# HOMEOWNERS, HERE'S YOUR COLD WEATHER HOME CHECKLIST

Ten things to do to make your home warmer, conserve energy and protect your house from snow and ice.



Don't let snow and ice get you down this winter.

It's polar vortex season again, which means not only sub-zero temperatures for much of the country, but snow and ice that can become damaging to your home. If you haven't prepped your home for winter yet, it's not too late. Winterizing takes some effort, but luckily, many of the best measures to take are easy and free. Use these home maintenance tips to create a winter home maintenance checklist, so you can spend those cold days warm and cozy. We've also got tips on how to protect your pipes and how to keep your pets safe and calm during a winter storm. We also break down how much it costs to run a space heater.

#### Check your house for leaks and drafts

Leaks and drafts coming in through cracks in walls, doors and windows can prevent proper heating and increase energy bills. If your energy company doesn't provide a home energy audit, perform one yourself. Here are a few ways to seal leaks and drafts:

- Put caulk, foam or weatherstripping around moving doors and windows.
- Use bubble wrap or a window insulator kit to seal up windows you won't be using.
- Add a storm door to reduce heat loss at the main entrance.
- Install insulation in your attic to prevent ceiling heat loss.
- Replace poorly insulated doors made of wood with an Energy Star-rated door like steel or fiberglass.
- Cover mail slots and pet doors with

- insulation or heavy towels to keep warm air in and cold air out.
- Use blackout curtains on your windows, keeping them open during the day to let the sun in and closing them at night to keep the heat in.

#### Get a chimney inspection

Before you use your fireplace or wood stove for heating, have the chimney or flue inspected and cleaned by a professional. This step can prevent fires in chimneys, which along with other woodburning devices, account for 18,000 residential fires each year.

A blocked chimney or flue can also increase your chances of carbon monoxide poisoning. Don't forget fresh batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

If you have a nonworking or decorative fireplace, you could lose valuable heat through the open fireplace. Investing in a chimney balloon can prevent heat from escaping and cold winter air from coming in. Just make sure to remove it if you want to start a fire later on.

#### Have your furnace inspected

If you have a furnace, you should have it inspected each year, just like a chimney. If your furnace isn't working properly, an early inspection can give you time to buy a new one before winter sets in. You should also consider having your air ducts cleaned or cleaning them yourself. Make sure you're also changing your furnace filters regularly to keep your furnace working properly. (Plus, here are five signs

you may need a new furnace.)

#### **Cover bare floors**

Laminate, wood and tile floors look great, but they can cause you to lose heat during the winter. As part of your winter home maintenance checklist, consider adding rugs or installing carpet over your bare floors to keep your feet warm and prevent heat loss.

#### Reverse ceiling fan blades

If your home has ceiling fans, you

should switch the blade rotation with the seasons for best results. With most ceiling fans, the blades should move counter-clockwise in warm months, pushing cool air down. In winter, switching the blades to clockwise rotation on the lowest setting



can push the warm air in the room down from the ceiling to keep you warmer.

#### Prepare for winter storms

Pay attention to the weather so you have plenty of time to prepare if a winter storm is on the horizon. Have your home and car emergency kits ready to go at all times and make sure your car's maintenance is up to date with a full gas tank in case you need to leave. If you don't have a portable generator at home, now might be the time to buy one. Generators can keep your home warm until the power company can get you back up and running.

#### Invest in an easy-to-read thermometer

For the seniors in your life, it's always a good idea to have a large, <u>easy-to-read</u>

thermometer in a prime location inside the home. Older people may not feel temperature differences as easily, which can cause serious health issues, especially if they live alone. Having a thermometer and checking the temperature regularly can help them know when to bundle up or if there could be a potential heat loss problem in the home.

### A Message from MABAS-Illinois

Needless to say, this has been a challenging time for MABAS operations since our last newsletter. This past August both political parties held their conventions 90 miles apart in Milwaukee and Chicago. Planning for both events included daily Technical Rescue Team and EMS standbys in Chicago along with MABAS personnel staffing positions at the various command centers. Then came Hurricanes Helene and Milton and the requests through the states EMAC mutual aid network for emergency assistance in North Carolina and Florida. North Carolina requested two Swift Water capable rescue teams for a possible 14-day deployment in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene. Personnel from Illinois Task Force 1 USAR Team and Illinois Water Rescue 1 responded and performed heroic search and rescue operations in western North Carolina. While planning the return of those two teams, we had to respond to a request for fire engine strike teams from the state of Florida in anticipation of Hurricane Milton.

The MABAS Staff had to pivot quickly and assemble three fire engine strike teams consisting of five engines, a command component and logistical support. The call for help from the divisions was overwhelming and the three teams soon reported to a staging area in Ocala Florida. Unfortunately, the strike teams received



no taskings while in Florida and returned to Illinois. I know many divisions and departments who volunteered to respond to Florida were not initially tasked, but there will be other future missions where we will work to spread the taskings around to

as many as possible. One thing is certain, officials in both North Carolina and Florida were extremely complimentary of the efforts of MABAS responders which is something we should all be very proud of.

October means the start of both the Federal and State grant request process. We will be working diligently to express the growing needs with State, County and Federal officials in the coming months.

Work on the 2025 MABAS Command and Communications Summit is ramping up. We are close to finalizing the agenda for both Summit portions and will publish it soon. We had a good number of divisions set to speak on their lessons learned at actual events along with a recap of our recent deployments. The Summit is scheduled for February 17<sup>th</sup> through February 21, 2025 at the Bloomington/Normal Marriott Hotel. Watch for the upcoming registration information and plan on attending.

Thank you everyone for your support of MABAS and hope we see you in February!

#### MABAS-IL Change-of-Quarters Knox-Box® System

Fire departments anticipating being tied up for a length of time on a multiple alarm fire or other large or complicated incident often (and should) include Change-of Quarter (COQ) companies on their MABAS Box Alarm Cards in order to have Mutual Aid departments move into their station(s) to provide response protection for other possible incidents in their village, municipality or district. In "the old days" the hosting department could simply leave their station unlocked so incoming companies could walk right in. But these days, fire stations are advised not to leave their stations open.





In early 2002 MABAS-IL, through the Knox Company, instituted a unique COQ Knox-Box® system to facilitate ease of entry by incoming COQ companies to an otherwise empty station. This a voluntary participation program available to all MABAS-member fire departments in Illinois.

Here's how it works: Dealing with the MABAS-IL Knox-Box Program Coordinator, a member fire station purchases a small key safe for mounting on the exterior of their station. Once the box is securely mounted, they lock their station key/card/fob/entry code inside the key safe. Incoming COQ companies participating in the program then

use their MABAS-IL key to open the key safe to get the key, etc. to

then access the station. The simplicity of the program is that participating fire departments have to carry just one statewide COQ program key on their outgoing COQ vehicles to gain access to any and all participating fire stations.


Fire Service Information Sharing and Analysis Program

What is it and What Can It Do For Me.

The FSISA program was created to support the fire service and its affiliated representatives in the information sharing environment. Specifically, the FSISA program objectives include:

- Provide situational awareness and advanced planning preparedness to Information Receivers (IR) to increase responder safety.
- Have two FILO's for each division to serve as the division contact and to assist in training IR's.
- IRs to share un-vetted Disaster Intelligence with collaborative partners in order to improve the common operating picture.
- Share information from all sources as appropriate with public safety, Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO) and private sector partners.



Information Sharing Flow - Out



#### Why Is Information Important To Me?

Advanced Planning Preparedness-

Serves as the preparedness "need to know" in order to plan for specific known situations and/or possible/potential/probable events where members may be exposed to risk. This information may be of particular value addressing gaps that may exist in support of existing departmental guidance like Emergency Operations plans, SOPs and/or SOG's.

· Disaster Intelligence-

While not universally defined, Disaster Intelligence promotes the concept of sharing raw data associated with evolving events that are of such magnitude, or so dynamic, that the event is or has the potential to overwhelm a jurisdictions ability to respond to and/or recover. This information can be critical in supporting decision making efforts at the tactical and strategic levels from local agencies through Federal intervention. \_

#### Duties of an Information Receiver

- Serve as a consistent local point of contact for the Fire Intelligence Liaison Officer (FILO)
- · Receive selected information from FILO
- Establish an internal "SOP/SOG" regarding the internal handling and security of sensitive information
- Share / Educate / Train department members on the value and uses of intelligence for the fire service
- Provide feedback on the informational needs, what's working / not working, suggestions for improvement
- Provide intelligence updates during significant or unusual incidents



#### How To Participate In The Program

- Prospective members of this program begin the process by completing the application.
- Applicants will need a letter of approval and support from their Fire Chief (or executive leadership).
- Applicants will also need a recommendation from their MABAS Division through an existing member or in the case where the Division does not have a member, the Division President.
- Applicants must also complete the Non-Disclosure Agreement (NDA) which outlines operational details.
- Through the STIC, each applicant will be subject to a background check.
   Successful applicants must pass the limited background check.
- A MABAS-IL representative will provide approval

#### WATER RESCUE MOBEX

On September 25, 2024, Illinois Water Rescue 1 (IL-WR1) conducted a mobilization exercise (MOBEX) at

Apple Canyon Lake located on the Apple River in Jo

Daviess County. IL-WR1 is a specialized NIMS trained and equipped swiftwater/flood search and rescue team to perform large area water-based and land searches. Additional capabilities include administering in-field ALS care following EMS System Standard Operating

Procedures as directed by EMS System. The MOBEX was designed to focus on boat operations in order to rapidly perform search and rescue operations during a flood

environment. IL-WR1 team tested their capabilities to establish a base camp, conduct boat operations, and perform victim rescue operations. Once the command post



was established, IL-WR1 interacted with local agencies to develop incident action objectives. The search and rescue incorporated victim removal from remote location, triaging and treating patients, and transporting patients to an evacuation point for further medical care. A medical helicopter from Dubuque Iowa, *Aircare 3*, also participated in the exercise.



A total of 19 MABAS-IL personnel attended the MOBEX during the 24-hour deployment. Eleven MABAS-IL fire Departments participated in this exercise. MABAS IL-WR1 served as the lead organization and is a NIMS Type I Swiftwater/ Flood SAR Team. Other exercise participants included: Scales Mound Volunteer Fire Department, Apple Canyon Lake Security Personnel, four Aircare 3 helicopter personnel, and Advocate Lutheran General Hospital EMS System.

# MABAS ILLINOIS NOTIFICATION SYSTEMS

MABAS utilizes three different types of systems to notify Dispatch Agencies, Divisional Executive Boards, and members for situational awareness and escalating events. These systems are redundant to reduce failures in sending out notifications. Please see below of a description of each.



Constant Contact is used for general non-emergent notifications for MABAS Illinois and the MABAS Foundation.



On Solve is used for deployment and operational messaging for MABAS Illinois



Regroup is used for deployment and operational messaging for MABAS Illinois

MABAS will be implementing notification testing starting in November 2024.

#### **ILTF 1 Hurricane Helene Response**

#### EMAC request for a Type II Swiftwater Team to North

**Carolina** ILTF - 1 mobilized and traveled to Buncombe County where they were assigned to Skyland FD. They assisted with 19 Rescues and numerous evacuations the first few days with conditions never seen before in the region.

Chuck Gros, Squad Officer and Water Function Group Leader said "As the crew were enroute to assist with evacuations, individuals flagged down our convoy. Informing us that individuals were in immediate need of rescue. The members of ILTF1 switched gears and engaged in a new mission. Arriving at the end of a dirt road we found a small group of mobile homes. In the distance, cries for assistance were many. Our members without needing guidance, launched the boats and immediately started to effect rescues."

### REIMBURSEMENT REMINDER

#### With the increase of recent reimbursements,

#### **Please Remember:**

#### For Class Reimbursements:

Student must be on their MABAS Divisions related Divisional Specialty Teams Training Roster in CIMS 3.0 at least 6 weeks prior to the start of the class. **Be sure the get your roster, and training roster into CIMS 3.0.** 

Reimbursement requests **MUST BE submitted to MABAS within 30 days after the completion of the course.** This is very important, as MABAS cannot guarantee reimbursement on late submissions.

The request must include a coversheet on Department Letterhead, signed by the Chief of Department, and a listing of the **student and backfill personnel's standard and overtime pay rates.** 

The Reimbursement Request for Overtime/Backfill form must be included and filled out including the student and any backfill personnel;

The maximum rate per hour of reimbursement is \$58.00

Only the number of hours spent in class is reimbursable. This includes the total hours paid out to student and/or backfill personnel.

Lodging reimbursement is based on double occupancy., and the class must be **more than 50 miles** from the sponsoring department. Personnel are not reimbursed for travel or per diems.

The reimbursement rate for lodging is available on the Illinois Department of Central Management Services website 'Preferred Hotel Listing' https://cms.illinois.gov/employees/travel/preferredhotel.html

The student must pass the class to be eligible for reimbursement.

The student is eligible for a re-test twice within a year.

Re-tests must be administered by the IFSI.





### **Special Teams Audit**

Over the past 2 years, MABAS has been completing an audit of the recognized statewide deployable Hazardous Materials and Technical Rescue Teams. A benchmark of this audit was that teams would need to have a minimum of (20) fully trained individuals on their deployment rosters on the various training team rosters have been attending courses to increase deployment roster numbers. With decreasing levels of homeland security grant program funds, including those that fund training, its necessary for MABAS to implementing the following steps in 2025 in order to continue to provide support for teams:

For Technical Rescue Teams (TRT):

- Rope Operations
  - ♦ Will be a pre-requisite to be placed on the TRT training roster will no longer eligible for reimbursement
- Vehicle & Machinery Operations (VMO)

   \( \phi\) Will no longer eligible for reimbursement
- Vehicle & Machinery Technician (VMT)
  - ♦ Eligible for reimbursement for members on a Technical Rescue Team (TRT) training roster after they complete all the required technician courses ♦ Eligibility for reimbursement is for 1 year after completion of the required technician courses

Additional information on reporting requirements will be provided to Divisions with special teams. Please contact your regional Operations Branch Chief with any questions.
