



From the Pastor's Desk Asbury UMC Newsletter - 2025

Dear Asbury Family,

As we enter this beautiful season of Thanksgiving, I want to ask you to consider not just doing Thanksgiving business as usual, but start this holiday by taking a few moments to pause and reflect—not just on the meals, the gatherings, or the decorations, but on the deeper, heart-level gratitude that comes from recognizing God's hand in our lives. Friends, had it not been for the Lord on our side, we would have already been consumed, and the knowledge of that alone should be enough to make us stop and say thank you.

Let us give thanks with a profoundly grateful heart, taking a few quiet moments to remember the places God has brought us to and the challenges God has brought us through.

Scripture for Thanksgiving:

"Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; His love endures forever." - Psalm 107:1

To enrich our time of reflection, I'd like to introduce you to *Lectio Divina*, a prayerful way of reading Scripture that helps us hear God speaking directly to our hearts. Here is Psalm 107:1 in three different translations—take a moment with each:

NIV (New International Version): "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; His love endures forever."

ESV (English Standard Version): "Oh give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; for His steadfast love endures forever!"

MSG (The Message): "Thank God! God's love never runs out. His faithfulness never quits."

How to use **Lectio Divina**:

- 1. Read slowly Take one version at a time and read it slowly, aloud or silently.
- 2. Reflect Let the words sink in. What phrase or word catches your heart?
- 3. Respond Pray with the scripture. Speak your thanks, your worries, your hopes to God.

Rest - Sit quietly and let God's presence fill you.

Friends, as your pastor, I want you to know how deeply grateful I am for every member of the Asbury family. Your love, your service, your prayers, and your faithfulness make our church a place where God's kingdom grows. Also, please remember to label all of your child's belongings, including jackets, hats, and gloves. This helps us ensure items make their way back home each day!





Faithful Financial Support

We're on target with our annual giving goals—a strong position for this point in the year. In past years, we've often entered the fourth quarter needing to close a large gap. This year, thanks to your generous response to the Challenge Gift Campaign and the steady commitment of our congregation, we're tracking right where we need to be.

We're also ahead of last year's giving—an encouraging trend and a testament to your faith in Asbury's mission.

Ministry in Action

Ministry is thriving at Asbury. Our small groups continue to grow, fostering connection and spiritual growth. The Benevolence Team is actively supporting those in need throughout our community, and our United Methodist Women recently provided a full meal for the Greeneville High football team—another beautiful example of love in action.

We're also seeing a renewed focus on reaching out to members in assisted living, ensuring no one is left out of the life of the church.

We've made meaningful improvements to our facilities. A new boiler and updated temperature control systems were installed this month, helping us steward our building resources more efficiently.

Benevolence Corner

My Neighbor's House is a new 501©(3) non-profit organization in Greene County, formed this year in the aftermath of Hurricane Helene by three dedicated women who had been working with the flood victims. Seeing the gaps in existing support systems for our county's most vulnerable residents and moved by their shared compassion and faith, Abby Cole Keller and Jana Wills, later aided by Louise Crum, envisioned and put into action a plan that reshapes how local assistance is provided. As stated on its website, My Neighbor's House works year-round, bridging the gaps in resources, fostering community resilience and ensuring that support is always available, not just in moments of crisis but in everyday struggles.

The name "My Neighbor's House" was inspired by the Biblical passage from Luke 10:27, which states, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself."

I serve on the board of My Neighbor's House and it is evident to me that God is mightily at work in this endeavor. In just the few months since the organization was first formed, it has already found a home in the former Bradburn Hill United Methodist Church, located just a mile out of town on Kingsport Highway. Supported by grants from organizations such as AIDNET and United Way, donations and fundraisers, MNH has already been meeting the needs of our community with financial need, clothing, and food. The facility is currently being readied so that it can be a home base for non-profits and the fellowship hall can be rented out for events, providing additional funding for the services provided by MNH. The Board is comprised of ministers and leaders from our local churches. To read more about MNH, you can go to its website, at https://www.welcometomnh.com. Or you can visit, as the office is open Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 10:00 to 5:00.

Additionally, to meet the food needs of our community during the federal government shut-down and the cut in SNAP benefits, MNH will be open Tuesday and Thursday evenings during the month of November from 4:30 to 7:00 p.m., so that working families can pick-up food at a convenient time. I urge you, if you are able, to consider making a monetary or food donation to MNH, or even volunteering to help distribute food, as they are asking churches to volunteer for a night.
