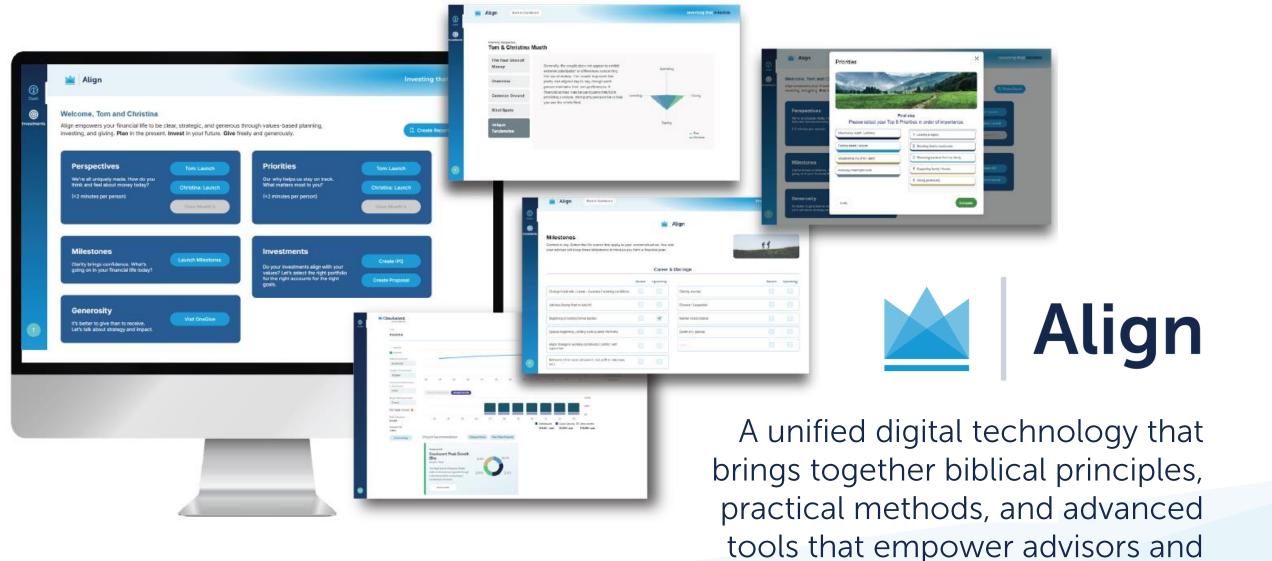

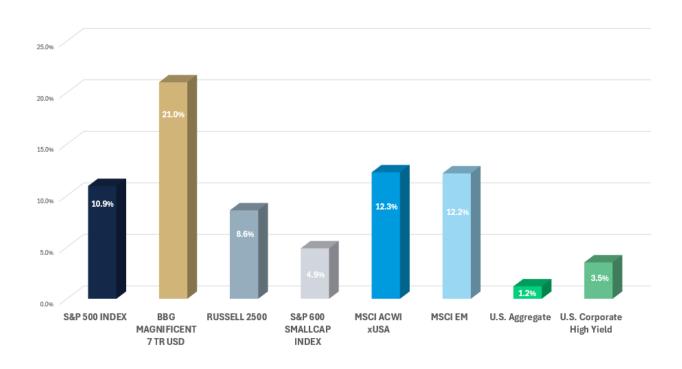

Second Quarter Investment Returns



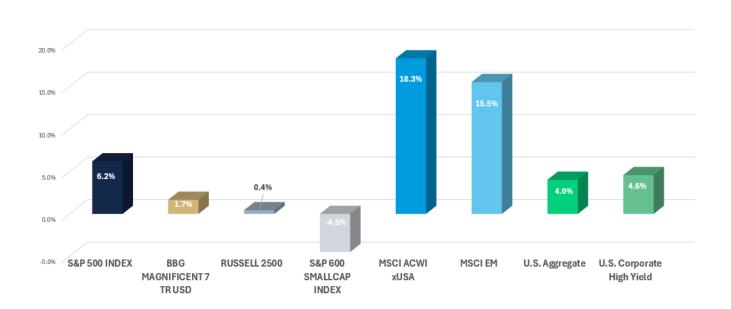
Second quarter returns showed a reversal from the 1st quarter:

- All market segments delivered positive returns
- International equities outperformed again
- Bonds posted positive returns due to lower rates
- Growth and technology snapped back (Mag-7)

Year-to-Date Investment Returns

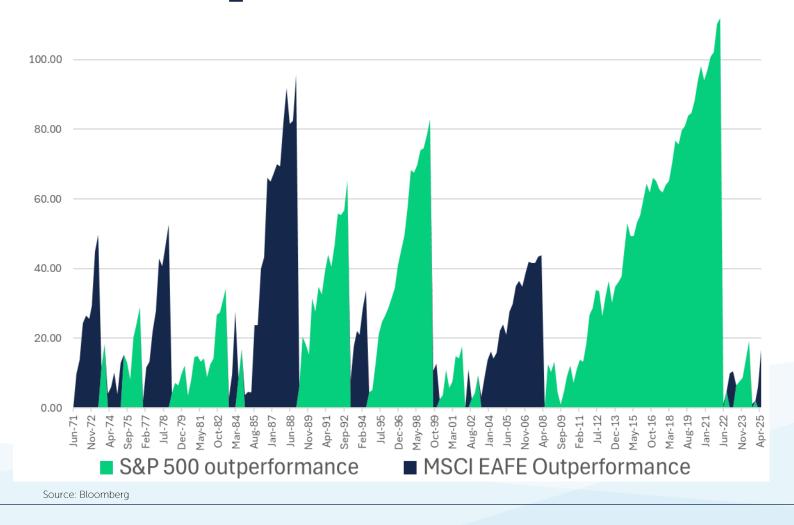


- ➤ International and emerging equities exhibiting strong relative performance

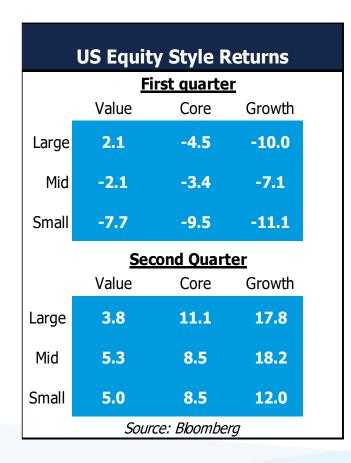


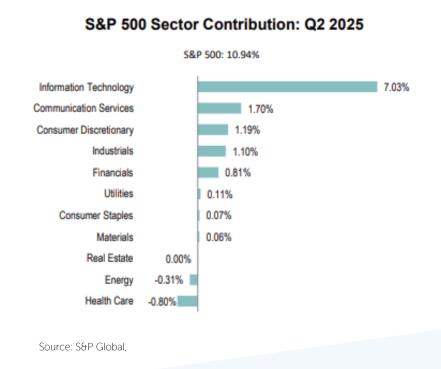
US exceptionalism may be waning – at least in market performance





Second Quarter performance: extreme style and sector reversal



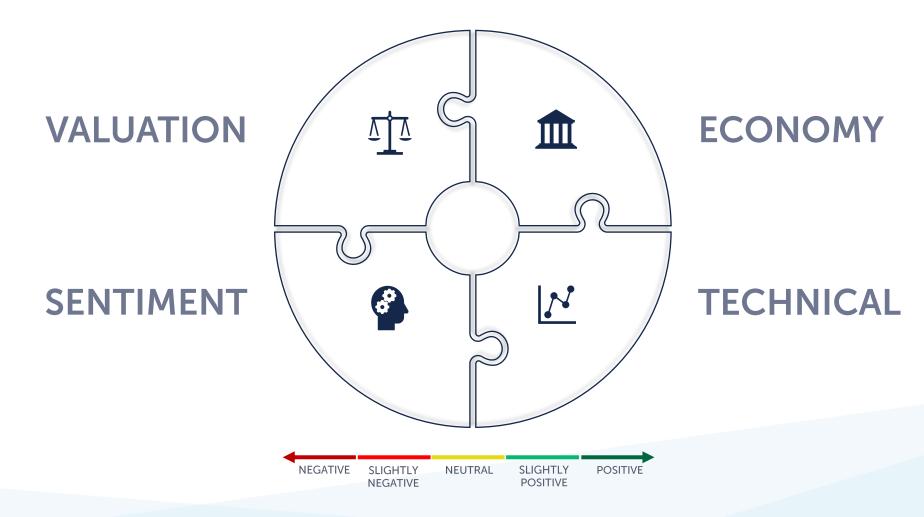


- ➤ Sector and style returns: tied at the hip

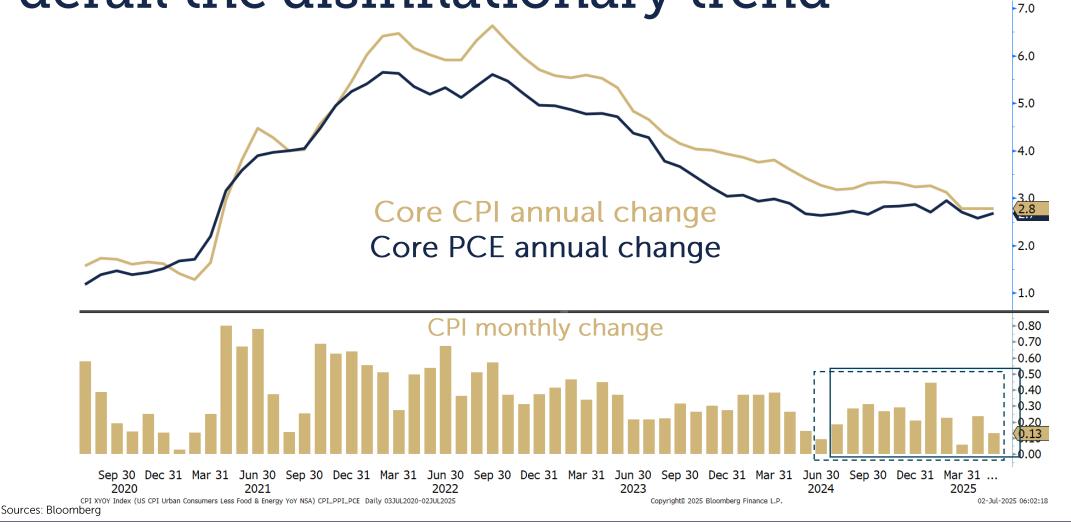

S&P 500 drawdowns and recoveries

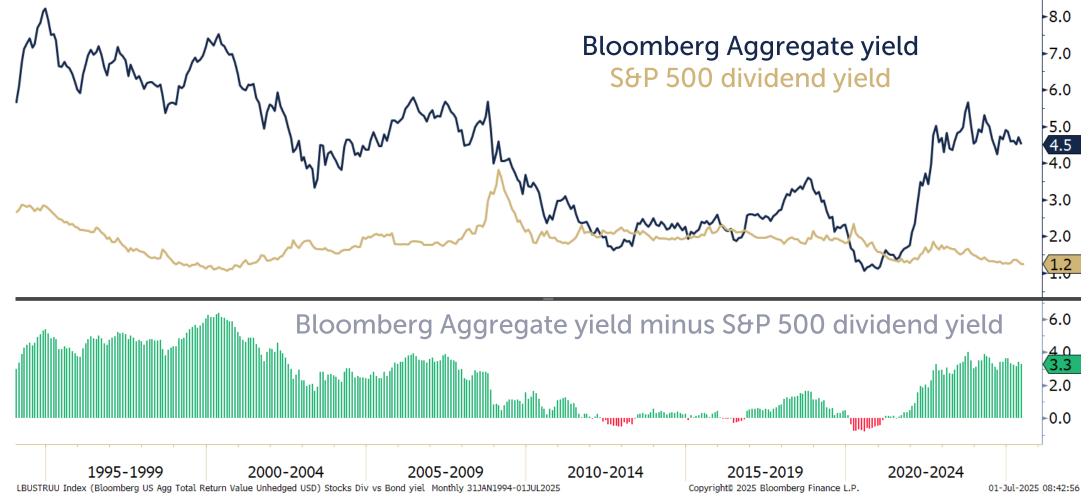

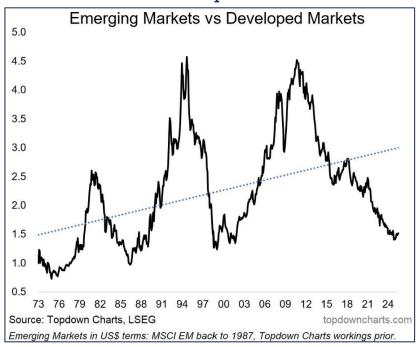

Emerging markets: Multi-decade discount

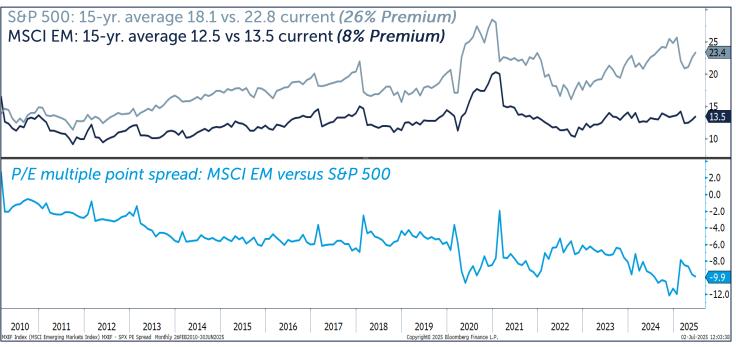


Multi-decade relative performance

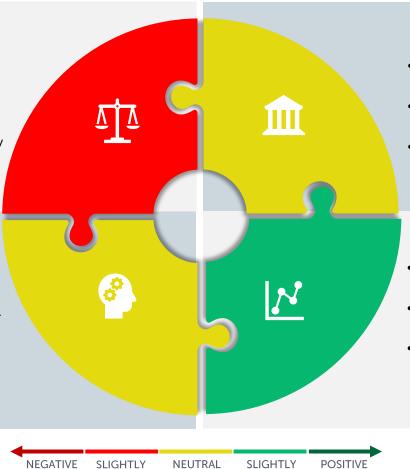
Navigator Outlook: July 2025

VALUATION

- Bond yields remain compelling as dividend yields continue to decline.
- Emerging markets are trading at a multidecade discount relative to the S&P 500.
- S&P Equal Weight remains far more reasonably valued than the cap-weighted S&P 500.

SENTIMENT

- Federal Reserve sentiment remains neutral despite expectations for 2 cuts in 2025.
- AAII investor sentiment has returned to neutral levels.
- Surge in high-risk trading as leveraged ETF's and ODTE Options hit new highs.

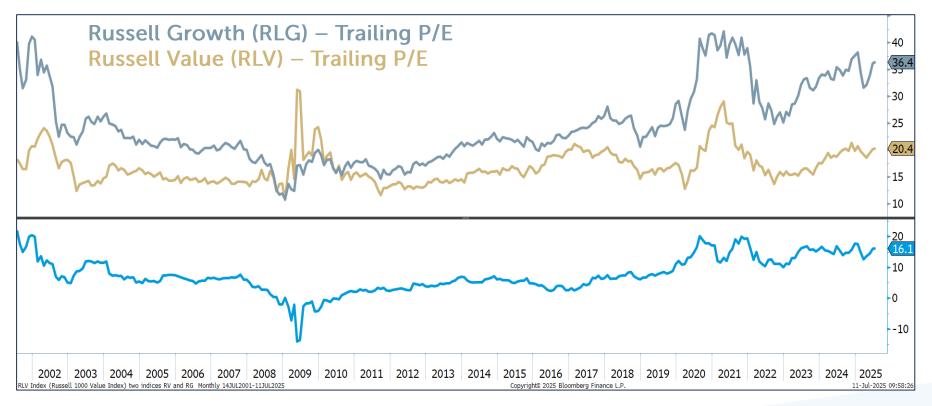
- Tariffs and fiscal stimulus have yet to derail the disinflationary trend.
- Economic outlook brightens as recession worries fade.
- Potential weakness in unemployment should reduce some inflation pressure.

TECHNICAL

- Stock gains often continue after losses are recovered.
- While international stocks are extended, participation is broad.
- Strong breadth suggests mid-caps may catch up to large caps.



Growth premium fading (won't go easily)



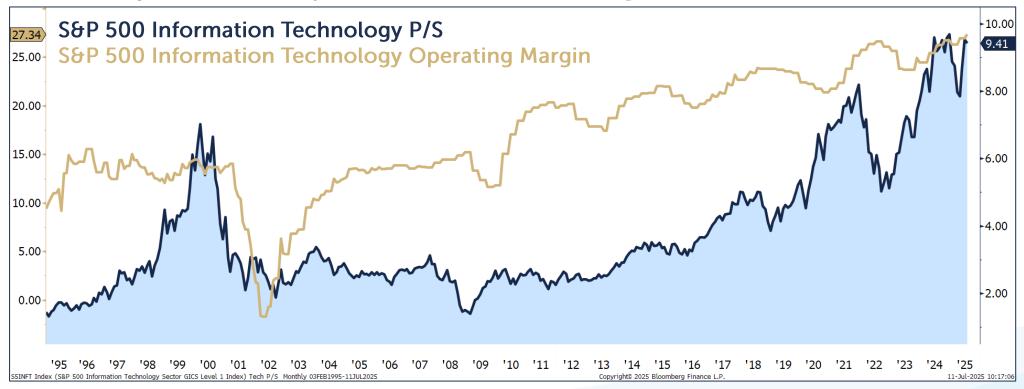
- 2Q valuation recovery for growth - back to start of the year
- Valuation spread jumped back up to high end of range

Historically high Price to Sales for Tech

Potent combination of high profitability and growth has been driving P/S for tech ever higher. We question the sustainability of both current levels of growth and profitability. Examples include Palantir at 105x trailing sales (otherworldly) and Nvidia at 27.5x. These multiples are not sustainable.

Asset Class Positioning: July 2025

	Asset Class	Positioning	Comment
	US Large Cap	Neutral	Valuations have jumped back to the high end of the range with market recovery. Risks to profitability are present as growth slows and supply chain issues from tariffs become reality.
STOCKS	US Mid and Small Cap	Neutral	Significant valuation discounts remain in place. However, technical picture remains weak, and earnings revisions have been relatively weak versus large caps.
STO	International	Positive	Relative valuation still attractive, relative strength better than US and earnings revisions are better.
	Emerging Markets	Positive	Relative valuation remains attractive, and earnings revisions have turned positive.
	Core	Positive	Bond dropped in June and are near the bottom of the range of the last year. Yield levels remain compelling relative to the valuations of risky assets.
BONDS	Treasuries	Neutral	Treasury yields remain rangebound, reflecting a balance of inflation and recessionary risks.
BOL	Corporates	Neutral	The yield premium of risky bonds narrowed yet again in June, reflecting low corporate default expectations.
	Mortgages	Positive	Mortgage yield spreads remain attractive relative to their credit risk, providing improved risk/reward relative to corporate bonds.

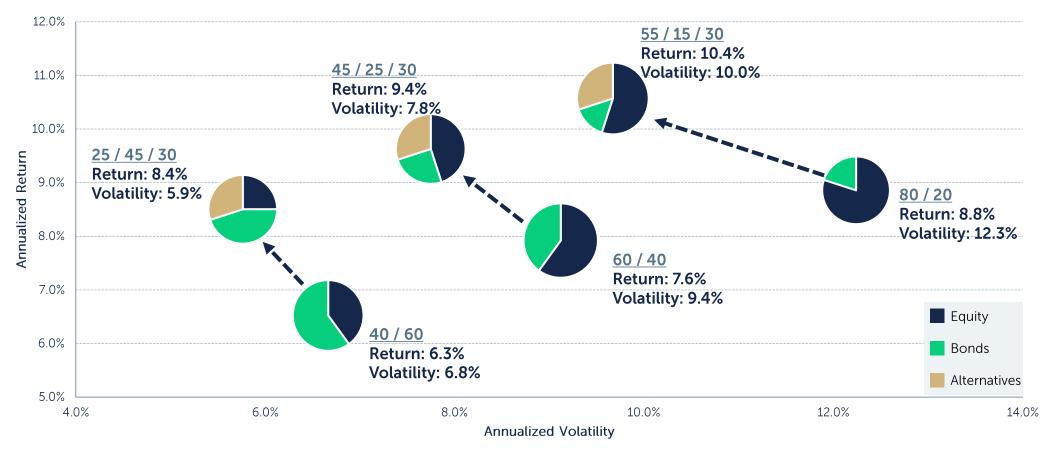

Over the last 20 years, an allocation to Alternatives and Private Markets has decreased volatility and increased return.

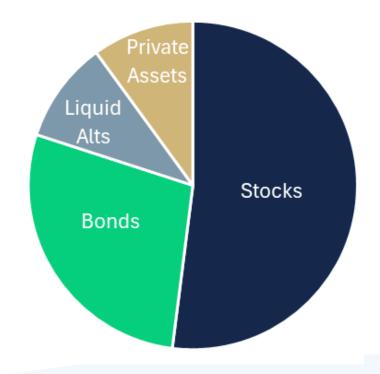

For Slide titled "Non-Correlated Diversification" - The base portfolios represent the performance of hypothetical portfolios invested in public markets equities (represented here using the performance of the S&P 500 Total Return Index) and fixed income (represented here as the Bloomberg Aggregate Bond Index.) The modified portfolios represent the performance of hypothetical portfolio invested in public markets equities, fixed income, and in "alternatives", where "alternatives" is comprised of equal weights (5% each) of private equity, venture capital, private real assets, private credit, private real estate, and hedge funds. As each of the source data sets for this analysis is an index, the fees and expenses associated with investing are excluded from the performance of each index, as one cannot invest directly in an index. The source data for the "alternatives" performance information is from Pitchbook from June 2004 until September 2023, and from Bloomberg since September 2023 to June 2024. The performance of each of these indices is subject to certain biases. For example, any index purporting to be a representation of the entire private equity universe would be subject to reporting bias, as not every private equity fund or direct investment reports their performance to Pitchbook or Bloomberg. In addition, these indices are also subject to survivor bias, because the longer a fund or fund manager is in existence, the more likely they are to report their performance (or have that performance be public) and the more likely they are to have positive performance.

The hypothetical performance results in these materials have several inherent limitations. Unlike an actual performance record, hypothetical results do not represent actual performance and numerical values presented are intended only to help illustrate how such hypothetical portfolios may have behaved over time. There are frequently sharp differences between hypothetical performance results and the actual results subsequently achieved.

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Performance represented assumes portfolios were rebalanced quarterly.





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
