

Dear Church Family,

In Steve Sjogren's Book, "Conspiracy of Kindness: A Unique Approach to SHARING the Love of Jesus," he begins with a quote from C. N. Bovee, "Kindness is a language which the dumb can speak, the deaf can understand." We all long for the language of kindness to be spoken to us. Ecclesiastes 11:6 tells us, "Keep on sowing your seed, for you never know which will grow – perhaps it all will." Mother Teresa says, "Kind words can be short and easy to speak, but their echoes are truly endless." Many times we think of the word evangelism as something difficult, but my Evangelism Professor at Perkins, Bishop Scott Jones taught us, "evangelism is everything we are and everything we do and say to others." Basically, true evangelism begins with kindness and a willingness to listen to the heart and words of others. We have to give of ourselves freely. We are all evangelists in God's kingdom if we are followers of Jesus.

Steve Sjogren, purposes a formula for evangelism. *Servant evangelism = deeds of love + words of love + adequate time.* We communicate God's words of love through kindness in our own lives toward others, these are words and deeds of love. Others only know God's love through our proclamation of life. Words of love get people's attention and cause them to ask questions. If we are not paying attention to the needs of those in our community, we are not showing God's love and kindness. Kindness and deeds of love and words are not for inside the walls of the church to each other. Adequate time means that we take time for deeds and words of love so they have an effect on the hearts of others. We know we are loved when others take time to be with us, and show us they love us. Sharing the good news takes dedication, service, and leadership. These things paint a picture of the grace and love of God as a priceless gift.

Evangelism never means blast a shotgun barrel full of scripture at someone. It simply means loving God and loving people and taking adequate time to make deeds and love real in the lives of others. Acts of kindness with grace and love. It is much less complicated than we often think of evangelism to be.

Go out this week, making a special effort to share deeds and words of love, to show simple kindness to others. Take adequate time to make it real. You may be surprised at the blessing you receive in return.

<u>Use of the casket pall at a funeral service in the United Methodist</u> <u>Church</u>

After June Kinkaid's funeral, many people asked questions about the use of the casket pall and the direction in which the casket was turned at the chancel rail. In the United Methodist Church, a funeral is a worship service, and much of the symbolism is outlined in the United Methodist Book of Worship. A casket is placed with the feet toward the altar because, in life, a person would be looking at the altar during worship. If the deceased is a clergy person, the head is toward the altar because, in life, clergy persons face the congregation while conducting the worship service.

The cloth over the casket is called a *pall*. The word comes from the Latin word *pallium*, meaning cloak. In death a person is cloaked in Christ. The Book of Worship commands that the pall be white, the liturgical color for baptism and Easter. It is decorated with a cross running end to end in all four corners. This signifies Christ's triumph over sin and death on the cross. If the deceased was in the military the church respects the use of a flag as a pall. Much like the Paschal candle, the pall and its symbolism of baptism and resurrection through Jesus Christ is at the center of the funeral service. It helps the entire congregation declare the power of Christ and our hope in resurrection through Christ.

Also, for the same reason we wear robes in the chancel area of the church, the pall reminds us that in God's eyes we are all the same. The pall covers and hides the most expensive casket or a plain pine box-we are the same.

The pall at Trinity was given to the church many years ago by members of June Kinkaid's family. It was given in memory of Alma Henry, Larry Kinkaid's aunt. The family of Franklin and Alma Henry were long-time devoted members of our church. Their daughter, Caroline Henry Jones, lives in Florida and was here for June's funeral service.



Battle of the Bridge Canned Food Drive: August means the start of school and that means the annual Battle of the Bridge Football Game (Friday, August 26th at LC) and thus Trinity participating in the annual Battle of the Bridge Canned Food Drive and competition. 


