

I am so proud of our efforts towards expanding literacy in our state. Our donations are four times over last year and our in-kind donation have also increased.


Thank you to all of you for your great ideas, hard work and dedication to GFWC, our State, your clubs and communities. You are all shining examples of teamwork and commitment.




Eye Gaze

GFWC Women's History and Resource Center: Federation Day, April 24
The quality of an organization is determined by its leadership.

The history of the General Federation of Women's Clubs is a storied pattern of clubwomen who labored through the years to establish clubs, to envision their possibilities, and to bring these visions to fruition. The organization of the General Federation in 1890, was the banding together of women's clubs which had been in existence for many years. At the invitation of Jane Cunningham Croly, women came from the North, South, East and West, for a three-day ratification convention, April 23-25. With the adoption of the Constitution on April 24, 1890, the General Federation of Women's Clubs was born.

Today, clubs are encouraged to celebrate April 24, as Federation Day. Do you need an idea for 2025?

1. Use Federation Day as an opportunity to inform your community about GFWC history and its impact on women's history.
2. Research and write/update the history of your clubhouse.
3. Support GFWC with a donation to the 1734 Society. All donations to this fund go to support improvements to the historic GFWC Headquarters building.
4. Ask members to share their favorite GFWC service project.
5. Coordinate a donation drive for a local shelter, food pantry or women's shelter.
6. Have a "Did You Know?" quiz at the April meeting. Use historical facts of GFWC.

GFWC's Measles Mission with Shot@Life

GFWC-AZ is well on its way to raising \$1600.00 to do our part in raising \$80,000, the total goal for GFWC and Shot@Life. So far in the 2024-2026 project Arizona has raised **\$870**, we are ranked 5th nationwide. By raising \$80,000 during 2024-2026, clubwomen will be protecting 16,000 children from measles.

In the News: Do you need a measles booster? Here's what experts say

Measles cases are popping up across the US, especially in areas with lower vaccination rates. Experts say it's a good time for everyone to [think about their immunity to the virus](#)

There were 285 cases reported in the US last year. And cases have already emerged in 2025: Two cases of measles were detected in [metro Atlanta](#) last week; this week, one case was confirmed in [New Mexico](#), and an outbreak in [West Texas](#) is growing, with [24 cases](#), according to the state health department. Cases have also been identified in Alaska, Rhode Island and New York City.





The Tucson Woman's Club

Ronald McDonald House invites groups to supply and prepare nutritious meals for their guests. With the Chef for a Day program, each meal prepared by volunteers, helps the Ronald McDonald House reduce their expenses by \$500-1,000. On October 24, 2024, six TWC members arrived with groceries in hand and prepared a nutritious meal for 40 guests. In just 2 hours, we created a large fruit bowl and green salad, paired with chicken tetrazzini, garlic toast and black forest cake for dessert! Start to finish, this project reported 35 volunteer hours. Seeing tired, emotionally exhausted families arrive for dinner and find a delicious home cooked meal already prepared, hot and ready to eat was a truly rewarding experience!

Veterans Rescue Mission Walk-a-Thon was held on Veterans Day weekend (November 9, 10, 11) to raise awareness for Homeless Veterans living on the streets of Tucson. Over 25% of the homeless are veterans, 40% homeless veterans are from broken homes, 46% become drug addicted after becoming homeless, 22 Veterans commit suicide each day! Our mission was to engage the homeless and offer assistance and hand out hygiene bags on behalf of the Veterans Rescue Mission.

Three TWC members participated in the actual walk, while others members assisted with camp set-ups. With our backpacks full of outreach bags, we began our walk at the Veterans Rescue Mission. We walked along railroad tracks and into the tunnels where the homeless set up camps and lived unprotected from the elements. Walking 18 miles, we set up camp at Zion City Church parking lot on Ruthrauff. After dinner we slept in tents unprotected as many homeless do.

Walking 14.5 miles the 2nd day, stopping at Bethel Baptist Church off Plummer Ave. We slept inside to experience what it felt like to be in a shelter. The final day we had only 5.5 miles to reach our destination at the VA. With the mission complete. We had spent three days living on the streets of Tucson, walking 38 miles, engaging multiple groups of homeless people offering assistance and searching for Veterans in need of assistance. There is so much more work to be done to assist those who have served our country!



Valentine Card for Veterans Done in a Day workshop was held on February 5th. Eight TWC women created 50+ red, white and blue Valentine cards thanking Veterans for their service. Three club members designed and prepared card kits in advance. The day of the 2 hour workshop, the ladies assembled and personalized each card with a sentiment. Cards were delivered to the V A Hospital on 6th Avenue on February 11th, just in time to be delivered to veterans in the hospital on Valentine's Day! The volunteers at the hospital were thrilled to have these homemade cards to deliver to patients on a special day. All they had to do was add a name on the envelope and inside the card!

Rock Painting Done-In-A-Day workshop was held October 23, 2024 for Banner Pediatric Cancer Center. Twelve ladies gathered to paint rocks for the children. They painted 70 rocks with positive messages or pictures to encourage smiles. It was reported that the children were really excited to receive the rocks! This project reported 32 volunteer hours and \$51.00 for In-Kind donations.

Massing of the Colors was hosted by **The Tucson Woman’s Club** on November 3, 2024. This is a free, annual and open to the public. TWC donates the use of the auditorium and stage for this honorary event.

Massing of the Colors is a patriotic ceremony to honor the American Flag and those who have served our country in the armed services. Many Color Guard Units and other patriotic organizations present their flags, distinguished speakers are present to honor our servicemen and women. The stage was filled with an orchestra and soloists that performed military songs. There were also various presentations.

Tucson Woman’s Club was presented with a prestigious award! Lt. Col (Retired) Marlon Ruiz, USAF presented “The Bronze Patrick Henry Organizational Award” to TWC for their unwavering dedication to the ideals of the Military Order of the World Wars and for providing the ceremonial event venue for many years, helping to cultivate cherished memories and honor those who served.

Part of the fun of the project is delivering the items to Ronald McDonald House and getting a picture with Ronald. Mikay Wright & Dianne with Ronald.





NOGALES WOMAN'S CLUB





The First Ladies

by Marie Benedict & Christopher Murray



This book is a good blend of Women's History (March is Women's History Month) and Black History (February was Black History Month). Marie Benedict has made her writing career highlighting women who need to be written about. She really does her research, and makes her characters come to life. She is also an easy read and very accessible.

This novel is about the extraordinary partnership between First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt and civil rights activist Mary McLeod Bethune—an unlikely friendship that changed the world, from the *New York Times* bestselling authors of the *Good Morning America*, Book Club pick *The Personal Librarian*.

Eleanor Roosevelt is a name that many of us have grown up with. After her husband's death she represented the US at the United Nations. She was also a member of the Chautauqua Woman's Club. She spoke at the Convention of the General Federation.


Mary McLeod Bethune, the daughter of formerly enslaved parents, refuses to back down as white supremacists attempt to thwart her work. She marches on as an activist and an educator, and as her reputation grows, she becomes a celebrity, revered by titans of business and recognized by U.S. Presidents. Eleanor Roosevelt herself is awestruck and eager to make her acquaintance. Initially drawn together because of their shared belief in women's rights and the power of education, Mary and Eleanor become fast friends confiding their secrets, hopes and dreams—and holding each other's hands through tragedy and triumph.

This is the story of two different, yet equally formidable, passionate, and committed women, and the way in which their singular friendship helped form the foundation for the modern civil rights movement.

This was a great read and the hope is that you will pick it up and enjoy it, too.

Christina Dodd takes on a magical journey to the fair city of Verona and gives us a glimpse of the raucous world that *Romeo and Juliette* and their family have created for themselves. This book is absolutely delightful. The quasi-Shakespearean language takes you into the story spinning. If you are looking for something truly different, this is a charmer. If you had Shakespeare 101 in college you will wish he had written this story.

Once upon a time a young couple met and fell in love. You probably know that story, and how it ended (hint: badly). Only here's the thing: That's not how it ended at all.

Romeo and Juliet are alive and well and the parents of seven kids. I'm the oldest, Rosie Montague, named for Roseline of course, with the emphasis on 'old'—a certified spinster at twenty, and happy to stay that way. It's not easy to keep your taste for romance with parents like mine. Picture it—constant monologues, passionate declarations, fighting, making up, making out . . . it's exhausting.

Each time they've presented me with a betrothal, I've set out to find the groom-to-be a more suitable bride. After all, someone sensible needs to stay home and manage this household. But their latest match, Duke Stephano, isn't so easy to palm off on anyone else. The debaucher has had three previous wives—all of whom met unfortunate ends. Conscience forbids me from consigning another woman to that fate. As it turns out, I don't have to . . .

At our betrothal ball—where, quite by accident, I meet a beautiful young man who makes me wonder if perhaps there is something to love at first sight—I stumble upon Duke Stephano with a dagger in his chest. But who killed him? His late wives' families, his relatives, his mistress, his servants—half of Verona had motive. And when everyone around the Duke begins dying, disappearing, or descending into madness, I know I must uncover the killer . . . before death lies on me like an untimely frost.

This promises to be a quick 305-page read with you giggling most of the way.
