I Will Build My Church

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Jesus' avowed purpose was to "<u>build my Church</u>" (Mt16:18). This would be accomplished by "<u>human agents</u>" through the power of the <u>Holy Spirit</u> (At1:8). The New Testament Church began on the Day of Pentecost with the indwelling of Holy Spirit's being distributed to 120 persons (At2:2-4a). Just before the Ascension, <u>Jesus informed the Apostles</u> of the purpose of their calling: "<u>feed my flock</u>" (Jh21:15bβ,16bβ,17bβ).

<u>Jesus Christ is The Rock</u>: Matthew 16:18 contains the famous play on words: "And I tell you, you are <u>Peter</u>, and on <u>this rock I will build my church</u>": "Peter": Πέτρος - <u>Petros</u>, a proper noun meaning "<u>stone</u>"; "rock": πέτρα - <u>petra</u>, <u>a rock such as a tomb</u> (Mt27:59-60a). <u>Jesus Christ</u> is "<u>The Rock</u>" upon which the Church is built (1Cr3:11,10:4b, Eph2:19-22). The Divine Being known as "<u>YHWH</u>" in the Old Testament is "<u>The Rock</u>", <u>Jesus Christ</u> (Dt32:3-4,15,18,30-31, Ps18:2, Is30:29, Hbk1:12). <u>The objective of the Church is to abolish "death"</u> (Mt16:18, Ps49:13a,14a,14bβ, 1Cr15:26,54-56a, Rv21:3-4).

<u>The Concept of "Resurrection"</u>: The <u>full understanding</u> of the "resurrection of the dead" was <u>not available</u> until the New Testament documents were written; however, there was clearly <u>some understanding available in Old Testament times</u> (1Sm2:6,8a, Mk14:28, At2:32, 13:36-37, Is57:15). The <u>disciples did NOT understand</u> when Jesus first told them about his impending resurrection (Mr9:31-32, Jh20:8-9). A "resurrection" is a <u>transformation</u> from a physical mortal body into an immortal spiritual body (1Cr15:35,42,50-53). Jesus, the "<u>firstborn</u>", is the <u>objective proof</u> of God's ability to transform a physical human being, dead or alive, into an eternal spirit being (Cl1:15, Rv1:5a, 1Cr15:12,16-17a,20). There were <u>many eyewitnesses</u> to the death of Jesus Christ. Jesus made a point of appearing alive to them after the resurrection.

<u>You Will be My Witnesses</u>: Jesus' death made possible the propitiation of sin, before that the <u>Holy Spirit</u> was <u>NOT</u> <u>generally available as an indwelling presence</u> to human beings (Jh7:37-39, 16:12-13, Lk24:48-49). At the Ascension, Jesus reiterated the promise of power and informed the Apostles of the <u>purpose of the power</u> (At1:4-5,8). At the Day of Pentecost, the assembled 120 persons received the indwelling of the Holy Spirit (At2:1-4a). The power of the Holy Spirt combined with eyewitness knowledge of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ empowered the Apostles and other disciples to become the <u>witnesses Jesus required to build his Church</u> (At2:32, 3:15, 5:30a,32a, 10:39b-43a). The Church quickly grew, starting in Jerusalem (At1:8b, 2:14,41, 6:7); but, quickly spread throughout <u>Judea</u> and <u>Samaria</u> (At8:1b,25); and, to the <u>Gentiles</u> (At10:1a,34-35, 11:18b). The Book of Acts traces the growth of the Church from Jerusalem to <u>Rome</u>, the center of the world (At28:16-17a,20,24-25a,28).

<u>The Great Commission</u>: <u>Mark</u> reports Jesus' speaking a few days after the resurrection in Jerusalem (Mk16:14-18); <u>Matthew</u>, reports Jesus speaking several days later in Galilee (Mt28:16-20). Jesus' commission to the Apostles included, "<u>proclaim the gospel</u>", "<u>teaching to observe all that I have commanded</u>", and "<u>all authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me</u>" – these phrases explain what Jesus meant many days before when he identified himself as "The Rock" (Mt16:18-19, 1Cr3:11,Rm5:10, Hb8:1, 7:25, Rv3:7b). The <u>understanding of Jesus' teaching</u> is only available through the indwelling of the Holy Spirt, which combined with <u>Jesus' intersession</u> are "<u>the keys of the kingdom</u>".

<u>The Good Shepherd</u>: The context of John chapter ten is a disputation with some Pharisees who were very familiar with the prophecy (Ez34:11-12,14a,15). The Pharisees recognized that <u>Jesus was saying that he was YHWH</u>, and that salvation was only available through himself (Jh10:7-9,11-12a,14-15). They also recognized that he called them "thieves and robbers".

<u>The Rest of the Great Commission</u>: Jesus is clear and specific that "<u>Christians</u>" comprise his "<u>flock</u>" (Jh10:27-28, Lk12:32). Jesus' last instructions to the Apostles informed them of the most important part of their work with Jesus' flock (Jh21:15-17). Jesus ties "<u>love for him</u>" with "<u>tending his flock</u>". The external work of the Church is to "preach the gospel", to reach out into the world with Jesus' message; but <u>the internal work</u> is to "feed the flock", to ensure that <u>Christians are being fed on the words of Jesus Christ</u>, the Bible. Today, we cannot teach the world; we can only fulfill the Olivet Prophecy (Mk13:10, Mt24:14). <u>Jesus' sacrifice was for all humanity</u> – in the World Tomorrow the "<u>flock</u>" will extend to <u>all human beings</u> (Jh3:16-17, 1Jh4:14). <u>Our calling is to prepare to feed that flock</u>!

Jesus Christ is "The Rock", the foundation of the New Testament Church. The objective of the Church is the <a href="eradication of "death" through the "resurrection of the dead": a transformation of perishable physical flesh into an immortal spiritual body. Jesus' resurrection is the objective proof of God's ability to accomplish this. After his resurrection, Jesus was careful to ensure many people were eyewitness to his death and resurrection; this knowledge combine with the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit empowered these people to be "Jesus' witnesses" to build the New Testament Church. The Church has a two-fold commission: preach the gospel and feed the flock. Jesus affirms that loving him is demonstrated by feeding his flock. Jesus, himself, is the "Good Shepherd"; our calling is to prepare to feed all humanity: Jesus' growing flock in the World Tomorrow.
