Greetings to all MABAS Members,

The first quarter of 2021 behind us and I don't think the light at the end of the tunnel is a speeding train. I am encouraged by the vaccination numbers and a fairly steady drop in COVID-19 cases, especially the severe ones. I know there are many more vaccinations that need to be administered and a lot of work still to be done.

As I have said in the past, MABAS is still working closely with IEMA and IDPH on how to support the residents and departments of Illinois with staff and equipment for managing the situations created by the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020 MABAS received over 300 taskings from IEMA and has received several more in 2021. We continue to monitor equipment conditions and adjust items as requested. If you know of issues with deployed equipment, please contact your Branch Operations Chief and let them know about it.

Since the Command and Dispatcher Summits had been cancelled, MABAS appropriate, scheduled virtual committee meetings with our standing committees. Most of these have already occurred and we appreciate the hard work and flexibility from our committee members. We use

the committee members input in their area of expertise to request grant funding and allocate resources.

I know that several MABAS divisions have been involved in local area or division wide vaccination sites over the past month or so and I think that fire service participation and support of those events is crucial to their success. MABAS will share any knowledge or logistical experience that we can to assist when requested.

The last MABAS executive board meeting was held on February 24 at the MABAS Readiness Center and two remote sites - IFSI in Champaign and Southern Illinois Airport in Carbondale. We had good attendance at all three sites and the technology worked very well. Thank you to everyone that participated. I would like to thank outgoing First Vice President Rob Martin and wish him well in his move to Wisconsin and I would like to welcome Chief Kevin Welsh as the new First Vice President.

12 Maintenance Tips to Get Your Home Ready for Spring

Maintaining a healthy home goes beyond dusting and vacuuming. When is the last time you checked your smoke alarms? How about the last time you cleaned out your dryer vent? Follow the tips below to make sure your family and home are ready for a happy, clean spring season.

Clean Gutters

Grab a ladder, and check your gutters for debris. Remove as much as you can with



your hands (Don't forget to wear gloves!). Remove any leftover gunk with a garden hose. Take off any nozzle and have a helper turn on the water when you're ready. Shove the hose into the downspout to power out of gooseneck bends. Make sure your downspouts channel water at least five feet from foundation walls.

Scrub Walls, Baseboards and Outlets



Scrub all the walls — in the bathroom, kitchen, bedrooms and living areas — with a sponge or brush and mild soap and water. This includes baseboards and outlets. Make sure to completely dry outlet covers before replacing.

Replace Filters



Replace all filters including water, range hood and air vent filters. You should replace these filters every 3-6 months depending on the type of filter you have.

Clean Faucets and Showerheads



Unscrew the faucet aerators, sink sprayers and showerheads, and soak them in equal parts vinegar and water solution. Let them soak for an hour, then rinse with warm water.

Clean Out the Dryer Vent



A clogged dryer vent can be a fire hazard. To clean it, disconnect the vent from the back of the machine and use a dryer vent brush to remove lint. Outside your house, remove the dryer vent cover and use the

brush to remove lint from the other end of the vent line. Make sure the vent cover flap moves freely.

Wash Exterior Windows



Hire a window-cleaning service to clean all exterior windows.

Keep Allergens Away



Keep dust, mold and pollen at bay by decluttering your home, checking pipes for leaks and keeping the air clean.

New Trier's Northfield campus to open as COVID vaccination site for local educators, municipal work-

Once a long shot, a vaccination center at New Trier High School's Northfield campus is just about a sure thing.

"This is as close to done as it can be," Cook County Commissioner Scott Britton said.

Britton, who represents a portion of Northfield Township, confirmed that plans to use New Trier's facilities received the go-ahead from the proper county and state officials, and a site-use agreement is set for approval on Tuesday, Feb. 16, by the New Trier District 203 Board of Education (agenda).

Once the measure is approved, Britton said, New Trier's Northfield campus will be used as soon as Wednesday, Feb. 24, firstto vaccinate area educators, responders and municipal workers.

The location will not be available to the general public, at least not yet, Britton said.

"A lot of kudos go to local fire departments and municipal governments," Britton told The Record. "They got together and saw a lack of vaccination locations in the northern suburbs. We heard from a lot of municipalities and school districts."

Officials from New Trier High School, as well as a number of area villages, deferred to the county for comment.

> The capacity of New Trier's pending vaccine center is not yet known, Britton said, adding that it depends on the county's vaccine supply and staffing of the facility.

"It's a great plan but limited in the number of people it can take," he said. "If we had enough vaccines, we could do a lot of The county operates large vaccination vaccines in a day.

In mid-December, New Trier announced it several had a plan in place if the county wanted to use its Northfield facilities — specifically the main gymnasium — as a vaccination center.

About a month later, local municipalities and first-responders sent an official proposal to the county, suggesting the use of area paramedics and public facilities to administer the COVID-19 vaccine.

The proposal was signed by MABAS Division 3, an emergency-response unit consisting of more than a dozen northern suburban fire departments, including Wilmette, Winnetka-Kenilworth, Glenview, Glencoe and Northfield.

Britton said it is too early to confirm which schools' and municipalities' employees will be eligible for vaccination at New Trier, but the details will be finalized at the local level.

"They will work out details on that," he said. "It will be by appointment, and we hope to schedule specific schools and districts to get it done in an orderly fashion. ... MABAS is leading the charge on this through the county health depart-





COVID-19 STATE SUPPORTED VACCINATION SITES

With supply of the various COVID-19 vaccinations increasing, the number of vaccination sites around the state is on a steady rise. Besides locally planned and supported sites, the state is also increasing the number of its supported vaccination sites. These state supported sites are being planned by IEMA, IDPH, the Illinois National Guard in conjunction with federal agencies. While MABAS does not determine site locations or the allocation of vaccinations for these sites, it is involved in the planning process with the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC). MABAS' role in this planning process with IEMA has been with the direct notification of fire chiefs and division presidents when sites are being planned for in communities. MABAS has been providing information of potential site-walk throughs and when sites are approved. With the exception of a few fire departments, most of the chiefs contacted were not aware the state was planning to put up a vaccination site in their community.
