
way we always seem to totally enjoy having a fantastic time being together with other Model A members. As it has been for a number of years, our Host and Hostess will be Jerry & Dorice



THE LADIES TAKE THE WHEEL

Part TWO of a THREE Part Series

PART 2, Current Lady members, but who have "retired" from driving their Model A's.

*ALVA ALEXANDER:

I met Alva for the first time at the gathering after Helen Spaich's funeral. I learned that her husband, Ted had a 1930 Two Door Sedan, then bought a 1928 convertible with a rumble seat for Alva to use. Ted taught her to shift and drive, and she found it easy and fun. When Alva was a school teacher in Margate, she found she could use the Model A's as "teaching tools". She gave her students a series of questions which they had to research about the cost of goods in the Model A years (1928 -1931). The students made posters showing the cost of gasoline, rent, milk, bread and other items. The posters were displayed in front of their Model A's at shows. It was a great learning experience for the students and led to Alva being "Teacher Of The Year". Alva and Ted are still members of GCMARC, though they have moved to The Villages and sold their Model A's Saying "The club up here is not like the club down there".

NOTE: Once Alva gave GWEN HAMMAR a Model A driving lesson. When I asked Gwen if she ever drove a Model A after that lesson, she said "There was a first time and the result was Jim got a "nervous tic" in his eye, so that was also the last time".!

*TRISH DAVIS:

When the Alexander's took Trish and Allen Davis for a ride in one of their Vehicles, they fell in love with Model A"s and knew they must have one! They found a 1931 Victoria and Alva taught Trish to drive it. Trish took an interest in the mechanical workings of Model A's and learned a great deal by going to garage tours. While Allen did the driving early on, Trish took over driving when Allen turned his attention to his progressing Parkinson's Disease. Trish has been a very active member of Gold Coast, arranging events such as the Founder's Day Parade, Model A rides for the elderly at St Andrews Estates and the Parkinson's Disease fund raiser at FAU. Trish is one of those people who is comfortable raising her hand to volunteer for jobs that an organization needs done. When our club treasurer, Dave Board finished his term of office this past Fall, Trish stepped up and became our new Treasurer. Trish sold her 1931 "Vickie" before Allen's passing in 2017.

*AUDRE FRANZ:

Audre loves antique cars. She and her siblings cried when their father sold the family Essex. There were no Model A's in her family until she met Ed Franz. Ed said "I'm not marrying anyone who doesn't drive"! Audre took that as a proposal. Ed taught her to drive a 1931 Deluxe Coupe which he had assembled from parts and pieces. When

Audre had a bit of trouble getting the A into reverse, they placed the car at a spot near a 200 foot drop off. A marker was laid down showing the edge of the cliff. It is not a surprise that Audre learned quickly to get the Model A into reverse to avoid the 200 foot drop! Audre has many memories and stories from "back in the day" and can recall the games, trips and parties from the origins of GCMARC. In addition, to her active club participation since 1976, she and her late husband Ed attended a "Boarder Meet" in Scandinavia where they drove a borrowed Model A on a 4-day tour. One interesting driving experience was when club members were invited to drive on the Pompano Beach race track. They were even allowed to stay and watch the race for free. Many years and many trophies later, Audre still owns the 1931 Deluxe Coupe, though she has turned over the driving to her gentleman, Dick Rust.



1928-1931 Era Slips

In 1928 - The bodice of the slip was usually straight across. Sometimes with draw string, but not always. Some were just plain, front and back were straight.

They also wore the u-neck, more for heavier frocks, or for everyday as they were more substantial and were good under winter clothing. They used many different materials, depending on the outer garment. The wider strap was usually preferred for the knit slips.

Lace would sometimes be added to the u-neck slips with little bows for a more feminine look. The straight necks tended


to have more feminine touches. They were worn with fancier dresses, some of which were sheer and others cut low enough tocatch a glimpse of the pretty lace and bows.

Sometimes backs were cut low to be worn with tea party, dressy, afternoon, and evening dresses. Also to accommodate sun dresses.

The straight bodice slips had more narrow straps and sometimes they had lace on the bottom as well as the top, with occasional ribbons. It added an air of femininity.

Some of the most desirable slips had bottoms with open slits usually in the back. (It was a covered opening where the materials

were enough to cover the slits.) It was referred to as wrap around. There were two openings in the back to accommodate sitting comfortably because some of the materials were rigid with no give in them, such as rayons, silks, and cottons. Walking was also less restrictive.



Some slips had permanent finishes of pongee to prevent clinging. Others were made of satinette or cotton taffeta. In 1929, they began to add more satin trims to their slips. Brassieres were minimized to accommodate the straight, flatter look. Some materials used were very thin. Especially in biased cut, summer, and evening dresses, so the material would flow more freely and have an airier look. This especially true in 1930-1931. More in the 30's.

They were also beginning to add the girdle effect, cut straight around the back, pointing downward in the front. It worked perfectly with the flowing dresses.



Materials used in our Era 1928-1931 could be any of these materials, which ever suited the occasion. Women tended to use plain cotton for their house dresses and still make use of them in the winter. They were warm and comfortable.

To mention most of the materials that were used first to refresh your memory, there were muslin, celanese, nylon, cotton, rayon, silk, voile, crepe de chine, georgette, crepe satin, satin, cotton pongee, and also plain taffeta.


By 1929, they had begun to add points to the neckline. By

1931they had full v-cut necklines, so the straight, less feminine look was starting to give way to a more feminine look and fit. Things were beginning to be more form fitting.

1928-1929 slips were a little bulky for 1930-1931. Ladies would restructure them as needed to be able to get more use out of them. They also added lace and whatever to make them more usable for their more modern dresses. Tan, ecru and black lace were more likely to be used.







In 1931 there were a very different style slips, called the pajama slips. It was to be worn under the pajama outfits. They became very popular in 1931. It was worn at home, out to dance, but was even more fashionable for the beach, usually paired with a large floppy hat for sun protection, but more as a fashion statement. One slip was known as the "Alberta Slip." It was cotton. It could expand because of the bias cut. It was very accommodating to the more voluptuous figure.



I have talked about different materials. Now I would like to make you ladies aware that our pattern project also has slip patterns that can be purchased along with your dress patterns. I was very happy to see we had them. So here are a couple examples of our slip and undergarment patterns. The numbers are listed on them.



All in all, even with the rain, it was a very good day and a very good show. There is no doubt that everyone is having a good time, check out the smiles




When the rain subsided everyone started moving around and began enjoying the Car Show.

Despite the threatening look of rain, 9 Model A's and 18 people found their way to Tradewinds Park today to get a lesson on steam engines and take a ride or three on








the train. Frank Lacava Jr and Carol Lawatsch even took a turn around the tracks. Whoo Hoo! or should I say Choo Choo.

- 6. Accelerator cross shaft bearings (regular oil)
- 7. Accelerator linkage ends (regular oil)
- 8. Carburetor shafts (regular oil)
- 9. Distributor linkage ends (regular oil)
- 10. Brake rod ends (clean with spray brake cleaner then oil with 600 w. Oil)
- 11. Front and rear leaf springs (spray type oil)
- 12. Trunnion on clutch (600w oil)
- 13. Clutch release arm shaft (regular oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 14. Clutch trunnion rod clevis pins (600 w. Oil)
- Clutch and brake pedal shaft bushings (regular oil where production grease fittings are absent)
- 16. Brake cross shaft bushings (regular oil)
- 17. Brake pedal to cross shaft clevis pins (600 w. Oil)
