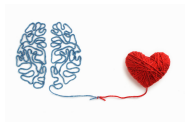

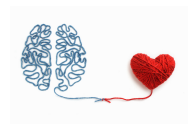
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Directions to Play:

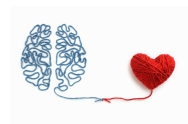
IDEAL FOR 2-4 PLAYERS

1. Print the game board pages in color for best results. Laminate for repeated use.
2. Cut out each of the game board pieces. You can choose to place or glue the pieces to the board.
3. Play Chutes & Ladders using the original game directions.
4. When a student lands on any given spot, have them pick a card from the deck.
5. If they answer the question or complete the task correctly, they have the *option* to move ahead one space. They do not have to if it puts them on a space they do not want to be on. If they get the answer wrong, they must move back one space.
6. Continue playing until a player reaches the 100th spot!



Helpful Hints:

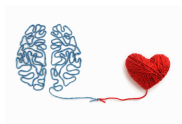
1. Pick up extra game boards at children's sales, yard sales, etc.. If you find them cheap enough, you can create a different version of each game, with varying levels of the OG scope and sequence.
2. Once laminated, you can hot glue each number right onto the game board (especially if the game board is used).
3. Label your game box for easy access.



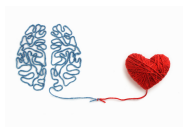

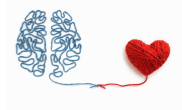

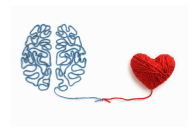
