Pastor's Letter

Happy New Year! I pray you will be blessed and sustained by God's grace during 2024.

As happens every four years, we citizens of these United States will be witness to another national election including for President. The turmoil in our country and throughout the world adds to the anxiety of having to attend to political goings on. The wars and rumors of wars around the world are a constant assault on our desires for peace and tranquility. It's a reality that drains us and can tempt us to escapism or despair or aggressive retaliation.

It seems almost inescapable that we become caught up in partisan ideological disputes with other human beings holding different worldviews. The war of ideas rarely stays in the arena of mental abstractions. Human beings act upon their metaphysical speculations, political theories, religious affiliations, cultural habits, and tribal identities. Conflict inevitably results.

Jesus was not immune from the effects of this nasty reality about human life in this world. He had enemies who wanted to have him killed. They eventually succeeded in manipulating the religious and political powers in Jerusalem to effect their hatred to its desired ends. Jesus could have solved this by violent retaliation -- calling down legions of angels to destroy his enemies (see

Matthew 26:51-56). He didn't. They richly deserved that judgment. But Jesus offered forgiveness instead. That supernatural love is the only power that can rescue the human race from hubris, folly, and self-destruction.

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Under interrogation by Pilate, Jesus responded to the lies of his adversaries by stating, "My kingdom is not of this world. If My kingdom were of this world, then My servants would be fighting so that I would not be handed over to the Jews; but as it is, My kingdom is not of this realm." The rule of Jesus is not with the tools of human power structures -- neither governments nor armies. His rule is the rule of agape, divine supernatural love. Agape is self-giving for the real good of others at a cost to one's self.

Jesus prayed in John 17:14-17, "I have given them Your word; and the world has hated them, because they are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. I do not ask you to take them out of the world, but keep them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world. Sanctify them in the truth; Your word is truth."

Brothers and sisters, in answer to Christ's prayer for all his people, may we too be so kept in God's grace and sanctifying truth.

There will be a few sample chairs ordered for the congregation to decide which should replace the chairs in the Fellowship Hall. There is an ad in the Conrad paper for a church janitor and there will be a sign-up sheet posted in the F.H. for members to volunteer to help clean until a new janitor is hired.

Worship time has been discussed for the last 3 council meetings and it was decided that beginning April 7th, we will stop changing the worship times. Also, Pondera Valley will worship at 10 a.m. Golden West will decide what works best for them. The benevolence proposals were discussed and any additional changes from last months meeting. The council voted to approve the proposal of budget items for the annual congregational meeting on January 21st. Kim Wiest asked if she could make a May/June Logos this next year since she will be on vacation in later May. It was agreed that was okay. The following members going off council were acknowledged and thanked for their time and efforts: Julene Peters, Carol Johns, Mike O'Brien and Jesse Parks. Susan Gustafson has agreed to run again. 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A Year That Whispers Jesus

For author Nancy Tichy, a small holiday gift once sparked big-picture thoughts about Christian living. One December she received a kitchen towel with the message "I want a Christmas that whispers JESUS." That prompted thoughts of what it's like to have an entire year that whispers Jesus.

For starters, that involves daily quiet time, devotion and prayer. "Sometimes I wake with the thought of a person on my mind," writes Tichy. "I'm quiet with this impression, interceding for the family member or friend until it has lifted. Could this be a whisper from our Savior?"

Many other daily occurrences are "worthy of [Jesus'] whispered response of love," Tichy points out. That's true whether we're distracted by tasks and troubling thoughts or buoyed by encounters with contentment and joy. "For me," she writes, "whispering is part of intimacy, and that is what I want to make a hallmark of the coming year. I want closeness with our Savior that enables me to hear from him, even when he whispers."

Amy Carmichael's Three Powerful Prayers

Who was Amy Carmichael you might ask. Amy (1867-1951), was an Irish Protestant missionary, who served in India for 55 years. Much of her work was with children, especially rescuing them from sexual slavery. Carmichael wrote 35 books and many articles about her mission work. The Church of England remembers her on January 18, the anniversary of her death.

The following brief but powerful prayers are attributed to Carmichael:

- May thy grace, O Lord, make that possible to me which seems impossible to me by nature.
- Holy Spirit, think through me, till your ideas are my ideas.
- God, hold us to that which drew us first, when the cross was the attraction, and we wanted nothing else.

God and the Spider

During World War II, a US marine was separated from his unit on a Pacific island. the fighting had been intense, and in the smoke and the crossfire he had lost touch with his comrades.

Alone in the jungle, he could hear enemy soldiers coming in his direction. Scrambling for cover, he found his way up a high ridge to several small caves in the rock. quickly he crawled inside one of the caves. Although safe for the moment, he realized that once the enemy soldiers looking for him swept up the ride, they would quickly search all the caves and he would be killed.

As he waited, he prayed, "Lord, if it be your will, please protect me. Whatever your will though, I love you and trust you. Amen."

After praying, he lay quietly listening to the enemy begin t draw close. He thought, "Well, I guess the Lord isn't going to help me out of this one." Then he saw a spider begin to build a web over the front of the his cave.

As he watched, listening to the enemy searching for him all the while, the spider layered strand after strand of web across the opening of the cave.

"Hah," he thought. "What I need is a brick wall and what the Lord has sent me is a spider web. God does have a sense of humor."

As the enemy drew closer he watched from the darkness of his hideout and could see them searching one cave after another. As they came to his, he got ready

to make his last stand. To his amazement, however, after glancing in the direction of his cave, they moved on. Suddenly, he realized that with the spider web over the entrance, his cave looked as if no one had entered for quite a while.

"Lord, forgive me," prayed the young man. "I had forgotten that in you a spider's web is stronger than a brick wall."

We all face times of great trouble. When we do, it is so easy to forget what God can work in our lives, sometimes in the most surprising ways. And remember with God, a mere spider's web becomes a brick wall protection.



Our Source of Light is Jesus!

January 6 marks the day of Epiphany, when the wise men (who were Gentiles) came to worship Jesus and bring him gifts. During the church-year season of Epiphany, we remember that God's Son is the Light of the whole world.

Ponder the gifts of Epiphany with these two reflections, written centuries apart:


Your light, dear God, surpasses all other light, because all light comes from you. Your fire surpasses all fire, because your fire alone burns without destroying. The flames of your

fire reach into the soul. consuming the sin and selfishness that lie there. But far from damaging the soul, your fire sets it ablaze with love. What moved you to enlighten me with your truth? The fire of your love was the reason. You loved me so much that you could not bear to see me confused and perplexed. Can I ever repay the burning love which you have given me? No, because I have nothing of my own to give. Yet you assure me that the love which you put into my soul is repayment enough. You desire only the joy of seeing me receiving your gift. What more perfect Father could there be!

A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.



What you need:


- · Shallow dish
- Water
- Black ground pepper
- Toothpick
- Dish soap
- Bible

What you do:

- 1. With the dish on a table, fill it halfway with water. Don't jiggle the dish.
- 2. Sprinkle pepper on the water.
- 3. Dab the toothpick into a drop of soap. Then touch its tip to the center of the water and observe.
- 4. Read Psalm 103:8-12. How does this experiment illustrate God's forgiveness?
- 5. Explain the science behind this experiment: The soap disturbs the water's surface tension. The soap molecules don't want to interact with the water. This repels the water molecules from the soap, causing the floating pepper to also move to the sides.


