I also asked Davis if she knew Mr. Holmes and she stated she did not know anyone by the name of Sharrod Holmes and that she does not hang in or work in a club. Davis was very adamant about not knowing anything about a shooting or going to a club the night in question. The questioning was terminated, and no other contact was made with Davis. This concludes my actions taken for this case.
