GREETINGS!

We are rapidly moving along here in 2021 with some modest improvement, but still with a long way to go. We are all, I am sure, anxious to get back to a more normal schedule (whatever that may be) but we have learned much from our experience over this past year. If nothing else - - patience. Seriously though, we have improved our technical skills, we have found alternatives to the way we were used to doing things. People have stepped up to help and most everyone has been very considerate. I both commend you and thank you. Without your assistance we would not have made it this far.

The weather has been rather unusual recently. We had a very long "cold" spell and I believe the forecasters indicated a record for low, i.e. below zero temperatures. There have been colder "days" but not for such a long period. We are coming out of it somewhat and it is very beautiful, the snow-filled trees and fields, crispness of the air, and even a significant amount of clear skies and sunshine. Difficult as it may be, the Northwoods is still a magnificent place to be.

We are still working on budgets for the year and reviewing how we managed this past year. On any given Sunday, we will have about 7-15 people attending in person. Most of them have taken part in the liturgy and that has been a pleasant development. If you would really like to attend in person, I believe we can accommodate more individuals, since the church seats about 130-140, there would be ample room to keep our distance, keep separated, and, of course, wear our masks. If you are interested, call the church and let me know. We will see what can be done. Technology is great, but doesn't quite compare with personal attendance. Seeing friends in the pew is heartwarming. Nevertheless, we must be very careful - - as the CDC has been saying - - even after receiving our shot(s). Despite the fact that we cannot yet return to our normal service in fuller capacity, we are not thereby precluded from sharing our deep Christian faith of loving others. There are many avenues through which we may clearly demonstrate our other-centered love. And as the lovely little sign on my desk says: "And the final answer is "love." If we step up and not only believe, that we can make a real difference in ourselves, our communities, our nation and the world and actually do it, we will have made a great contribution. And if we tire in the process, others will be there to strengthen and love us. We are all in this together, with Jesus of Nazareth doing the good, loving mercy and walking humbly and lovingly with our God.

Laud & Honor on Palm Sunday

The Palm Sunday anthem "All Glory Laud and Honor" is one of Christendom's oldest hymns. St. Theodulf of Orleans, who helped reform the church under Charlemagne, wrote the lyrics in the year 820 while imprisoned in France.

The lyrics recount Jesus' triumphal entry in Jerusalem, an event the medieval church reenacted every Palm Sunday. Clergy and townspeople processed from fields through the city gates, behind a Jesus figure riding a donkey. At the gates, children began singing the hymn in Latin – *Gloria, laus et honor* – and onlookers soon chimed in.

City gates may be a thing of the past, as the website Hymnary.org notes, yet we still praise our blessed Redeemer "because we know just what kind of King He was and is – an everlasting King who reigns not just in Jerusalem but over the entire earth. What more could we do but praise Him with glory, laud and honor."

All glory, laud and honor to You, Redeemer King, To Whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring.

You are the King of Israel and David's royal Son, Now in the Lord's name coming, The King and Blessed One.

A Breath of Fresh Prayer


Norwegian theologian Ole Hallesby described prayer as simply letting God into our lives. God "knocks," he said, "not only in the midst of your daily work, your daily struggles, your daily grind...when you need Him most."

Prayer, added Hallesby, is as essential to life as air. "As impossible as it is for us to take a breath in the morning large enough to last us until noon, so impossible is it to pray in the morning is such a way as to last us until noon," he said. "Let your prayers ascend to [God] constantly audibly or silently, as circumstances throughout the day permit."
