# Grace and Peace to you from God the Father and Our Lord Jesus Christ

This summer has been far from normal, but as it nears its end I have to say that I am thankful. With COVID-19 slowing the whole world down many of our ministries have been halted or need to be accomplished with innovation in today's context. I am glad that we will be beginning our education programs in September. The youth will return slowly, but sometimes that is true for all of us. With ministries restarting there is a need to finish our Revelation bible study and a request for adult confirmation classes. Many things have continued on amidst all this. As we learn what works and doesn't we will continue to open ministry opportunities further. Many churches are not in this position, and we should remember them.

We know that we cannot predict the future. With a pandemic, protests, election, and worldwide unrest our schedule might change without much warning. Many are still waiting to return to worship with us due to their own health concerns and I look forward to seeing them as soon as you can return. Restarting much of what we had done before may be quite difficult. I pray each of us has the patience and grace to bring each of our brothers and sisters with. Worship will continue as normally as possible and Word and Sacrament will be administered. Please remember that this is a freedom and gift for us, not an obligation and law we are under.

Still this summer a lot of work went on. Most of it occurred online. For the first time I attended the service coordinators meeting. This was supposed to be in St. Charles, IL but do to the virus we all stayed home and used our computers. Attending this meeting, I was able to meet the new LCMC service coordinator, Michael Bradley. We discussed the direction of the LCMC and his vision for our future. I was responsible for giving a report on the NW District, which included news from Springfield and Cove, OR. As a region we are also asking to be given more responsibility over pastoral certification, and planning a regional youth activity for the near future. Also, the group

of LCMC MT pastors that meet in Great Falls monthly has been growing and gaining purpose.

With all this still going on I cannot complain much at all. I am blessed. Most of this work has been done from home, while still being able to enjoy the freedoms of being in a small town. I am out and about a bit but for the most part have worked from home in the company of my family. With our baby boy due August 24th, Kori needed help in the hottest part of the season and I was able to be there. Yes, we miss visiting, and have many of you on our mind. At the same time our whole household is ready to welcome our new addition and rest. We still have needs of course. We have asked for an estimate on a housing allowance so that we may begin looking for a larger house. Our car is also small for the five of us so we are looking at our own budget so that we might afford two vehicles. Diapers and wipes were almost gone too, but will begin to arrive again. We appreciate each of the congregations generosity through the years. Thank you.

At the start of the pandemic, the first thing I talked about was the need for each of us to be still. I encouraged each of us to go and find a quiet place to pray. One of my favorite verses says, "Be still, the Lord will fight for vou..." (Ex. 14:14) At the end of this summer, I now have my own door opening for this very thing. After our boy is born my family is taking a vacation until Sept. 8th. We will be back in worship Sept. 13th. No matter where my work is there is a need for me to put it down and focus on my family instead. We may stay in Conrad or take a short trip, but are very thankful for being able to do this. It will get me ready for the start of our new year and give me time to discern. I pray that as we are away that all of us are able to take time to hear what God is revealing to us. We will be taking time simply to listen and let God show us where he is calling us. I also pray that we receive support and care after working faithfully through uncertain times so we may continue to faithfully proclaim the Good News of Jesus for the Glory of the Father always.


prayer.




## WISDO TREASURE HUNT

Here's what you'll need:


- 2 sheets of 8-1/2" x11" paper

- 2. Cut out each rectangle.
- 3. Use this list to write the name (Proverbs) and the numbers of a chapter and a verse on each rectangle: Proverbs 2:6 / 3:13 / 3:19 / 4:5 / 4:7 5:1 / 8:11 / 16:16 / 18:4 / 19:8 / 24:3.
- 4. Punch a hole in the corner of each rectangle and tie a piece of string, yarn or ribbon through each hole.
- 5. Choose one person to hide the Proverb tags, tying them to objects inside or outside your house.
- 6. Send everyone to look for the tags.
- 7. After all the tags are found, look up the verses to see why we should treasure wisdom.
- 8. Create your own hunt by searching your Bible for more verses about wisdom.

#### ALL WORKERS ARE ESSENTIAL!

The concept of vocation, Latin for "to call," previously referred only to a calling to church work. But then Martin Luther emphasized the importance — and even sanctity — of all types of labors. The reformer pointed out that "God doesn't need our good works, but our neighbor does."

RJ Grunewald, in a blog post titled "God Makes Pizza," describes how this looks today: "God is busy about his work in the midst of your work whether you realize it or not. The laundry, the spreadsheets, the phone calls and the cups of coffee are all deeply spiritual because God is at work in the world. He is serving your family, your coworkers and your community through the work you do. God is at work providing 'daily bread' through the work that you do, no matter what that work is."
