## Liturgy For Worship

### Doxology

Praise God from whom all blessings flow. Praise him all creatures here below, Praise him above the heavenly host. Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. Amen.

### The Lord's Prayer

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen. By the year 1807 Bishop Asbury was so well known that mail addressed to him "Bishop Francis Asbury, Continent of America" would reach him wherever he happened to be. Asbury was probably known by sight by more people than anyone else in America at that time. Strangers going into the wilderness for the first time would often go with Asbury, for it was universally acknowledged that he knew more about the whole country than any living person and would be a trusted guide into the wilderness. And no doubt whoever traveled with him did not get far into the journey without hearing about the savior and his love!

On March 24, 1816, Asbury preached his last sermon in the old Methodist Church. Previous to his entering upon the last exercise, perceiving his great weakness of body, some of his friends endeavored to dissuade him from preaching; but he resisted their dissuasion by saying that he must once more deliver his public testimony in that place: yielding their own tenderness for his temporal welfare, to his desire to proclaim the counsel of his God. They carried him from his carriage in which he rode....for he was unable to either walk or stand....to the pulpit, and seated him on a table prepared for that purpose.

Though he had to make frequent pauses in the course of his sermon, for the purpose of recovering breath, yet he spoke nearly an hour with much feeling from Romans 9:28. There in Richmond Virginia he closed public labours upon the earth. The audience was much affected, indeed how could how could it be otherwise? To behold a venerable old man, under the dignified character of an ecclestiatical patriarch, whose silver locks indicated that time had already numbered his years and whose pallid countenance and trembling limbs presaged that the early race was nearly finished: to see in the midst of these melancholy signals of decaying nature, a soul beaming with immortality, and a heart kindled with divine fire from the altar of God....to see such a man and to hear him address them in the name of the Lord or host on the grand concerns of time and eternity! What heart so insensible as to withstand the impressions such an interesting spectacle was calculated to produce?

Asbury's years in America, 1771 – 1816 saw the Methodist Societies and then the Methodist Episcopal Church grow from 600 members and six preachers to 200,000 members and 700 preachers.

An imposing equestrian statue of Asbury was placed in Washington, D.C. in 1925. The rider in colonial clerical garb with hat drawn tightly looks forward despite the elements and wilderness hazards into new lands and new tomorrows astride a tired horse. Wesley said he looked on the whole world as his parish and Asbury "the father of American Methodism" believed and fulfilled those words.
