



From the Desk of the Pastor

February is often considered the month for emphasizing romance, friendship, and Valentine gifts, and we enjoy those loving sentiments of the heart. Nurturing our relationships is very important, and I wish you lots of joy in making those connections with dear ones. The American Heart Association promotes heart health during February, so we want to be aware of taking care of our physical hearts, too. In the Christian faith, we choose to emphasize the heart of Christ this month as the season of Lent unfolds. Lent will begin on February 18, and we will hold our Ash Wednesday service that evening in our sanctuary with our friends from Central UMC.

The term *Lent* is taken from the Old English word, *lencten*, which means “spring.” The season lasts for 40 days (February 18 – April 4, not counting Sundays), which is a time inspired by Jesus’ 40-day period in the wilderness as he prayed and fasted before the start of his public ministry. Taking on the Lenten spiritual disciplines of prayer, fasting, Bible study, and generosity will make for a more meaningful Easter. Resources will be available to enhance your daily devotions, and our committees and teams will provide several ways of serving our community for this time of spiritual growth. Join a Sunday School class and/or the Wednesday evening Bible Study group. The Wednesday study resource is *Walking in the Wilderness*, by Beth A. Richardson.

February also is Black History Month, and we will observe that occasion by selecting hymns, prayers, and sermon themes related to great African-American leaders. Celebrate the culture and heritage by becoming familiar with remarkable leaders with Methodist connections, such as Howard Thurman, Harriet Tubman, Sojourner Truth, Mary McLeod Bethune, Rosa Parks, James Lawson, Joseph Lowery, and more. Learn about the UMC’s perspective on this history and our call to eradicate racism by visiting www.umcdiscipleship.org/black-history-month.

February Finance Update

Trinity ended 2025 in a strong financial position, thanks to the steady generosity of our congregation. Giving for the year came in above budget, allowing us not only to meet all ministry needs but also to finish with a **year-end surplus of \$5,264**. This reflects both faithful giving and careful stewardship throughout the year.

As we moved into January, we did experience a small deficit, largely because the church was closed one Sunday due to weather. This is not unusual for early-year giving patterns, and the Finance Team will continue to monitor monthly trends as the year unfolds.

Most ministry areas remained well within their 2025 budgets, while a few—such as Worship and Mission Support—ran slightly higher than planned. These will be reviewed as we prepare for the year ahead.

Thank you for supporting the mission and ministries of Trinity United Methodist Church. Your generosity strengthens our worship, outreach, and care for the community as we begin 2026 with gratitude and confidence.

Christmas Eve Luminaries: When our Trinity Methodist Women (TMW) chose Bridge Refugee Services to be the recipient of our Christmas Eve Luminaries offering we never in our wildest expected to receive \$807.00. Trinity your generosity is boundless. You are a most faithful, generous church.

Your donation will help the agency to continue to provide opportunities for refugees to rebuild their lives after suffering persecution. They serve about 750 clients between Knoxville and Chattanooga who have applied for protected status in the United Nations refugee agency, UNHCR. Bridge is also working with 500 Ukrainian nationals who came to East Tennessee during their country's war with Russia. Currently, Bridge is the only resettlement agency across 33 counties. Know your gifts will make a difference. Thank You, Trinity!!

TMW Meet on Monday, January 5th

Mike Smith, a member of Concord UMC, was our guest speaker for the day. Mike has been involved with The Society of St. Andrew for many years and he continues to participate in the coordination with their various "dropping days" at Concord UMC of the foods gleaned from our local farmers.

The Society of St. Andrew began in 1979 when two Methodist pastors from our Virginia Conference became aware that when food picked was not "perfect" enough for the grocery store it was either thrown away or left to rot! Thus began their purpose of Gleaning to End Hunger and Reduce Food Waste. The Society brings people together to harvest and share healthy food, reduce food waste, and build caring communities by offering nourishment to hungry neighbors.

Mike shared that Concord UMC partners with five different churches in the community who meet twice a month. They travel to 10 different locations picking up food including our UT farm which gave them approximately 10,000 lbs. of food just this year. Concord UMC maintains two beautiful gardens that also provides food for their neighbors. Over time they have created a list of groups and individuals who receive food and assistance regularly. Quite a remarkable outreach for sure!

Mike requested his \$100 honorarium be sent directly to their Nashville state office. Thank You, Mike!

Philadelphia UMC, Local Pastor, Henry Huff, is in the process of organizing local churches including Trinity UMC for the opportunity to participate in a February 20 and 21 "dropping" at our Loudon UMC. Jane Whitaker has taken the lead on this outreach for us, so stay tuned for the chance to participate too. Should be FUN!!

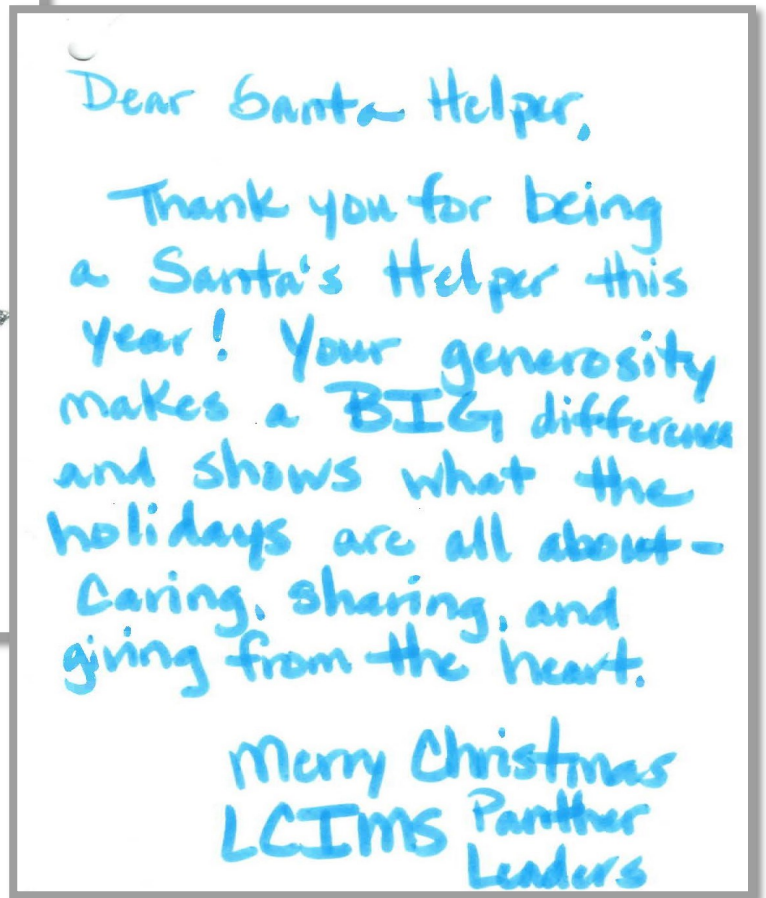
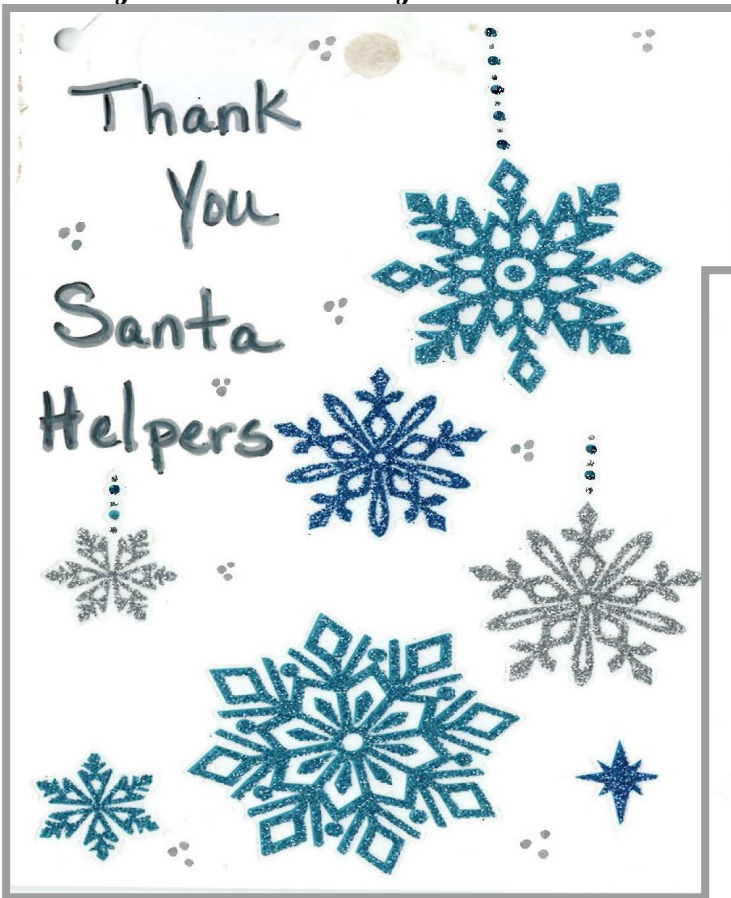

Civil and Human Rights

As United Methodists, we believe that God has given us principles for how to live in a community. Central to Jesus’ teachings, life, death, and resurrection is the Great Commandment: we must love God and love our neighbors as ourselves. (Matthew 22:35-40; Mark 12:28-34)

“We declare that all individuals, no matter their circumstances or social standing are entitled to basic human rights and freedoms... As a church, we will work to protect these rights and freedoms within the church and to reform the structures of society to ensure that every human being can thrive.” The UMC 2025-2028 Social Principles, The Political Community, Government Responsibilities, Basic Rights and Freedoms

Much of the Bible is devoted to figuring out how to follow this commandment. Nearly all of Church history is filled with devout Christians struggling — with failures and successes — to live out this commandment. What does it mean to love God? What does it look like when we love our neighbor?

What we believe about the nature of God and the nature of humanity also informs our understanding. Scripture tells us God created humankind in God’s image. What does that mean for how we treat each other?

We must take these questions seriously as followers of Christ.

We believe that in loving both God and neighbor, we must pursue God’s command of justice, liberation and flourishing for all people. We must work for the civil and human rights of every person.

What does the Bible say?

When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God. (Leviticus 19:33-34)



I [Jesus] was a stranger and you welcomed me. (Matthew 25:35b)

Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. (Hebrews 13:2)

But God has put the body together, giving greater honor to the parts that lacked it, so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it. (1 Corinthians 12:24b-26a)

What does the United Methodist Church say?

Regardless of legal status or nationality, we are all connected through Christ to one another. Paul reminds us that when “one part suffers, all the parts suffer” as well (1 Corinthians 12:26). The solidarity we share through Christ eliminates the boundaries and barriers which exclude and isolate. Therefore, the sojourners we are called to love are our brothers and sisters, mothers and fathers, sons, and daughters; indeed, they are us. (Book of Resolution, #4271, Welcoming the Migrant to the US)



We express our utmost concern for the passage of anti-immigrant laws, which adversely affect the well being of citizens and residents of this country as they engage in providing humanitarian aid to undocumented persons in several States. (Book of Resolutions #4272, Faithfulness in Response to Critical Needs)

IMMIGRATION IN THE UNITED STATES

What do the facts say?

- In 2022, 14.3% of the US population was foreign born (Pew Research Center)
- One-in-ten Black people in the U.S. are immigrants. The number of Black immigrants living in the country reached 4.6 million in 2019, up from roughly 800,000 in 1980 (Pew Research Center, 2022)
- Immigrants contribute and pay over 651 billion dollars in taxes to support and participate in the US economy (American immigration Council)
- 43% of recently arrived family and diversity-based immigrants are college graduate— compared to 29% native born Americans
- Beyond the staggering moral costs and far-reaching trauma of separating millions of American families, the deportation of 11 million people would impoverish many American families and create enormous social costs. Mass deportation would force a nearly \$8 trillion hit to the economy over the next 14 years and jeopardize our housing market. Further, it would take 20 years, and cost U.S. taxpayers between \$400 to \$600 billion (FWD.us)
