Warming Shelter by Art Masker

Asbury is in its second year of providing space for the Warming Shelter. This is a cooperative effort between Asbury and the CARE Center of Greeneville. The C.A.R.E. Center in Greeneville serves as a daytime home for more than 20 people. They are provided three meals a day and assistance with job searches, medical needs, and transportation. The CARE center ultimately hopes to have it's own overnight facility once suitable space which meets all city safety codes can be located. For now they coordinate with Asbury to use its facilities for the overnight shelter. Other than providing space, Asbury also helps in recruiting volunteers to staff the overnight shelter. Two adults, one male and one female, serve as overnight monitors/chaperones from 7:00pm to 7:00am each night. CARE coordinates the services, provides staffing and food in the evening, and then transports those who are sheltered back to the CARE facility for breakfast and showers and further day services.

During the frigid sub 32-degree nights (the "White Flag" nights) the warming shelter has been open almost every night over the past 2-3 weeks. On average there have been between 5 and 15 people housed each night. Those coming to the shelter are there of their own free will and can leave as they desire. They have been appreciative of having a warm place with cots and blankets, food and suitable bathroom spaces, and they have not posed any behavioral issues. Thank you to Asbury for providing this space and to church members who have volunteered to do an overnight shift. There is an ongoing need for volunteers. Several other area churches have provided volunteers to fill in with staffing.

Where the Supplies Went

We were able to use the Youth Room as a central hub for flood supplies. While most of the supplies were distributed right after the flood, we still had valuable supplies needing to find a home. The remaining supplies are already making an impact, thanks to partnerships with local and regional organizations:

- · Diapers/Wipes: Delivered to the Infant Mission at Cedar Bluff, supporting families in need.
- · Hygiene Items: Provided to the Family Resource Center at Greeneville City Schools, ensuring students have access to essential care items.
- \cdot Construction Supplies: Shared with the Church of the Nazarene Disaster Recovery Team, aiding in flood recovery efforts.

Additionally, outreach efforts connected us with Trinity United Methodist Church, the Coalition Addressing the Needs of Unhoused Persons, and other agencies to ensure every item found a meaningful purpose.
