Pastor's Letter

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11; NIV)

The ancient "Hippocratic Oath" is an ethical code attributed to the ancient Greek physician Hippocrates which was meant to guide the conduct of those in the medical profession and is still used in graduation ceremonies of many medical schools. One of the promises within the oath is, "first, do no harm" (or "primum non nocere," the Latin translation of the original Greek). In fact, although "first, do no harm" is attributed to Hippocrates, it wasn't a part of the original oath but from another of his works called "Of the Epidemics". Be that as it may, the principle of "first, do no harm" is an ethical standard worth reverence and practice with all the alacrity one can muster, in my considered opinion. Not only for health care professionals like my RN wife, Grace, but for all human beings in all circumstances.

While it is a fine ethical idea, a fence post or pile of rocks could keep it inviolate. It is merely negative and doesn't require any *positive* action. In contrast, ethical ideas or prescriptions that require positive action are needed if any *real good* is to come to others through our efforts.

The Golden Rule, as its called in the Western Tradition, is expressed in its positive form by Jesus in Luke 6:31, "Do unto others what you



would have them do to you," and also in Matthew 7:12, "So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the law and the Prophets." The negative form of the rule has been expressed in many other traditions, for example, in an Egyptian papyrus text (c. 664-323 BCE) we have, "That which you hate to be done to you do not do to another." This ethical rule seems to be rather incorruptible but I've heard it used to promote selfish and evil desires. A rule can never take the place of a well-formed character. And a well-formed character can only be formed by our Creator. Which is why Jesus insisted that we must love one another as he has first loved us (John 15:9-17). Only by abiding in, remaining in, living in divine love -- "agape" -can we be transformed and be empowered to lay down our lives for others.

May our Lord Jesus so live in our hearts and minds that His supernatural love passes through us to all we meet in our daily lives.

The Bike the US for MS will stay at our church July 18th. Kim Wiest will contact them to see if we can feed them dinner and breakfast the next morning. There will be no council meeting in August.

The next PV Council meeting will be Tuesday, September 12th at 6:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.



As we begin to prayerfully consider what God has for us to do our church family, in this community, and world, let us begin conversations considering 4 major areas of physical improvements in our facility here at Pondera Valley.

In September, we plan to have 4 vision meetings on each of the 4 areas being considered at this time.

- 1) The Parsonage...what work needs to be done to the Montgomery house for starters...
- 2) The Education Building ...what work needs to be done to improve and utilize the space?

Who, Me? Yes, You!

The Bible is filled with people who don't feel up to the challenge of serving God, speaking for God or leading his people. But God always knows what he's doing. Pastor Haviland Houston issues this challenge: "When you are hesitant to act, or feel a failure of nerve coming on, when courage lags, or even if laziness and the 'I don't care' blues get you down, may the words of Mordecai to Esther

burn in your hearts and minds: 'And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?'" (See Esther 4:14.)

Max Lucado offers a similar reminder in *You Were Made for This Moment*. "God always has his person," he writes, also citing the book of Esther. "When we feel as though everything is falling apart, God is working in our midst, causing everything to fall into place. He is the King of quiet providence, and he invites you

and me to partner with him in his work."

Lucado continues: "[God] has a Joseph for every famine and a David for every Goliath. When his people need rescuing, God calls a Rahab into service. When a baby Moses needs a mama, God prompts an Egyptian princess to have compassion. He always has his person. He had someone in the story of Esther. And in your story he has you."



Instruments of Connection

Following Jesus involves much more than attending worship, as Pastor Stan Purdum points out in a sermon titled "The Hug": "The spiritual life, in addition to some outwardly religious and inwardly devotional acts, also includes such mundane activities as sending thank-you notes for gifts received, returning phone calls, greeting fellow worshipers Sunday after Sunday, surprising

our spouse with a spontaneous act of appreciation, helping out at funeral dinners, seeking common ground during disagreements, listening to our children, working at not being a grouch, visiting friends and relatives and, perhaps, even sending an electronic hug. All those things are instruments of connection. The spiritual aspect is the intentionality behind them."





Godly, biblical wisdom is more valuable than gold or silver. Make this do-it-yourself toy to practice your searching skills.


What you need:

- 12 small, smooth rocks
- An empty, clean egg carton
- Paintbrush
- Acrylic paint (gold or silver)
- Black permanent marker

What you do:

- 1. Clean the rocks and egg carton. Place newspaper on a table to protect it from paint.
- 2. Paint all sides of the rocks and carton. Let dry. Add a second coat, if desired.
- 3. When rocks are dry, number each rock (1-12) with marker. Place rocks in the carton.
- 4. Play hide-and-seek with a friend. Take turns hiding the rocks in a room, sandbox or backyard. Give clues, if needed, and count the rocks as they're returned.
