Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A Message from the Pastor

"Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose hope is the Lord. He is like a tree planted beside the waters that stretches out its roots to the stream: it fears not the heat when it comes; its leaves stay green; in the year of drought it shows no distress, but still bears fruit" (Jeremiah 17:7-8-our 1st Reading today). A vivid metaphor for us of what it looks like to live life nourished by grace. At the same time this image is contrasted with that of a barren desert, or like something trying to grow in an uninhabitable land, and equates this to one who decides to trust rather in one's self, in human beings, or in the fleeting consolation of merely earthly things (Jer. 17:5-6).

In John's Gospel, Jesus offers an invitation and a similar reminder: "Let anyone who is thirsty, come to **me**, and let the one who believes **in me** drink…'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.' Now he said this about the Spirit which believers in him were to receive" (John 7:37-39). "…[W]hoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:14).

Flowing water and abundant life is one way Jesus chooses to reflect to us the spiritual life and his gift of the Holy Spirit. We wrestle (probably daily) as his disciples with the choice to live life in the Spirit and to avoid succumbing to living solely for 'the flesh.' St. Paul, of course, picks up on this struggle and shares from the vulnerable place of his heart. He says he often faced every kind of difficulty in striving to live in the Spirit. He describes his own spirit as being 'willing' to follow after the good, but his own flesh is too weak on its own (cf. Romans 7:15ff). He recognizes the good he ought to do but continually is unsuccessful in following through. But the good news is that while we might feel discouraged in this same struggle, Jesus and the life of grace is an answer that provides us profound hope. (And it's not that the flesh is intrinsically bad, our humanity is **good**, our body is good, but when we allow ourselves to be led away by our passions we risk making a god or idol out of something that is not God.)

Our Gospel today also lays out what is at stake in this tension that we find ourselves living in regarding the interior battle of the 'flesh' and the spirit. There is a path that leads to our destruction and a path that leads us to life. Jesus deeply desires us to come--in freedom--to the fullness of life and to know the path to authentic fulfillment and joy. It's not the path that the world would easily recognize. It's a perspective quite turned upside down. Blessed *rather* are not the rich but the poor, blessed *rather* are the hungry than those who are full, blessed are those who weep or know the experience of the prophet rejected rather than those laughing or those able to use others for their own benefit. While there may be some rhetorical strategy at work here, what matters is docility or disposition of heart choosing rather to place confidence and hope in God rather than in man.


We are encouraged to cling to theological hope which is a grace gifted to us that completely orients our life toward *eternal* wisdom and *heavenly* perspectives and **anchors** our lives with God. When this grace comes to us through the consolation of the Holy Spirit, we are immovable by the workings of the enemy, or by the sufferings of our earthly life. As Pope Benedict rightly points out in Spe Salvi paragraph 2, "the Gospel is not merely a communication of things that can be known—it is one that makes things happen and is life-changing. The dark door of time, of the future, has been thrown open. The one who has hope lives differently; the one who hopes has been granted the gift of a new life."

This is why our lives as disciples matter greatly even on a worldly scale. If we live life according to the power of the Spirit, if we live attached to heavenly things rather than to merely earthly things, we walk with greater freedom in this world because of the confidence we have in God and are actually better equipped for being in relationship with others. St. Paul, Letter to the Romans: "[H]ope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts **through the holy Spirit** that has been given to us. For Christ, while we were still helpless, yet died at the appointed time for the ungodly ... [b]ut God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:5-8). Recall with great hope this day that since your baptism, the Lord has desired to flood your heart and life with the gift of His Spirit and that while each of our earthly contexts change from day to day, week to week, month to month, year to year—the Lord longs to make of you and me trees with deep roots that fear not the changes of life, but trust rather in the permanence of his Spirit given to sustain us with 'water' that wells up to eternal life.

Corporal

At the beginning of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, a linen cloth is unfolded and place on the altar. This linen cloth is called a corporal. The word corporal is rooted in the Latin word, corpus, meaning "body". This cloth not only has a special meaning, but a special purpose. The cloth reminds us of the linen used to wrap the body of Jesus when he was laid in the tomb.

As the Liturgy of the Eucharist begins, it is placed under the chalice and paten. It's special purpose is to catch any particles of the consecrated host, the Body of Christ, when the priest breaks the host. At the end of the Communion Rite, the corporal is folded in thirds from the sides. Before the linen is laundered, any fragments are consumed then it is rinsed with water in the sacrarum (a sink set aside for this specific purpose with the drain leading directly into the earth from the sacristy).

"O Sacrament most holy
O Sacrament Divine
All praise and all thanksgiving
Be every moment thine."
