Our Philosophy: The Asbury Child Enrichment Center is to provide a positive Christian atmosphere, which will promote the spiritual, social, physical, intellectual and emotional growth of a child while respecting individual differences among children. Learning experiences, appropriate for the developmental age of each group, are provided daily.

Waiting List: Your child will be placed on our waiting list when we have received the application fee (\$25.00). This fee is non-refundable and will not be applied to future tuition charges or other fees.

The date on which you pay the application fee is the date used to "track" your child on our waiting list. Nonetheless, it may be necessary because of your child's age and because of the quota needs of a particular classroom for your child's position on the waiting list to be moved. Please be assured, however, that we will seek to ensure the integrity of the waiting list and your child's place on the list while otherwise meeting the Center's placement requirements.

When you are informed of an opening in the Center, you will have 48 hours to let us know of your interest. If you turn down the spot that has been offered or if we do not hear back from you, we will offer the spot to the next child on the waiting list, and you will be moved to the bottom of the waiting list. Your child's name will remain on the waiting list for two years from the date of payment of the application fee, or until you have failed to accept **two.**





Hands-On Missions Opportunity: Personal Hygiene Kits for Liberia

Asbury United Methodist Women and Asbury Youth are partnering together to supply personal hygiene kits for Liberia and we need your help! We want to make 100 kits by May 15, so that they can be delivered to the Holston Conference for shipment to Liberia when the Annual Conference meets the first of June. The Mountain View District of the Holston Conference has challenged churches in the district to create 500 or more of these hygiene kits and nothing makes missions fun like being part of a challenge. Let's meet that challenge, Asbury, and create 100 kits!

A list of items that should be placed in each hygiene kit is listed below and can be purchased for around \$15. To make the task easier for you, we have placed 2-gallon zip-lock bags in the church library on the Hygiene Kit cart for you to use. Each 2-gallon bag contains a list of the items that should be included in the bag, and a small sandwich bag for the inclusion of the two medical items.

And normally, we would ask you to include \$8 with each bag for shipping, but thanks to two generous donations, the shipping cost for all 100 bags has been donated. God is already at work on this project, Asbury, let's join in – I know that we will be blessed, even as we are a blessing to others. If you have any questions, please contact Doris Allen or Marcia Parsons.

Pack these items in a 2 gallon Zip-Loc bag: 1 hand towel, 1 washcloth, 2 toothbrushes, 2 tubes of toothpaste (6.4 oz. or less), 1 bottle shampoo (15 oz. or less), 1 bottle lotion (18 oz. or less), 1 bottle roll-on deodorant (4 oz. or less) and 1 small spry perfume/cologne/body mist (4 oz. or less).

These items should be packed separately in a sandwich size Zip-loc bag. Please do not put in a larger 2-gallon bag:

1 tube antibacterial ointment (1 oz.)

1 bottle Tylenol/acetaminophen 500 mg (24 ct.)



PROM CLOSET A SUCCESS! EMILY BELL

This spring, the Blessed Dressed Ministry made prom dreams come true for more girls than ever before. We outfitted an amazing 102 girls and even a young man (thanks to a tuxedo donation from Bob Leonard!), exceeding our goal of 100 dresses. This wouldn't have been possible without the incredible support of Andrew Johnson Bank, Beverly Serral Vacation Rentals, and the Greeneville Woman's Club—thank you for your generosity!

This year's event brought joy to girls from across our community—county schools, GHS, neighboring counties, and homeschool groups. The wide selection of sizes meant every girl, even girls who might otherwise struggle to find a dress, found a perfect fit! One grateful mother expressed her relief after finding a dress for her daughter in a hard-to-find size. To ensure this ministry continues to thrive in the years to come, we've asked the girls to consider donating their dresses back and have collected their email addresses to keep them updated.

To continue serving more girls, we've adopted a new model, which includes more fundraising. In the past, our "Prom Closet" relied entirely on donated dresses. However, since many girls now sell their dresses online, we've found a creative and successful new approach. We shop on Facebook Marketplace, and when we tell moms that we're buying dresses for girls to go to prom, many generously offer lower prices and even include extra dresses. We also shopped online sales.

Buying dresses keeps freshens our inventory and, more importantly, ensures that every girl finds a dress; in past years, this hasn't always been possible and it broke our hearts. We focused on getting dresses in sizes 16-28, and the amazing women of Asbury and our community truly came through, helping us double the number of girls we could serve. Every girl left with a beautiful dress, ready for her special night.

Each girl also received a special gift bag, thanks to the Sisters of Grace class. Inside, they found a lovely leather-bound Gospel (from Amie Serral Moyer), a handwritten note (from Doris Allen), a small wooden cross, and an invitation to join us at Asbury for services and events. Thank you SBG for supporting Discipleship with such a thoughtful gift.

Of course, we would never turn anyone away, but expanding payment options to include cash, credit, and debit cards this year made it easier for everyone to contribute. This year, every girl was able to contribute. A small contribution of \$10 per dress helps us keep the ministry running and pay for necessary dress repairs and cleaning (we're currently fixing 14 zippers and dry-cleaning others).

We are so grateful to everyone who helped make this year a success. Thank you to our church members who built and took down the dress racks and dressing rooms, to those who brought snacks for our volunteers, and to all the women who spent time helping girls find their perfect dresses, including Asbury members, GWC members, and a few beauty queens from Miss Greene and Historic Greene County. This ministry is truly important to our community, and we are so thankful for your ongoing support. If you'd like to help, please contact Emily Bell.
