Deep plowing of the topsoil of the Great Plains during the previous decade had displaced the native, grasses that normally trapped soil Rapid mechanization especially small gasoline tractors significantly impacted decisions to convert arid grassland to cultivated cropland.

The unanchored soil turned to dust that the winds blew away in clouds These choking billows of dust reached such East Coast cities as New York City and Washington, D.C. and often reduced visibility to a yard or less.

News from the Model A Museum

Exciting progress continues to be made at the museum, with the pending arrival of a Pietenpol airplane and the latter stages of construction of our new neighbors, the Lincoln and Cadillac-LaSalle Musuems.

As many of you know, in the 1920s, Bernard Pietenpol, a self-taught aircraft designer from Minnesota, developed a single seat airplane called the Sky Scout and a larger two-seater called the Air Camper. Recently a Sky Scout was donated to the Model A Ford Museum. The plane is powered by a Model A Ford engine. The plane is now in a fabrication shop where the support structures are being fabricated. The plane will be elevated so that floor space is preserved, but it will be positioned so that the Model A engine is prominently displayed. The plane will be on display in the museum during Model A Day at Gilmore in Hickory Corners, MI on September 20, 2014.

At the recent MARC Membership Meet in St Louis, the Central Kentucky Region presented MAFFI with a check for \$10,000 for the Endowment Fund, giving that fund a large boost. With the summer national meets taking place in French Lick and Puyallup there will be other exciting events. One of the first cars donated to MAFFI was a fordor sedan donated by Ron Jennings of Boise, Idaho. The Evergreen Club of Seattle has performed a complete body-off restoration and the car will be presented to MAFFI at the Puyallup meet. What an exciting day that will be!

"A" Fashions for Men

1928 - 29

In order to help some of our members to locate men's clothes appropriate for the 1928-29 model cars, here are more samples of men's styles of that period.



At left: Two-button single breasted model with long peaked shaped lapels. The front of coat is slightly rounded at the bottom, and the sleeves are of the proper width and are finished with two buttons at cuff. A young men's model of exceptional design, Highcut shoulders with full chest effect.


At right: Young men's model with just the right cut. It has three buttons with medium width long rolling lapels. The front is slightly cut away at the bottom. It has that high broad shoulder and full chest effect, tapering to the waist, which is so popular with young men.

TROUSER STYLES

At left: the narrow straight style trousers with regular belt loops, hip pockets to button and permanent 1½-inch cuff bottoms. Average width, 17 to 20 inches at knee and 14½ to 16½ inches at bottom.

Center: Knickerbocker style trousers. They are medium full cut with regular belt loops and a hip pockets to button. Bottoms finished with strap and buckle which permit adjusting.

At right: Full cut lounge trousers, made with regular belt loops, hip pockets to button and cuff bottoms. Average width 18½ to 20 inches at knee and 16½ to 18½ inches at bottom.

Here's a partial list: Mall and church car shows, parties in club member's homes, mystery tours, scavenger hunts, square dances, hay rides, hobo parties, a weekend at Pirate's Cove, a trip to Ormond Beach near Daytona for The Turkey Run- Poker Runs, Funcanna games and parties for every holiday, to name a few! What wonderful memories she recounted-even some tales of Model A mechanical problems, but all pitched in to help when those happened. Tony sat in on the interview, and soon produced a group of binders containing every Oogah Blast from the very first issue, in 1968! The amazing story of the "Blast" will be a subject for another article for a future printing.



At 7:30 in the morning,

Checking your Horn

Ahaoooogh or just Ahg


Has your horn gotten the flu? Here are a couple of easy things to do to make things better without getting a flu shot.

Remove the motor cover and take a piece of fine sand paper (not emery cloth as this could

fig #1. Hold the piece of sand paper on the commutator and rotate by hand until clean and bright. Also clean the spaces between the commutator bars using a tooth pick. Check the brushes for

brushes for good contact. Put a couple of drops of oil on the bushing and make sure the wires and connect-







ions are clean. See Fig #2. Try the horn and readjust the tension screw. Fig #3.

This is usually all that is needed as a periodic tune up.

If this does not solve your problem try making jumper leads from the battery directly to the horn. This will eliminate all wiring and connections. If horn works correctly, you then need to check wires and connections from the battery to the horn.

If it still does not work or works poorly you will have to go deeper into the horn.
