The Margate Fourth of July Parade Report – by John Ford

It was one those days you dream about as a grandparent. I've got five grandkids age 7 thru 13. Three boys and two girls and they all live nearby. On the weekends they are always doing something - hockey, basketball, soccer, dance. Bobbie and I think their parents just want to get them out of the house so that they'll be too busy or too tired to fight when home. Our nine year old granddaughter told us not long ago "with all our schoolwork and activities we don't have much time to really relax". I don't remember having that problem when I was their age.

Occasionally though one or two of them gets to spend a weekend night at our house. The youngest, seven year old Joaquin, is my Model A buddy having helped me numerous times while working on it. Since he is the youngest he's the least busy of them and often stays at our house Friday night, which at his request, has become "sushi night". The sushi bar chefs at our local Japanese restaurant even know his name, what he orders and are always amazed such a little kid can eat three adult size sushi rolls – one salmon, one tuna and one escolar.

When I got my A about two years ago I had visions of driving it in parades with our grandkids who would throw candy out the window to the kids along the parade route. It was disappointing to learn there aren't that many parades in our area and, when they did occur, it seemed like we were always out of town or had something else scheduled. Well, this past July everything came together. Joaquin could spend the night before the Margate parade, and he was free the next morning. So we loaded up a Publix shopping cart with large bags of mini candy bars, little boxes of jelly beans, tootsie rolls and whatever else looked good and throwable to my candy monster.

The next morning we got my 31 Town Sedan out and ready to roll. Joaquin helped me mount a small American flag at each corner of the front and rear bumpers. We then turned on the gas, rolled down all the windows, and dumped the bags of candy into two large plastic bins, one for the front and one for the back. The idea was to have our ammunition ready for a quick grab and toss. He had the whole back seat to himself so he could fire at will from both sides.

The ride down to Margate on 441 was amazing. Of the twenty plus traffic lights we went through on the 15 mile drive south, every one was green except for one! That's never happened before. All along the way we tooted the oogah horn and waved to anybody walking and got back lots of waves and thumbs up. Along the way we had to stop for gas and adjust one of the flags that was about to come off. Wouldn't you know it, that made us just a bit late; the parade had just started. Fortunately Margate Blvd. is divided with a tree lined median in the middle. The parade was east bound so we were able to drive down the west bound side until we found the other A's from our club. Tony was leading them in his red coupe, followed by three generations of Lacava's in their Tudor and Harold Feinberg in one of his Roadsters. Tony motioned for me get front of him. Joaquin and I with all four flags blowing in the wind suddenly became the proud leader of the A's. I haven't had so much fun in a long time. Candy was now flying out both sides. When I wasn't tooting my left side oogah horn, I playing patriotic songs with my computorized oogah horn on the right. What a blast we had. I expected maybe one or two hundred spectators would be there. Instead, there were thousands, many of whom cheered as we drove by with our flags and patriot songs. Everybody likes an old car. And we have some of the best.

By the end of the parade we had run out of candy. I'm guessing 20 lbs went out the windows. Every kid was thrilled if a piece landed near their feet. As they picked the candy up they would all flash victorious smiles as they looked up at their parents who were smiling also. It was a great day for both of us, one neither of us will ever forget. Report of the LaVergne's visit to the Model A Museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan

While on vacation in Michigan Mary Louise and I visited several Automobile Museums: the new Model A Ford Museum, the Gilmore Auto Museum in Michigan and the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum in Auburn, Indiana. This is a brief review what we saw at the Model A Ford Museum. Reviews of the other two museums will follow in the coming months.

The Model A Museum had its Grand Opening May 18, 2013. It's located inside the 90 acre farm of the Gilmore Auto Museum. The museum is fashioned after a 1928 Ford Dealership, is 12,000 sq ft in size and has over 30 vehicles.

The front show room had two vehicles: a 1931 Roadster that looked identical to Gene & Maryann Mueller's car they drove to Detroit for the National Model A show years ago. The other show room vehicle was a 1930 pickup.

Among the A's on display were: Fuel Truck; US Postal Delivery Truck; a 400A; 1929 Phaeton; Slant

Window Sport Coupe; an early Model A before the Model T; Thomas Edison's Model A #1 & other Model A vehicles.

Also in the museum were a cut away chassis and a cut away motor (very interesting display); Clothing Display of period clothes and items; an old school room of the period with a yellow school bus and a Parts and Service Department displaying all kinds of items.

Five Million Model A's were manufactured in over 35 Assembly Plants in over 30 states. An interesting fact.

It was a very interesting museum that we heard about years ago that was going to be built. We are glad we were able to visit it. The Gilmore Auto Museum is located near Kalamazoo, Michigan. If you are in the area take time to visit this Museum.

A LESSON LEARNED

In December, 2010, when a decision was made to restore "Henrietta," Bill's 1929 Model "A" which had resided in his garage (in pieces) for so many years, I was excited! I had, you might say, expectations! I expected a good restoration, since Bill had taken care to preserve so many of her parts, and my son-in-law was an experienced restorer.

I also expected to have lots of fun, dressing up in clothing to match the paint job (black and yellow!). I was looking forward to riding around with the roadster top down, sporting a sunbonnet with a huge sunflower on it. The hat had been a present from my son and his family for me to wear on the first day "Henrietta" took to the road. I was going to wave at passers-by, beep the oogah horn, greet the neighbors with a thumb's up. I was looking forward to Model "A" rides for the grandchildren, and maybe some shows or parades. I had plans and I had expectations. I have, indeed, enjoyed those things. But imagine my surprise when "Henrietta" taught me some different lessons that I did not expect. Despite the fun she brings to Bill and me, "Henrietta" and all A's are like missionaries of happiness, bringing joy everywhere they go, and that's no small thing!

In a world increasingly complex, the Model "A's" hark back to simpler times. They transport those who see them back in time to memories of family picnics, summer trips to the swimming hole, and Sunday afternoon rides in the country. At a time such as we live in, filled with ugly,

frightening news reports pouring out of our television sets, the "A's" bring periods of relief, time to forget about terrorist's plots, political intrigue, violence and strife in every corner of the globe. Many people who see these old cars tell their stories – stories of youthful joys, and memories of generations past. They tell their stories with real emotion, sometimes misty-eyed, sometimes with laughter, always with a note of nostalgia in their voice. Stories like these:

"My Dad let me borrow his Model "A" to take a girl to a prom." "I got to really know my grandfather as we worked on Gramp's "A" together." "My first job was making deliveries for a hardware store in a Model "A".

Some of the stories are hilarious; some are deeply touching and sentimental, like one story from an older lady, who told us, with a far-away look in her eyes, "My husband proposed to me in his Model 'A'." We're sure that each of you have your own remembrances, like these conversations, and love hearing them, as we do.

Our own favorite sentimental journey happened early one Saturday morning when we were out in the Model "A" looking for a breakfast place where we could enjoy a meal while keeping an eye on "Henrietta." We are still in that early stage of antique auto ownership in which we don't leave her unattended. Anyway, that's how we found Jukebox Diner on the north side of Atlantic in Pompano just before crossing the bridge over the Intracoastal. Its glass front and sidewalk café style tables allowed us to keep a close watch on our precious Henrietta.

We parked right up front, got out and headed for the entrance, when, to our surprise, the Jukebox owner, Bernadette Scollin, came right out to meet us. She was full of questions, smiles and excitement. Bernadette looked over the Model "A" from front bumper to rear bumper. She peeked inside, looked under the hood and asked to hear the oogah horn. Photos were taken and she gave "Henrietta" some oohs and ahhs. We then took Bernadette for a short ride round the block. When we got back she sent off an email with photos to her mom just before we went inside for a delicious breakfast of their Spinach, Feta and Tomato Omelets. Fabulous! Boy, did we ever stop at the right place! What a welcome by a total stranger.

Actually, it didn't take long to find out that with Bernadette and her business partner, Linda Herr, no one who comes into their restaurant remains a stranger for long. Opened in the Fall of 2011, this Jukebox Diner replaces the original one on A1A that was destroyed in Hurricane Wilma in 2005. The original staff and most of their customers came right along to the new location.

There are two wonderful sources of energy residing in the Jukebox Diner. The first source begins with the charm and genuine cordiality emanating from the staff as they serve tasty 1950's style food. It is enhanced by the entire décor and setting, from the Jukebox, which plays your selections free, (no need for quarters), to the wonderful assortment of posters, photos and memorabilia which carried us back to the '50's, whoosh – just like a time machine! It's a time trip of memories, sights, sounds, and images from an early era.

The other subtle energy in the room emanates from a small but powerful display of the shields from the helmet of Bernadette's father, NYFD Captain Tom Scollin, Engine #84 and Engine #62. He did not live to see the Diner reopened, but was always such a staunch supporter of his daughter. A notebook lies nearby, her tribute to him, and in it are signatures of dozens upon dozens of firemen who come here from all over, and are considered "family."

Before leaving, we just had to ask Bernadette why she reacted as she did when we pulled up in "Henrietta." She mentioned her memory of a little model antique car her father always kept on a shelf. Our "A" brought back nostalgic thoughts and memories. Then she gave us a simple comparison that made perfect sense. "The food, the posters, photos, and décor in our diner, along with the 50's Jukebox music carries people back to a simpler, sweeter, happier time, a time that we often refer to as "the good old days." Spending an hour or so here brings a sense of joy and connections to those days, and your wonderful old Model "A" does the same. She brings joy everywhere she goes, and she does it very well." As we left, a group of other Jukebox patrons followed us out to look her over, asking questions, taking pictures and telling their own stories.

It's another lesson from "Henrietta" about the joy of sharing, making connections and enjoying the gift of precious memories.

MIKE VITETTA'S TECH TIPS (from the Columbia Crier)

Dirty Spark Plugs:

When spark plugs are dirty, they demand a really good cleaning. You can take care of the job yourself by buying a bottle of household ammonia. Simply soak the plugs and they will emerge cleaner than sandblasted ones. The ammonia loosens the deposits and floats them away.

Driveway Cleaner:

A very effective and economical driveway degreaser is ordinary laundry spot degreaser, such as SPRAY N WASH or SHOUT. Spray it on the wet oil spot. After waiting about 30 seconds wash it off with water. For touch stains, brush the detergent into the spot and then hose it off.

SPRING TUNE-UP (from the "Chatter" Calumet Region of MARC newsletter, June 2006)

MODEL "A" THINGS TO LUBRICATE:

- 1. Horn (light weight oil only)
- 2. Hood hook springs (regular weight oil)
- 3. Hood Hinges (spray type oil*)
- 4. Door hinges (spray type oil*)
- 5. Door latch parts (spray type oil*)
- 6. Accelerator cross shaft bearings (regular oil)
- 7. Accelerator linkage ends (regular oil)
- 8. Carburetor shafts (regular oil)
- 9. Distributor linkage ends (regular oil)
- 10. Brake rod ends (clean with spray brake cleaner then oil with 600 wt. Oil)
- 11. Front and rear leaf springs (spray type oil)
- 12. Trunion on clutch (600 wt oil)
- 13. Clutch release arm shaft (regular oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 14. Clutch trunion rod clevis pins (600 wt. Oil)
- 15. Clutch and brake pedal shaft bushings (regular oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 16. Brake cross shaft bushings (regular oil)
- 17. Brake pedal to cross shaft clevis pins (600 wt. Oil)
- 18. Emergency brake clevis pins (600 wt. Oil)
- 19. Emergency brake cross shaft bushings on 1930-31 small shaft (600 wt. oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 20. Emergency brake shafts in backing plates (regular oil)
- 21. Whenever brake drums are off, oil emergency brake shaft on inside of backing plate
- 22. Whenever front or rear brake drums are off, wash everything with brake cleaner then wipe all moving mechanical parts with white lithium grease
- 23. Spray levers inside car (light film of Vaseline)
- 24. Upper steering column brushing (regular oil)
- 25. Windshield wiper (regular oil for electrics, pneumatic oil for vacuum types)

The coat dress and suit were extremely popular during the autumn and winter seasons of 1930-31.

Both coats and dresses were fastened at the waistline with the coat length the same as the average dress or suit about mid-calf.

The sport coat usually had a straight line look, raglan cut sleeves, double breasted, with a wraparound effect from the waist to the hemline.

The "Silhouette" look in dresses was interrupted by tunics, tiers, drapery and the wraparound skirt.

Everything from sports clothes to evening wear seemed to have one thing in common, the wide use of the scarf. The popularity of the scarf was greatly influenced by the immortal torch singer of the "'A' Era," Helen Morgan. It was her trademark.

"A" Fashions for Men

Spring and Fall, 1928

Unlike women's fashions, the styles for men's clothes changed very little during the Model "A" era. Here are a few samples from a Sears catalog. Note the attractive women's bathing suit styles for that period.



THE PRINCETON

New three-button single breasted model with the latest cut lapels and collar. The front is rounded at the bottom. It is easy fitting and designed to give its wearer the high shoulder, full chest and tapering waist demanded by good dressers. Sleeves are finished with two buttons at cuff.

THE RIDGEMOOR

Conservative two-button single breasted model with long lapels. The front is slightly cut away at the bottom. This model changes but very little from season to season and is worn by many good dressers.



THE COLUMBIA

Medium fitting two-button patch pocket model, especially designed for the young man. The lapels are wide and long. The front is rounded at the bottom. The shoulders are highcut to give its wearer that high shoulder and full chest effect which young men desire.

THE LANE

Straight front two-button single breasted model with semi-cloverleaf shaped lapels. The lapels are good width and length. This is a decidedly straight front coat with blunt corners.
