Wednesday, May 31st marks the opening day of the Attic for the 2023 season! The hours of operation are 10am-2pm Wednesdays and Saturdays through the Summer. Pam Fraboni has managed The Attic for the past three years and she and a host of volunteers have been busy preparing the building and the displays for another busy Summer season.

Befitting the name of the church that hosts this missional outreach, The Attic is a community effort. Over a dozen volunteers contribute not only their time and energy towards sorting, cleaning, and pricing goods, they are also asked for their input on decisions regarding merchandise, pricing, and displaying. It is truly a co-munnity effort, a collective effort on the part of the persons who assist the operation.

The Attic has a history dating back to the early 1940's and while not always located on the church's property, it has continually witnessed to providing the community with resale goods at great prices, returning the proceeds to the community through financial support of individuals and organizations within Lac du Flambeau, Vilas County, and surrounding communities. In 2022 the money given back to the community totaled \$15,000.00!

The Attic depends on the goodwill of word of mouth, free advertising in print and on-line, and return customers. With everything from antiques to augers for drilling holes in ice on the local lakes (it was the

closest to a-z in the merchandise!), from creative artwork to deer antlers, and tools to toys, The Attic has something for nearly any and everyone.

The Attic is not only a community effort, it is also a gathering place for the larger community of the Lakes Region of north-central Wisconsin. Neighbors meet neighbors and donated goods find new places and spaces. New persons are always welcome whether as customers or to volunteer to help facilitate this marvelous missional offering of the Community Presbyterian Church of Lac du Flambeau!









Love Letter To The Saints of Community Presbyterian Church

In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the water. Then God said, "Let there be light, and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness God called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

Genesis 1.1-5

To the Saints of Community Presbyterian Church engaged in God's mission, greetings;

The familiar text above introduces the first of two creation stories in Genesis. The first is 1.1-2.4a, the second 2.4b-25. Each story has a different nuance in Hebrew, and the creation of the humans reversed, last in the first story and first in the second story. The rabbis who edited the Jewish Scriptures put them back-to-back, which makes for interesting reflection. The opening phrase of this first story can also be translated "In the beginning, when God began to create...". Your Bible may have a footnote sharing this. Another question to ask this story is did God create "ex-nihilo" (out of nothing) or did God create by being organizing the chaos that existed. The text has been explained both ways and there is division in the "creation camps" when it comes to interpretation. That aside, how does the phrase "when God began to create" strike your eye and your ear?

Either translation is acceptable based on the original Hebrew. The one we are most familiar with suggests that creation was begun and completed. The second one suggests that creation was begun and continues. I believe the second translation can be most helpful to us in understanding how God works as well as helping us affirm that creation is/was not a one and done. It reminds me of how we are cocreators with God through acts of childbirth and respecting the environment, among other co-creating activities. The second also gives me the hope that God is not yet done with this world, and/or with us as co-creators. It's Summer, and as we all know in the northland. Summer is short. May it be a creative season for you and those whom you love and are loved by!

Thank you for your witness to God's mission in the person of Jesus through the passion and purpose of the Holy Spirit and for your witness to God's Way in the world as you love God and neighbor and yourself, and for your presence in the Community Presbyterian Church.

SESSION NOTES FROM May 25, 2023

Present: Pastor Timm High, moderator, Kathy LaBarge, Jill Consie, Mary Jane Stevens, Ralph Kerler, Tom Gelwicks, Pearl Jonkman Hujet, Owen Karlmann and Steve Schunk.

Excused: Glenn Morrison.

After determining a quorum Pastor Timm High called the meeting to order at 10.00 with a prayer.

Pastor Timm asked members of the session what is your favorite Memorial Day memory and why? Discussion followed.

Discernment question: Read Luke 13.1-9. Discussion followed. Pastor Timm then took questions from members of the session.

After some discussion, a motion made by Jill Consie and seconded by Pearl Jonkman Hujet to allow other groups to use the church with polices to be developed and approved at the June meeting, with a member of the church being in the group. Motion carried.

After some discussion about the church being on Tribal lands, a motion was made by Jill Consie and seconded by Pearl Jonkman Hujet to explore the wording of a statement regarding acknowledgement that the church is on ancestral lands. Motion carried.

Motion made by Kathy LaBarge and seconded by Owen Karlmann to receive Treasurer's report with future clarification. Motion carried. Ralph Kerler abstained.

Motion requested by Pastor Timm to reduce his salary by \$1000 a month effective immediately. No motion followed. No discussion. No action taken.
