It's been a while since we had an issue published, so we are going to try and catch up with a lot of news since last year, including celebrating two 30 Year and two 25 Year Men of Hunter!



Ladder Safety Tips

The Three Point-of-Contact Climb – Reduce your chances of falling during the climb by:

- Wearing slip-resistant shoes with heavy soles to prevent foot fatigue
- Cleaning the soles of shoes to maximize traction
- Using towlines, a tool belt or an assistant to convey materials so that hands are free when climbing
- Climbing slowly and deliberately while avoiding sudden movements
- Never attempting to move a ladder while standing on it
- Keep centered when climbing and while working. Do not overreach or lean to keep from falling sideways.

When climbing a ladder, it is safest to utilize three points-of-contact because it minimizes the chances of slipping and falling from the ladder. At all times during ascent and descent, the climber must face the ladder and have two hands and one foot, or two feet and one hand in contact with the ladder steps, rungs and/or side rails. It is important to note that you must not carry objects in either hand that can interfere with a firm grip on the ladder. Otherwise, 3 points-of-contact with the ladder cannot be adequately maintained and the chance of falling is increased in the event a hand or foot slip occurs. Maintain three points of contact while working by leaning into or holding onto the ladder. Foot support alone on steps or rungs does not provide proper balance.

25 Years at Hunter


