Continued, Light Through Broken Glass (International Day of Peace, September 21



When working towards peace, we reveal who we truly are, children of God carrying God's light into the world. Just as stained glass only shines when the light passes through it, our lives shine with true beauty when the Spirit flows through our choices, our prayers, and our love for one another.

Our United Methodist Social Principles speak this same truth: "The church deplores war and all other forms of violent conflict and urges the peaceful settlement of all disputes. We yearn for the day when there will be no more war and people will live together in peace and justice" (The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, 163.F). This yearning is not only words on paper. It is meant to live in us. It is meant to guide how we pray, how we make choices, and how we show God's love in the world.

On this International Day of Peace, we remember that peace begins close to home. It begins in how we treat our neighbors, in how we pray for those we have conflict with, in the ways we choose forgiveness instead of revenge. Every prayer for healing, every act of mercy, every step toward justice becomes part of God's great work. And like pieces of stained glass, when God's light shines through us, we become part of something larger. Together, by God's Spirit, we show the world that peace is not only possible but already breaking in.

Prayer

God of peace,
Shine through our lives as light shines through glass.
Turn our brokenness into beauty.
Make us people of justice, kindness, and humility.
Guide our communities and our leaders
to walk in your way of peace.
Let the light of Christ heal our divisions
so that all may live in safety, hope, and joy.

Light Through Broken Glass (International Day of Peace, September 21) by Joshua Felton



At the United Nations in New York, there is a stained-glass window created by the artist Marc Chagall. It is called the Peace Window. Chagall designed it in 1964 to honor Dag Hammarskjold, the Secretary-General of the United Nations, remembered for his courage and his vision for a more just world. In 1961, while flying on a peace mission to end conflict in Africa, Hammarskjold's plane crashed, and he was killed. His death became a witness to his lifelong work of seeking peace among nations.

The window shines in deep shades of blue and is filled with angels, people, flowers, and images of both suffering and hope. Every piece of glass is broken and separate. Yet when the light shines through, the pieces become one whole image. The window reminds us that beauty can rise from what is broken.

This picture speaks to us today. Peace grows out of hope, healing, and justice. Like the glass in the window, our world is broken in many places. We are witnessing war in Gaza, Sudan, Myanmar (Burma), and Ukraine. We also observe deep divisions within countries, where neighbors turn against neighbors, where politics and fear pull communities apart, and where trust is broken. Our world carries wounds that feel too deep to heal. Yet when God's light shines through, even the deepest wounds can glow with beauty. What feels divided can be made whole.

Into this wounded world, Jesus speaks a blessing: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God (Matthew 5:9)." These words tell us that peace is a way of life we are called to live. To be a peacemaker is to let God's Spirit move through us in acts of mercy, words of kindness, and steps toward justice. Prayer of Confession

Liturgist: God has given us everything we need to live a godly life, and yet we continue to live according to the world's standards. We ignore God's divine power and use our finite power to try and make things happen.

Liturgist: We can escape corruption and greed by aligning ourselves with God. God has offered us virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, kindness, and charity as part of our faith journey.

Liturgist: The Lord commands us to grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

People: We have failed to follow God's way faithfully. We believe that our way is better than God's way.


People: Yet, we would rather hold on to ways that make us blind to the needs of other people. We have become discontented, confused, or afraid instead of content, certain, and confident.

People: Yet we confess that we have been slow to grow and quick to wander away from Christ.

All: Let us turn again to the One who forgives, restores, and makes all things beautiful. Help us to grow in grace, so that our lives may reflect Your glory through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Rev. Dr. Debra Wallace-Padgett was elected bishop of the United Methodist Church in 2012. She served as episcopal leader of the North Alabama Conference from 2012-2024 and the Holston Conference beginning in 2021. On September 1, 2024, she began her current assignment leading the Holston Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the West Virginia Conference of the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

Before her election, Bishop Wallace-Padgett pastored congregations in Kentucky, including St. Luke UMC in Lexington, where she guided the building of a \$4.5 million Ministry Life Center and the launch of a multi-cultural worship service. She also served as a district superintendent and in leadership roles at the conference, jurisdictional, and general church levels. In August 2024, she was elected President of the World Methodist Council.

A graduate of Berea College, Scarritt College, Lexington Theological Seminary, and Asbury Theological Seminary, Bishop Wallace-Padgett is married to the Rev. Lee Padgett. They have two adult children and two granddaughters.
