“Lutheran Confessions: The Three Ecumenical Creeds”

Often we spend time distinguishing the differences between us rather than relishing in what our beliefs give us. Yes, there are differences in each Christian denomination or association. At the same time, there has been the historical constant of creeds used to confess faith since the beginning. From the very start there was a need to clarify what was truly vital to this religion we share currently.

Think about what happens to Adam and Eve. The first recorded human words come from the first woman in response to the serpent’s question. The snake asks, “Did God really say that?” Here we find the heart of confession because in order for us to answer we must have first been taught. Her words could have been the repetition of what God said, but instead sin twists the matter and we all know what happens next... After death enters into the picture as the consequence for disbelieving in the Word we witness the chosen nation of Israel needing the incessant reminder that God loves them and will never leave them. The Lord shows up again and again repeating His promise so that they do not forget it in the best or worst circumstance.

In the New Testament Jesus arrives to make the Word flesh. Christ is the living testimony of all we confess. In the Gospels we learn that the Messiah fulfills all the Law, Prophets, and Psalms as He takes each teaching to its furthest extent while fulfilling every part. All the while he is constantly asking his disciples, “**Who do you say I am?**” This is asking for a statement of faith much like the confirmation students will do on the last Sunday of October. After spending years studying and experiencing who God is and what he says, have they learned anything yet? Peter confesses when Jesus asks him “You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God.” Paul in the letter to the

Corinthians gives a straightforward breakdown concerning the basics of Christianity. In chapter 15 he writes that the things of utmost importance were “**that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to...**”

Yet, what does all this and more throughout the Holy Writ mean for us? *All this is spread throughout Scripture, how am I supposed to know and organize all this so that there is confidence what I believe is true? Won't I just fall into sin and disbelief like Adam, Eve, Israel, the disciples, and everyone else in history? How can I even begin to grasp everything God has given me to believe in?*

Thankfully the answer is as simple as it was initially. Romans chapter 10 steers us to what needs to happen. Verse 17 is one I constantly repeat so that we never forget, “Faith comes by hearing.” So for a person to receive salvation there are some requirements. A preacher is needed and that could be not only me but you. We each need to hear from a person as appointed in their own vocation for us to simply listen and witness. In our daily life and work these opportunities will arise for us to do and vitally confess what we hold to be true and dear for others benefit. As the same chapter asks, “How can they hear unless someone tells them?”

The lips spill out what the heart contains but the Word has to be placed there by the Holy Spirit. We believe that not only the people of the Bible are given this chance but that every person has been called into the royal and holy priesthood. We confess our faith because we heard it from someone else and have experience the way, truth, and life ourselves. The same pattern happened to everyone before us. We can trace this all the way back to those who first gathered together in the name of Jesus. Three

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creeds were developed faithfully by those that follow the records of Scripture. They are known to be ecumenical, catholic, and universal, all meaning the same thing. We believe the Christian faith can be summarized sufficiently by these traditional words we often say together on Sunday. They are each respectively called the **Apostle's, Nicene, and Athanasian Creed**. Each has sincerely been brought solely from Scripture so that we are repeating not our interpretation but the Word of God, Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.

If a person were to ask you what you believe, how would you respond? Please go read these three creeds to see if common questions could be answered there. Also, what other questions are there about Christianity you or the world may have that you feel the Church and Bible should respond to? Why does what we as believers say matter?

Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses. + 1 Timothy 6:12

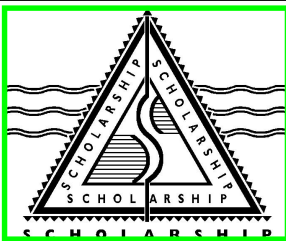

HOW do we steward our time?

Each of us can be swept away with everyday life, responsibilities, concerns and appointments until time is not even ours. Do you feel you as if you need an extra hour each day?! Martin Luther is quoted as saying, *“To be a Christian without prayer is no more possible to be alive without breathing.”* Actually, I will disagree with that. While that statement could make you proud because you do spend time in prayer or guilty because you don’t spend time in prayer, the message God wants us to hear is, *“Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.”* (Mt 11:28) That’s ALL of us! Let’s give Him our time. He will give us rest and help us use our time well.

We are so blessed in our congregations with people who give of their time in so many ways. Take some time to notice! No names to list here but start wondering...how did that get done? Who was here? How could I help? That was beautiful! Could I do that? Who needs me today? Look OUTside of our

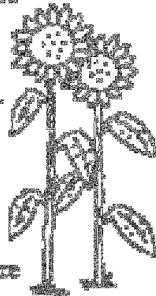


Follow the Sun

Make a sunflower, which turns its head to follow the sun.

What you need:

- Paper plate
- Yellow marker
- Scissors
- Yarn (black and brown)

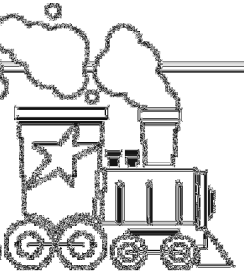


What you do:

1. Color the entire plate yellow.
2. Around the edge, cut out an odd number of triangles. Evenly space the cuts to form flower petals.
3. Poke a hole in the plate's center. String black yarn through the hole and over one triangle cut. Tie a knot at the back of the plate.
4. Continue looping yarn through the hole and over the remaining cuts. Secure the end. The flower should look like a wagon wheel with black spokes.
5. Tie the brown yarn to a black "spoke." Weave the brown yarn over and under the spokes in a circle. Continue until the sunflower has a large center. Then tie the end.
6. Display your craft as a reminder to follow the Sun, Jesus!

KIDS! Ask your parents to plant sunflowers this spring so you can see how they do follow the sun!

May the Holy Spirit fill you with joy! Amen.

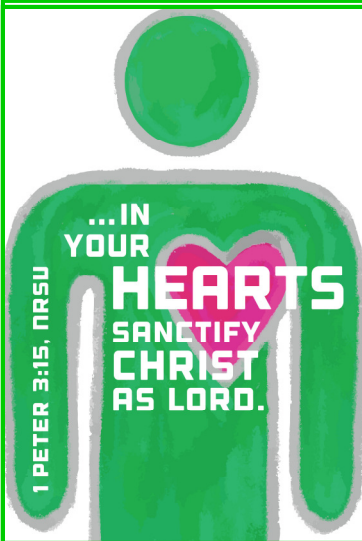

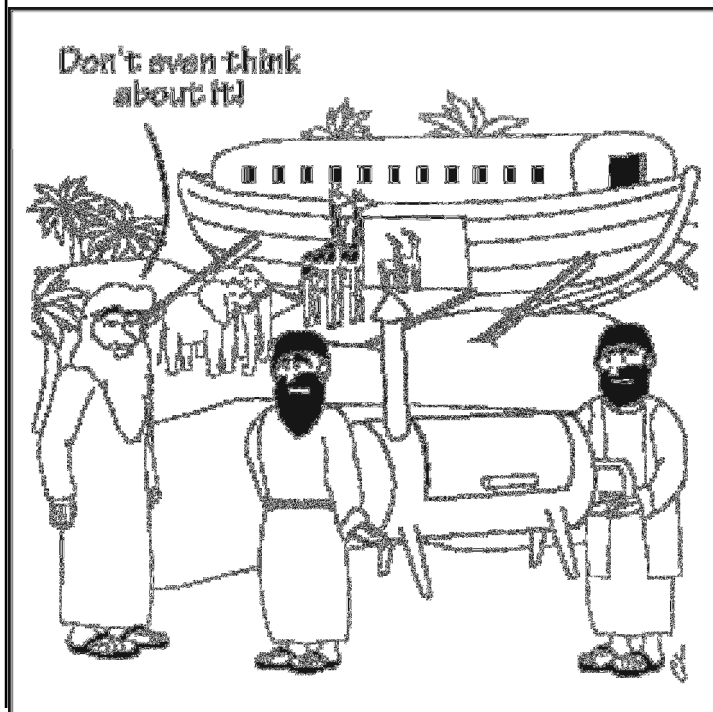
