Pastor's Letter

liturgical The calendar 2023-2024 Publishing is published by Solo our "authority" for the lectionary readings at our worship services here at Conrad Lutheran Parish. It is based on the LSB version of the Revised Common Lectionary and used with permission Concordia of **Publishing** Company. The lectionary - the list of Bible readings or "pericopes" - is laid out in a

three vear cycle. So there are lectionary years A, B, and C which then This repeat. year we are following lectionary year B. Each of the three vears highlights one of the three synoptic gospels in that year's

s y n o p t i c
gospels in that
year's gospel
readings - Matthew, Mark, and Luke. This
year it is Mark's turn - so to speak. As
preparation for this I am reading two scholarly commentaries on Mark's gospel:
"Mark" from the Proclamation
Commentaries Series by Professor Paul J.
Achtemeier (Fortress Press, 1986) and
"Mark" by Professor Donald H. Juel from
the Augsburg Commentary on the New
Testament Series (Augsburg Fortress 1990).

Ever since the first century, the gospel of Mark has been a resource for the faith and

life of the Christian Church. Most New Testament scholars believe Mark was written first, then Matthew and Luke, who used Mark as one of their sources, and sometime later John was written to finish out what are now the four canonical gospels. Many other "pseudo gospels" were composed for several hundred years after Pentecost. They were all rejected for various reasons.



As pastor a always I'm delighted to learn parishioners of who go beyond devotional use of the scriptures to serious Bible study of some sort. That's when one is introduced to the nearly two millennia of the historical use and interpretation

the New Testament in the Christian tradition. One place to start a serious study is with a scholarly or popular general introduction to the New Testament. There are many of these available. My favorite popular level text - at the moment - is "The New Testament In Its World: An Introduction to the History, Literature, and Theology of the First Christians" written by N.T. Wright and Michael F. Bird. I highly recommend it as a resource for serious study.

New to Great Falls: The Foot of the Cross Christian Store



Spring Training for Christians

The word Lent comes from Middle English and German words for springtime. In light of the start of baseball season, some people call the pre-Easter season "spring training for Christians." This fresh perspective moves away from the flawed understanding that Lent must be somber, or that giving something up for Lent is punishment for sin or a way to earn God's favor.

As people of faith, we should never take a season off. But every so often — at least once a year! — we do well to examine where we need to get back in shape spiritually. Perhaps we will indeed opt to give something up: that swearing habit, sleeping in on Sundays, or the cost of a weekly treat so we can donate the money instead. Or maybe we'll take on something new for Lent: a Bible study, prayer routine or service project.

Hebrews describes spiritual discipline as challenging in the moment but yielding righteousness later. The writer urges us, "Lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees ... so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed" (12:11-13, ESV). May the spring training of Lent strengthen and heal us all.


"Somewhere between where you are and where you're going, God comes along and gently takes your hand. Somewhere between all your doubting and your knowing, God comes along and helps you understand.

God alone knows where you are and where you need to be. He created all that you are and guides your destiny." (from God Comes Along, Shackley)








Corrie ten Boom, a devout Christian who helped shelter hundreds of Jewish people from Nazis during World War II, was asked how she stayed humble despite her fame.

"When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday on the back of a donkey, and everyone was waving palm branches and throwing garments onto the road and singing praises, do you think that for one moment it ever entered the head of that donkey that any of that was for him?" she replied. What you need:

- Yarn
- Scissors
- Parchment paper
- Baking sheet
- Heart-shaped cookie cutters
- 1/4 cup cornstarch
- ½ cup water
- Adult help



What you do:


- 1. Cut yarn into 12-inch pieces.
- 2. Place cookie cutters atop a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.
- Combine cornstarch and water in a saucepan. Heat mixture over medium heat, stirring until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and cool to form a "glue."
- Dip each piece of yarn into the mixture to coat completely. Squeeze off any excess.
- Place yarn in the cookie cutters, allowing pieces to cross and loop within the heart. Add more until the cookie cutter is filled and the yarn looks like a heart.
- 6. Remove cookie cutters and bake the sheet for two hours at 150°F, or until hearts are dry and hard.
