



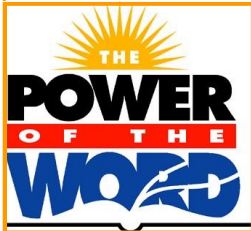

“Spring Cleaning”

“Be glad, people of Zion, rejoice in the LORD your God, for he has given you the autumn rains because he is faithful. He sends you abundant showers, both autumn and spring rains, as before.” +Joel 2:23

First off, I never really cared much for raking and bagging the yearly collection of leaves and debris. Second, I have a habit of picking the worst days to do yard work. My neighbor commented from across the street to me, “Why did you pick the windiest day of the week to pile up leaves?” My response, “Then at least my neighbors have to help a bit...” (Also, when isn’t it a windy day here near the front?) Quickly then before he hopped in his car to get going he quipped back, “I better get out of here before you put me to work then!”

With winter ending we often talk about spring being a new season, one of beginning. In it we look forward to new life and the restoration of the world around us. Spring cleaning is a well-known practice, needed, but not always celebrated. Going through that dark room to discover what we have left to collect dust through the winter or many years can be a daunting task. Sometimes the job can even be grotesque or physically difficult. Those who are out with new calves have to be exhausted in body, mind, and spirit as they give every ounce of attention to their newborn stock. Others are itching to break those first holes into their vegetable gardens. Some are waiting for the wildlife to emerge from hibernation and the rest are wishing for a break like the bears get for a whole season.

At the same time, I have noticed a note of joy as people go about these tasks again. There is a reward here and now to the work we do. As stewards of creation we know that by the sweat of brow we are fed. Our daily vocations are they ways that God delivers His blessings. Instead of a curse, with faith, we receive the promise. When something is not right we feel the urge to make it straight again and have gone out in ways to accomplish it. We know there is a good order and are called to care for others and the world according to what we have been given. It is life giving. We are helping one another.

For me it has been a joy to see people step into new roles and responsibilities in our church and community. We recently lost a man who took much of his time to care for the flower gardens and landscaping around the church. Yet, only the other day did I see a group of people out in front caring for those very same gardens. We have had others shoveling in the place of those who have done it for countless years before this winter. Young people are stepping into roles of responsibility. We even had way too much food at fellowship the other day. This is simply because you all are participating. All of us are grasping at the opportunity in front of us.

What we are witnessing is the answer to the question many of us ask... “Yes my sins are forgiven. I believe in the name of Jesus and know that I have eternal life, but now what? How do I live in this moment?” From what I have seen, many of you are doing it. Our topic is actually rooted in the greatest commandment. Through it we are driven to

involve others in the work we are doing. And what is that work? It is proclaiming forgiveness, mercy, and grace so that every person knows Jesus has done and given everything for them.

The word I have been using recently is "succession". What I mean by it is specifically the ownership we are giving to the next person. What do our words, actions, and thoughts do for or give them? The book of James warns us we will speak both blessings and curses and a simple spark from our mouths will start a wildfire in our lives. Our words have power and reflect where our heart sits. Instead of being people of the flesh, by grace we are living in the Spirit. Then our lives are fruitful and as put in the letter to the Galatians, "there is no limit or law to things like this." God calls us to live outside of ourselves. When we discover what we have been given our lives are no longer led by selfish whims. Here we are giving life through daily work God has already prepared for us and another's benefit. He loves us so we love him and love all those created in His image with the world we live in.

This is hearing the cry of the man in the Wilderness named John the Baptist who said to prepare the way. With Easter arriving we know what is coming. Through the resurrection we learn that death is not an ending but starting again without the fear of punishment waiting. As we move to the cross and tomb of Jesus we have not been closed in. Rather, we witness and are asked to live in the same boldness for others as Christ lived, died, and rose for us. For every person listening that involves not only

looking around at the mess surrounding us but in the mirror at ourselves before we are sent. We can only give what we know we need and have. Believing that we are forgiven sinners awarded grace by eternal life requires humility in our whole being, impossible without the Spirit and Word. We live gently echoing what has been done for us so that others can live in the same freedom and abundance we have. For God's glory I pray we open the doors to the kingdom for others just as we have been let in through the work and words of the saints before who only point us to Jesus Christ. Amen.

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Remembering Dietrich Bonhoeffer

The Christian church commemorates Dietrich Bonhoeffer — pastor, theologian, anti-Nazi spy — on April 9, the anniversary of his 1945 martyrdom. Among his much-loved writings are nuggets of wisdom such as these: “Judging others makes us blind, whereas love is illuminating. By judging others we blind ourselves to our own evil and to the grace which others are just as entitled to as we are.” (*The Cost of Discipleship*)

“In normal life we hardly realize how much more we receive than we give, and life cannot be rich without such gratitude. It is so easy to overestimate the importance of our own achievements compared with what we owe to the help of others.” (*Letters and Papers from Prison*)

“The table fellowship of Christians implies obligation. It is our daily bread that we eat, not my own. We share our bread. Thus we are firmly bound to one another not only in the Spirit but in our whole physical being. The one bread that is given to our fellowship links us together in a firm covenant.” (*Life Together*)

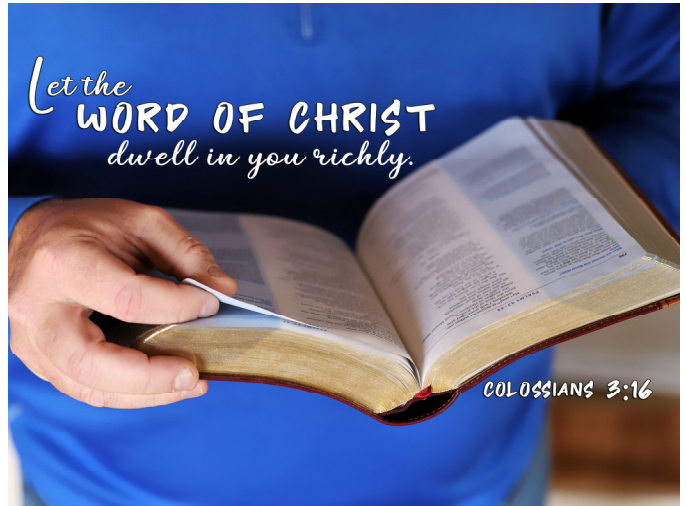
All Things Common

On Facebook, I can “follow” as many people as I want, viewing their messages, photos and activities. But I can choose only 30 to “see first” — that is, to prioritize in my news feed. As of this writing (Facebook changes often), if my “see first” list is full and I want to add someone new, I must “unprioritize” someone else.

That leads me to ponder bigger matters: I often claim to follow Jesus, but what might I need to “unprioritize” to make him not just a priority but *the* priority in my life? To what do I devote time and attention but ought to let go to follow Christ more closely? What activities, behaviors and values do I need to not just bump from my “see first” list but “unfollow” or “block” entirely? Perhaps they are antithetical to discipleship or simply take too much time away from prayer, Scripture and service.

This dilemma isn’t unique to the digital age. Facebook parlance is about what we “see first,” but in Matthew 6:33 Jesus says, “*Seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness*” (ESV, italics added).

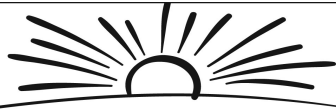

SUNRISE SURPRISE

The hidden surprise in these sweet rolls hints at the reason behind Easter's joy.

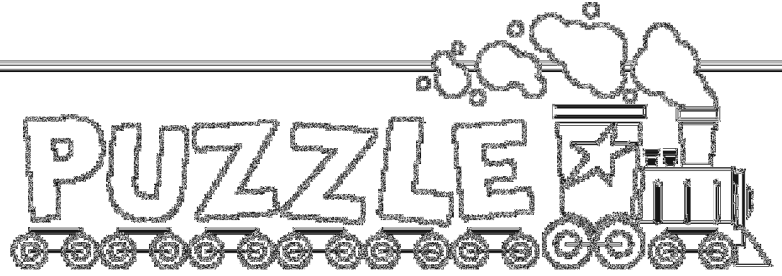
What you need:

- ½ cup chopped pecans
- 10 uncooked frozen rolls, thawed
- 10 large marshmallows
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- ½ cup melted butter
- ¼ cup brown sugar
- Adult help

What you do:

1. Grease a round baking dish. Sprinkle pecans on the bottom.
2. Flatten each roll. Place a marshmallow in the center, wrap dough around it and pinch edges together.
3. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Dip each roll into melted butter and coat with cinnamon-sugar. Place in pan, seam side down.
4. Sprinkle brown sugar and remaining butter over rolls. Cover with plastic wrap and let rise 30 minutes.
5. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown, about 30 minutes. Cool in pan.
6. As you bite into a roll, you'll see the marshmallow has melted, leaving an empty center — just like Jesus' empty tomb!

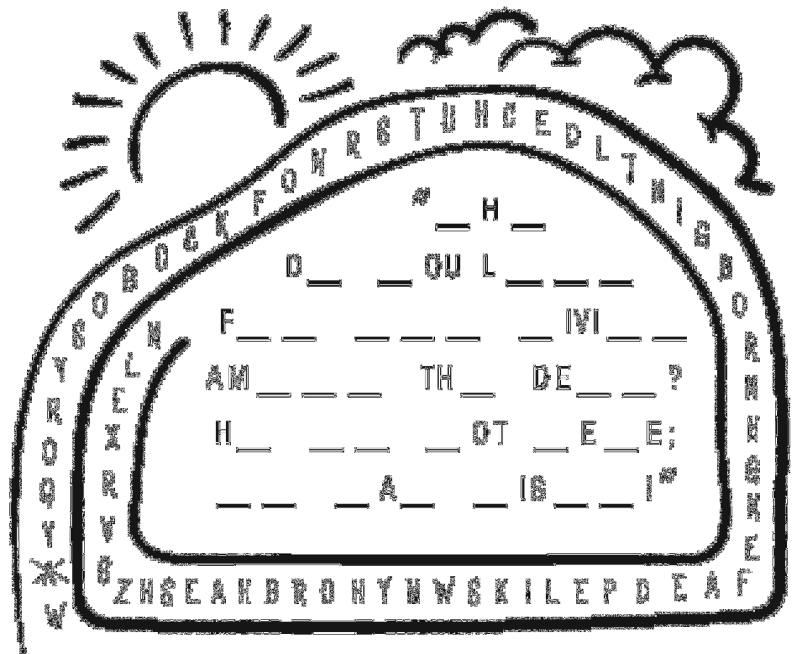

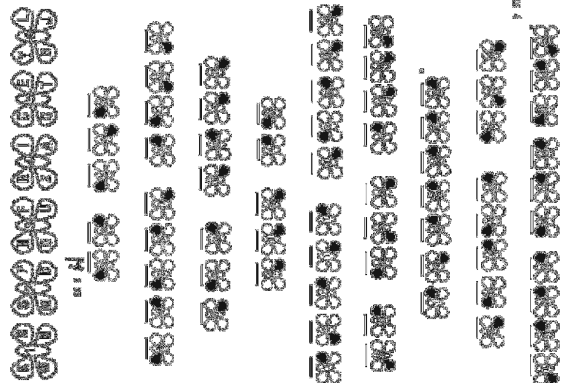

May the Lord be with you and help you to see the needs of others. Amen.

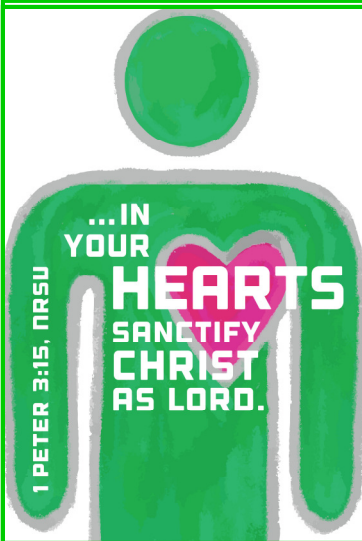

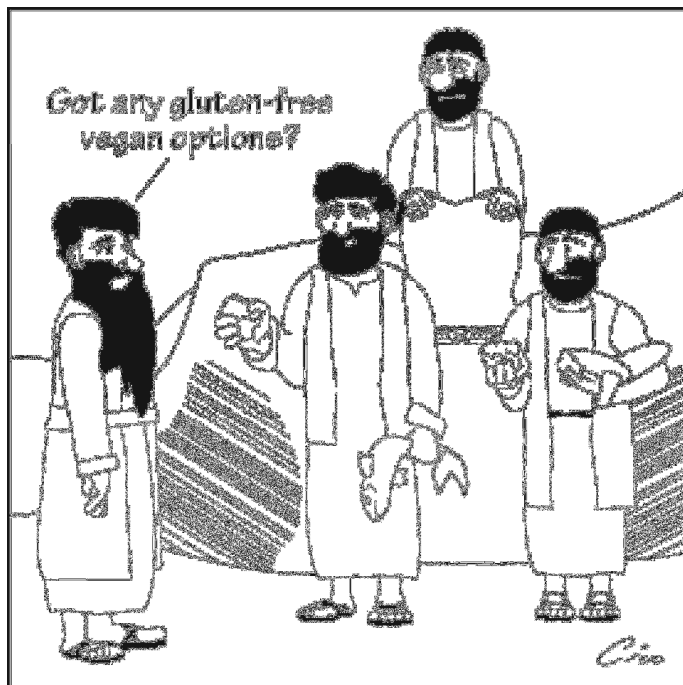



IT'S ABOUT US

Matuor Dot Alier is a social worker in North Dakota. A long, difficult journey — and the memory of his grandfather's words — brought him from a childhood in Africa to his life today. Alier fled with his brother and thousands of other youths when Sudanese soldiers attacked South Sudan. The children walked hundreds of miles with little food or water to a refugee camp in Ethiopia. In 2006, Alier and his brother arrived in Philadelphia, where they were sponsored and supported by a Lutheran church. Upon moving to Fargo some years later, Alier helped start a church where people who had survived war, displacement and other traumas could find healing, joy and love.

“My grandfather used to say, ‘I cannot be whole unless everyone is whole,’” Alier shares. “I use this saying a lot to help me stay in a close relationship with others. It means that we need each other's support to survive and thrive. I don't want to be the only one doing well if others aren't doing well. It's not just about me — it's about us.”
