MARC OF FASHION





Workwear

Workwear shirts were in coat, army, closed front or double breasted (fireman's) styles. Most had two button closure patch pockets on the breast, many with flaps. All or part wool were popular fabric choices; also flannel, broadcloth, suede, corduroy, and chambray, blue being the most popular. Other color choices included tans, grays, greens, reds and yellows of varying hues in checks, plaids and solids.

Trousers were all or part wool, corduroy, khaki twill, jean or denim, moleskin and ducks in dark colors of gray, blue, black, brown or medium olive drab and in stripes, twists, diagonal and solid patterns. In place of trousers, overalls or coveralls were also popular. Many had matching jackets. White back blue denim was widely used as was hickory stripe (Wabash) in black and gray or all white (painters). Overalls came in two styles, one with a continuous high back and a bib front or the low back style which had detachable suspenders.

Sturdy leather shoes or boots were worn in black, tan, chocolate or brown. Socks were more durable knits in wool or wool blends.

Crusher style hats were a popular headgear choice, also the engineer or judge style caps. The handkerchiefs were large squares of cotton, red, blue or a combination of both colors.

The underwear was the same as general wear.

No jewelry, except perhaps a watch, was required or appropriate for the working man. A knickerbocker suit was the common sportswear for golf, hiking or roughing it in general. Pieces consisted of plus-fours or slacks and a coat; some may have had a vest. Other pieces included a sports shirt with a soft convertible collar which could be worn with a knit cardigan, pullover or vest sweater. Generally popular for golf were slacks or knickers in tweed or linen in warm weather. White flannel or duck trousers were worn for tennis.

A driving/golf cap was the headgear choice.

Cuffed % length golf socks, usually of a pattern design, of wool or a wool blend, were worn with knickers or other durable knit socks appropriate for the sports event. For golf, shoes with cleats or sports type (wing tipped style) in the two-toned effect were popular. Tennis shoes were of duck or canvas; these were used also for boating. Hiking called for a sturdy leather shoe or boot.

Hunting or shooting ensembles were available, mostly in khaki or moleskin with colors in drab, tan, olive or dead grass. Many included matching coats, trousers and/or breeches and a vest. These had shell loops on the coats as well as the vests. The coats had pockets in between the lining and the outside for game. Boots with heavy woolen socks were worn or shoes with puttees with breeches. Hat or cap styles were dependent upon the sport. Some had red inner linings which could be converted to wear outside for deer hunting.



# TUNE UP & TUBE STEAK


### October 27th-a Day to Remember





All in all it was a great day with no mishaps or break-downs.







I believe this photo was taken around 1978. I know that the original owner who was a Doctor, used the car in his practice for many years before selling the car to my father in the early '60s. I've been researching the cars history. I'm currently looking for any photos showing the car when it crossed the Grace Memorial bridge, Cooper River Bridge, in August of 1929.

The phaeton was photographed originally and again in 1993 at the closing of the bridge. If anyone has old photos of Charleston with old cars I would like to see if I can find early photos that may have the phaeton in them. Thanks for your interest...Larry Buchan
