Greetings!

It is mid-afternoon in late October as I write this month's Newsletter. It is dreary outdoors, as it has been for many days, with an exception here and there to tease and remind us of the passing summer. Not only is the weather dreary, but as usual our numbers have diminished to their winter range and we are already missing many of our dear friends. One might think by this time, that is, over the past 13 years, I would have gotten used to these changes, but truthfully, it has been and is sad. On the other hand, we can look forward to next spring, when we will surely experience another wonderful resurgence of life renewed. Life must go on and so we continue our worship and work here in the beautiful Northwoods and look forward to loving and serving our God and doing all we can to alleviate pain, suffering and prejudice in the world around us. That is: to follow the gospel mandate to "Love God" and to "love and serve humanity." This is a difficult, but most meaningful, task for all of us.

In doing this we are supported in our faith from many areas of our lives: celebrating our faith at different, but equally significant times, of the year, e.g. Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Holy Week, from the beautiful, simple story of the manger to the poignant entry of Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a beast of burden, to His Trial, beating and death, followed by the joy, grace, and love of God's ultimate redemptive gift. It is incumbent upon us to open our hearts, spirits and minds to the power this faith can have in a world in desperate need today. We should diligently remember these events as the essence of our faith, as the foundation of our belief and that which gives our lives hope. We should reach out to all human beings regardless of race, gender, status in, or style of. life.

It is never too late, nor inappropriate to reflect deeply on these challenges. The ancient Anglo-Saxon word be-lief <u>literally means what a person lives by—and so we must.</u> We draw strength from our faith; we discover hope for our lives; we feel the grace and love of God who surrounds us as we think and act on all these things (and more). But this is still meaningless unless we convert our thoughts into

reality, unless we actually do our best to live these values as truly and often as we are able. We may not be able to accomplish "great" deeds; our talent and resources may be limited, but let me clearly state: no good deed, no real concern for another human being is too small to be pleasing to God, to be of value in this life, or go unnoticed by those who see with eyes of faith. The significance of this is made clear to us in the concluding

sentence Paul's great <u>Hymn of Love</u> in his first letter to the Corinthians where he wrote: "...faith, hope, love abide, these three, but the greatest of these is love."

Demonstrating love, doing the good, sharing with those less fortunate are values and principles worth pursuing; they are things of beauty. The great English poet, John Keats, captured this thought magnificently when he penned these immortal words in his masterpiece,

Endymion;

A thing of beauty is a joy forever;

Its loveliness increases; it will never

Pass into nothingness; but still will keep

A bower quiet for us, and a sleep

Full of sweet dreams, and health, and quiet breathing.

The Christian gospel, properly understood as "agape-love", and gently, kindly lived, is itself "a thing of beauty and a joy" even to eternity. It brings peace, even in a tumultuous world; it manifests the good in and through us and encourages us to share this love with all we meet.

Before closing let me say—on a very different topic—how beautiful the fall, the changing of the leaves, has been this year for Carolyn and me. We have never seen such beauty, as we travel almost daily down route 47 to Minocqua, before our very eyes; brilliant reds, yellows, filtered with the deep, rich greens. What a sight—incredible. And then I

thought, maybe I am seeing them for the first time in this light, this year, because I am really looking, thoughtfully seeing. And maybe, just maybe, I should have been as keen with my eyesight on all things in the world. And then, perhaps, I can make an even greater impact.

And now, may the grace of God surround us all; may the gentle power of our God uphold us

always; and may the love of our God flow forth from us in all we say and do.
