A 17 YEAR NAP?

On Saturday October 28, 2000, a garage tour was arranged to wake up John & Jo Wurster's 1931 Station Wagon which had not been started for at least 17 years. All the willing hands started to arrive at the scheduled time of 1:00 PM. The deal was no lunch till the car started so we had an incentive to be fast and right on the first try, and we were hungry. The Dobbins, Bob & JoAnn arrived first with Tony and Jim Bechtel riding in the 31 Coupe right behind. Helen and Janette Carr followed in an AIR CONDITIONED van. Bill Parker was behind in his 30 Sport Coupe. Then came Dick Rust followed by Corrine and Nancy. While the ladies set up the tables and chairs in the spacious 2 CAR GARAGE, the fellows rolled up their sleeves.


First Bob Dobbins laid out his assortment of tools and about that time Bob & Mary Nobbs arrived in their 31 Deluxe Phaeton bringing up a total of 12 helpers and of course John and Jo. Up went the hood and the spark plugs were removed and cleaned. Out came the floor mat and floor boards, at the same time WD 40 was sprayed liberally into each cylinder, while this was happening, the old battery was removed and a new one installed. You have to remember we were hungry! This was like a scene from the assembly line at Ford Rouge. The glass filter bowl was removed and yuk! The bottom of the bowl had ½ inch of a gooey substance that used to be gasoline in the bottom of the bowl. This caused some concern that the tank might be in the same condition. Off came the carburetor and sludge in the bowl, but not to worry we brought along a rebuilt one to exchange. The gas lines from the gas tank were removed and cleaned out while the new carburetor was installed along with the spark plugs, after it was determined the engine was free. Someone was under the car changing the oil as this was all going on. Water was put into the radiator but no one could get the gas cap off till Bob Nobbs spoke sweetly to the cap and off it came. We checked everything out and because the car had a Mallory distributor we left it alone.

We told the ladies that the garage door would have to be closed. The car was outside and the ladies were inside and we didn't know what might fly out of the exhaust once the car started. We put about ½ gallon of gas into the tank and crossed our fingers. There is no spark lever connection to the Mallory so the throttle was pulled down and hit the starter and, WE EAT. MARC OF FASHION

Scarfs That You Can Make Between Tea And Dinner

While doing research for the Fashion Guidelines, an article on scarfs came to our attention. After making one, we thought you might also enjoy these patterns. They were found in Vogue, August 1, 1931 issue.

The whole trick of making these scarfs is in the cut. Some have no seams at all. Even if you have never put a thread through a needle, you can make these in no time. You simply lay the fabric on a flat surface and follow the proportions suggested by the diagram accompanying each picture. The edges of the scarfs may be picoted or, if you have the patience, you may hand roll them or make tiny hems. When there is a seam or a dart, you could have it hemstiched and cut away to form a picot edge, after which you could hand whip the edges to add firmness. Seams or darts may be stitched very close to the edge and the few raw edges whipped with close stitches.

Two patterns had the mathematical proportions, the other two didn't. One we couldn't read so it will not be included in this article but will come later if we can figure it out. These pages include mathematical proportions for the bolero-like and V-shaped scarfs. These proportions will give you relative dimensions for the other or, if you are clever with needle and scissors, you may invent all sorts of new ideas of your own.

1 Yard 11/4 Yards 1% Yards

This is the scarf we made. It has a hole to put your arm through. It turned out to be a dashing bolero. Practically any evening material would be smart, except lace. A printed chiffon over a plain chiffon dress was suggested.

These mathematical proportions are for this scarf and suggest proportions for the others.

It's really quite a fascinating pastime, making scarfs. A length or two of fabric (lace, chiffon, crepe or velvet will suffice).

Scarfs camouflage out of date necklines, disguise if you are a shade thicker or thinner than you want to be, or bestow a little warmth when a draft blows. Alternate them and your dress will have a couple of smart aliases. Hope you enjoy



This scarf hangs in a point at the front of the bodice, forms little capes over the shoulders to be knotted at the base of the back where it may be held in place by a clip or can hang loose.

Only 1-1/4 yards of yard-wide material is needed. There is only one seam in this scarf.

Mike Vetetta's Tech Tips

(from the Columbia Crier)

Dirty Spark Plugs:

When spark plugs are dirty, they demand a really good cleaning. You can take care of the job yourself by buying a bottle of household ammonia. Simply soak the plugs and they will emerge cleaner than sandblasted ones. The ammonia loosens the deposits and floats them away.

Driveway Cleaner:

A very effective and economical driveway degreaser is ordinary laundry spot degreaser, such as SPRAY N WASH or SHOUT. Spray it on the wet oil spot. After waiting about 30 seconds wash it off with water. For touch stains, brush the detergent into the spot and then hose it off.

SPRING TUNE-UP: MODEL "A" THINGS TO LUBRICATE:

(from the "Chatter" Calumet Region of MARC newsletter, June 2006)

- 1. Horn (light weight oil only)
- 2. Hood hook springs (regular weight oil)
- 3. Hood Hinges (spray type oil*)
- 4. Door hinges (spray type oil*)
- 5. Door latch parts (spray type oil*)
- 6. Accelerator cross shaft bearings (regular oil)
- 7. Accelerator linkage ends (regular oil)
- 8. Carburetor shafts (regular oil)
- 9. Distributor linkage ends (regular oil)
- 10. Brake rod ends (clean with spray brake cleaner then oil with 600 wt. Oil)
- 11. Front and rear leaf springs (spray type oil)
- 12. Trunion on clutch (600 wt oil)
- 13. Clutch release arm shaft (regular oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 14. Clutch trunion rod clevis pins (600 wt. Oil)
- 15. Clutch and brake pedal shaft bushings (regular oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 16. Brake cross shaft bushings (regular oil)
- 17. Brake pedal to cross shaft clevis pins (600 wt. Oil)
- 18. Emergency brake clevis pins (600 wt. Oil)
- 19. Emergency brake cross shaft bushings on 1930-31 small shaft (600 wt. oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 20. Emergency brake shafts in backing plates (regular oil)
- 21. Whenever brake drums are off, oil emergency brake shaft on inside of backing plate
- 22. Whenever front or rear brake drums are off, wash everything with brake cleaner then wipe all moving mechanical parts with white lithium grease
- 23. Spray levers inside car (light film of Vaseline)
- 24. Upper steering column brushing (regular oil)
- 25. Windshield wiper (regular oil for electrics, pneumatic oil for vacuum types)
