A Message from the Pastor

"Where your treasure is, there your heart shall be..." These words of Jesus (Mt. 6:21) are not found in our Gospel today but they certainly resonate with the theme of our Mass readings today. There's a difficult balance that must be navigated throughout our lives: living in and among the things of this earth, while at the same time having our heart completely oriented toward the things of heaven. The parable of the man in the Gospel today preoccupied with what to do with all the wealth he has accumulated challenges us to also consider the question of whether or not the priorities of my own life are rightly ordered or not. This is something that can only be accomplished with the grace of the Holy Spirit, and it is delicate and takes patience and persistence.

We should also at the same time remember that to have wealth or to have means is not evil in itself—there are many saintly examples who have contributed heroically to the care of the poor and the spread of the Gospel through the gift of what they have. The threat, however, is our temptation to solely pursue wealth for its own sake, or to give ourselves a sense of security, or convince ourselves that we are the ones ultimately in control of our lives. The parable we hear from the Lord today presents us bluntly how such a disposition of heart falls short. If our hearts receive everything they need from the Lord, who alone can truly provide for our life, we are freer to engage earthly things with a heavenly perspective and we won't fall victim to being a slave to the things that will ultimately fade or not matter for eternity. Our identity is not rooted in what we have accomplished or accumulated in our lives.

Readings from the book of Ecclesiastes (today's first reading) always provide challenges for reflection. The book itself belongs to the genre of Wisdom Literature in the Old Testament, and left alone without the rest of the bible, it can seem quite bleak and empty. The author's use of the word "vanity" can get conflated with our more familiar use of the word "vain" thinking arrogant, self-centered, consumed with our own image, etc., but there is a deeper meaning in the context of the text that points us to that which is "vain" like vapor or a breath, it comes and goes, a thing is here and then it fades away--as in "it doesn't matter." So with the book taken as a whole, Ecclesiastes challenges us with many questions for reflection: What is the point of life if all these (earthly) things are fading? What is the point of our hard work and toil if eventually it is all for nought? Do we live simply to die?

The way the interpretive tradition of this text is essentially that Ecclesiastes poses all the questions of which Jesus is the only answer. With the incarnation of God taking on our humanity, the questions of the ephemeral or fleeting aspects of our existence don't leave us empty and despairing, but rather compel us toward Christ who is our sure hope. Only Jesus can satisfy the deepest longings of our being, only his life, death, and resurrection provide us with a firm foundation. By calling us to life with him Jesus gives us purpose, meaning, and a horizon that orients us for all our life. From time to time it is critical for our own reflection to consider the question, "What is my highest priority?" Do all other good and important things (family, friends, virtue, etc) flow *first* from my being oriented toward the Lord? It is always the desire of the Lord to help us be free from disordered attachments and live more authentically in a joy that only He can provide. And yet, it takes much courage and trust to live this way day in and day out. But so that we don't have to shoulder this burden on our own strength, God in his goodness, offers us the promised accompaniment of his grace through the Sacraments and the life of the Church, through our brothers and sisters in the faith, and in the transformation of our hearts contemplating always Jesus, the Incarnate Word. May our lives always be built on the foundation and treasure of the Lord's enduring love.

Sound System Upgrade

Dear friends!

I know there are many projects for us to embark on together in the coming months and years ahead. It is important not only to me, but also to your trustees, to your Parish and Finance Councils, that your generosity sees regular impacts and improvements on the life of our community. And I'm excited that one of the projects we are undertaking is renovation to the sound system in the church. Among the many things around our campus that could benefit from care, our attention to the audio needs will have an immediate impact on everyone coming through our doors, which is why this is where we are beginning. Our worship and prayer at Mass is dependent on our sincere participation, and since I've been with you, this has been one of the issues that is regularly raised and affects a large contingent of our parish family.

We want **all** to be able to be nourished by hearing the Word of the God proclaimed, with the homilies, various announcements, instructions from our cantors-all of which contribute to our care for every member of our parish. It has been a number of years since there have been undertakings to the degree that we plan, and so it will be a costly investment, but certainly not out of reach given all that is accomplished each year. The project in total will fix our current issues with audio clarity, speakers, consistency and balance of sound quality regardless of seat, and also avoid the soon-anticipated repairs coming due to the lifespan of our current system. There will also be a number of individual audio units available for those with hearing impairments. A new, modern sound system will ensure no one feels excluded from the Mass's beauty and meaning.

We estimate the cost of this upgrade at \$40,000. However, thanks to the sacrifices and generosity of many of our parish groups like The Holy Name Society, The St. Thérèse Society, the Vietnamese Community, and the Annual Msgr. Walsh Golf Tournament–a portion of this total has already been raised. Even the overage from having surpassed our Hope Appeal Goal from 2024 is making this special project possible. Because we know well the pride we take in our parish church and our stewardship to provide for her future, I'm inviting you to consider making a contribution to this project that will continue to uplift our beautiful liturgies for years to come. Please know that the contribution you offer, no matter the size, brings us closer to our goal.

Thank you for your prayerful consideration of this effort and for helping ensure that all can fully participate in the joy of the Mass and so that the Word of God may continue to transform our lives and be heard! Donations can be made through the Parish Office, or through the regular collections at Mass using the "Blue Envelope" which indicates support of this project and any overage in contributions once we've reached our goal will immediately contribute to the next improvements to our building and are restricted for that use.

Mass Book Opening, Mass Intentions & Offerings

As we prepare to open the 2026 Mass Book on August 25th, listed below are some frequently ask questions. These questions and answer may clear up some of the confusion on Mass limits and costs.

Every Mass is offered for the same intention, namely, that the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ be for the salvation of the whole world. The specific intentions and needs of the faithful can be joined to this intention (c. 945 of the Code of Canon Law). Masses can be offered for anyone, living or dead (c. 901). Masses can also be offered for various reasons: in thanksgiving, for the intentions of living, for the purification of the dead, etc.

What does it "cost" to have a Mass offered for a specific intention?

The faithful are asked to make an offering to the priest. In the Diocese of Syracuse, the suggested offering is \$15.00. By accepting the offering, the priest is obliged to fulfill the intention for which it is given. Priests (and parishes) can accept only those intentions that can be offered by them within a year (c. 953). All intentions are recorded in a book, noting who made the offering as well as who accepted and/or satisfied them (c. 955 §§3 and 4).

Where does the offering for a Mass intention go? The offering given for the celebration of a Mass is deposited into a restricted account for this purpose. It is then given to the priest celebrating the Mass. It is part of his salary. The priest may only receive one Mass offering per day even if he celebrates multiple Masses, unless the law of the Church allows more than one to be received (e.g., on Christmas). Additional Mass offerings received at the parish are used for the mission of the parish: worship, evangelization, care of those in need.

Our collective Masses are when?

Each week the collective Masses (where 5 intentions may be said) will be at the 4:00pm Vigil Mass and the 11:30am Sunday Mass. All week day Masses as well as the 7:30am Sunday Mass will only be allowed 1 intention.

How many intentions can be offered at one Mass? A separate Mass is offered for each intention (cc. 948 and 949). However, several intentions (no more than five) may be offered at one Mass when (1) the donors agree to have their intentions combined, (2) the date, time, place of the Mass is public, and (3) the celebrant retains only one offering. Masses with more than one intention (a.k.a. "collective Masses") can only be celebrated twice a week in the parish church.

Why are some Masses offered for the people of the parish?

Pastors are bound on each Sunday and holy day of obligation to apply the Mass for the people entrusted to them. These Masses may be offered by other priests (e.g. the parochial vicar). They may also be offered on other days. Pastors who have the care of several parishes are bound to apply only one Mass for the people entrusted to them each Sunday and holyday of obligation (cc. 534 §§ 1 and 2). There is no offering given or received for this intention. Other intentions may not be joined to this intention.

St. John Vianney

On August 4th we Honor St. John Vianney protector of parish priests. Born into a peasant family in Dardilly, France in 1786 he became a priest at age 32. In 1818, he was appointed a parish priest of Ars-en-Dombes, a remote town that had lapsed in faith, which he brought back to the Church using only prayer, mortification and example. The town became a pilgrimage site, where the "Holy Curate" heard confessions for long hours each day. He died in 1859 and was canonized in 1925. He is often depicted near Confessionals.
