the CPC congregation to use our collective time, talents and treasures to serve God. The committee is charged by the Session with distributing the "treasure" earned by Attic volunteers who share their own time and talents to make the Attic so successful.

Our first round of "treasure" was used to support:

- -Caritas (serves Vilas/Oneida Counties clients with urgent financial need/referrals)
- -Scholarships for the local Girls on the Run chapter and two LdF college students
- -Presbyterian disaster Relief Fund to aid Ukrainian refugees. (For a total of \$4,000.00)

In August the committee sent financial support to:

- -Additional scholarships to students going on to trade professions
- -Food pantries in Arborvitae and Boulder Junction
- -Frederick Place (provides temporary, emergency housing to our homeless neighbors)
- -Pastime Club (adult day care program housed at Ascension Lutheran in Minocqua-offering programming for people with dementia)
- -Headwaters, Inc. (non-profit community based agency serving people with special needs) (For a total of \$3,500.00)
