A winter issue of the SOS would not be complete without mention of Mr. Schumacher Gifts. The Schumacher Volunteer Fire Department continues to handle the logistics of this endeavour with perpetual funding from the Schumacher Foundation.

Local students in Junior Kindergarten through Grade 8 were asked to provide input on the gifts they would like to receive. After purchasing and wrapping the gifts, fire department volunteers went door to door on Sunday, December 18, 2022 to deliver 148 gifts to children in Schumacher.

Lifelong Schumacher residents Jacob and Joseph Dunkley received their last Mr. Schumacher Gifts this year. The 13-year-old, Grade 8 students were very happy with their presents (a Pokémon Elite Trainer Box for Joseph and a Rokr Wooden Train kit for Jacob). Both boys are also grateful to have grown up with this tradition; their fond memories of Mr. Schumacher's generosity will last a lifetime.

For those new to the SOS community, Frederick W. Schumacher is our town's namesake. He invested in our community from the early days of the gold rush and his generosity still benefits local organizations today. Mr. Schumacher's generous gift-giving began in December 1916 when 270 gifts were presented to eligible children under the age of 16. Mr. Schumacher's one request was that no child in the community be overlooked. Furthermore, his gifts were never inexpensive trinkets. In 1924, for example, he spent \$600 (\$9000 in today's currency) on sleighs, drums, dolls, books, cameras, silk scarves, manicure sets, and bugles. It's heart-warming that this care continues to this day.

The tradition of Schumacher children receiving a gift from Mr. Schumacher each Christmas continues over a century after the inaugural event in 1916. The Schumacher Volunteer Fire Department purchased and distributed 148 gifts this year. Pictured is Joseph Dunkley who, as a Grade 8 student, received his last Mr. Schumacher gift this year.



CROATIAN SOCIETY ROUNDUP

As 2022 comes to a close, the Croatian Society Schumacher would like share our successes with the SOS readership. We are thankful for the many generous donations to our "Save the Hall, Buy Bricks in the Wall" Campaign. As our campaign winds down, we have come to realize that we will fall short of our adjusted fundraising target of \$200 000. (Our goal was raised in response to the increased costs everyone is experiencing due to ongoing pandemic fallout.) We have reached \$165 000 and remain hopeful that further donations will get us to our target. Monies were collected from individual and corporate donations and the sale of cabbage rolls, strudel and pierogies.

The Hall has undergone many repairs thus far, mostly in regard to the foundation and roof along with new light fixtures in the main hall. Further reno plans include the downstairs hall, the upstairs bar area, the stage area, and the balcony meeting rooms. We also hope to be able to provide improved accessibility access at the entrance of the hall and perhaps install an air conditioning unit.



The Croatian Society members stepped up by preparing and selling pierogies with all proceeds going to the Ukrainian Cultural Group of Timmins. Following a three year hiatus, the Multicultural Festival was once again held at the McIntyre Arena in May. Our delicious Croatian food sold out in record time! We hosted our very successful 90th Anniversary dinner in September, followed up with our "Cheers to 90 Years After Party" musical social! Croatia and Canada played against each other in the FIFA World Cup tournament and we held a Croatian breakfast and viewing party with more than 100 cheering fans in attendance. We certainly appreciate all the continued support for the Croatian community and we want to ensure that fond memories will continue to be made at the Croatian Hall in Schumacher for years to come.

PARLIAMENTARY PAGE

According to the History section of the Ontario Legislative Page Program website (www.ola.org/en/visit-learn/programs/page-program/history), "Pages have been an important part of Ontario's Parliament since Confederation. These early Pages were 10 to 14 year-old boys who carried messages, ran errands, and fetched glasses of water for Members of Provincial Parliament.

The role of the Page remained the same throughout the first half of the twentieth century. In 1952, a tutor was hired to work with the Pages a few days a week. Eligibility requirements changed, so that Pages now had to be students in grades 7 or 8, and have a minimum academic average of 80 percent. They also had to have a letter of recommendation from their principal.

In 1971, Speaker Fred Cass (1968 -1971) appointed Ontario's first female Pages. A Page Mistress was hired to oversee the female Pages, and her role soon expanded to supervise all the Pages. In the fall of 1980, an all-girl group of Pages was selected, reflecting the high proportion of female applicants – they outnumbered the male candidates by 106 to 33.

Speaker Cass moved the Pages to an office that included a miniature schoolroom, recreational area, lounge, and kitchen. He also established the practice of choosing Pages from across Ontario, and began the tradition of reading the Pages' names into Hansard, which created an official record of their service."

In its current form, approximately 150 young students from across Ontario are selected each year to participate in Ontario's Legislative Page Program. The program continues to be designed for outgoing, high-achieving, community-involved students who have demonstrated responsibility and leadership. Legislative Pages meet key parliamentary and political figures and learn firsthand about Ontario's Parliament and the legislative process.

Jacob Dunkley, a 13-year-old lifelong Schumacher boy, applied to the Page Program in June of 2022 and received word in the fall that he had been selected for a two-week appointment at the end of October. During his Christmas Break from school, Jacob took some time to share his thoughts about his whirlwind adventure.

According to Jacob, the application process to become a Page was simple, but took a good amount of effort. He needed to create an account on the Ontario Legislative Page website, which involved inputting his riding of Timmins along with his name, address and other contact info. After creating his account, Jacob was required to write a 750-word essay about why he would be a good page candidate. (Having proofread his essay, this SOS Editor can confirm that Jacob included his unique life experiences and perspectives from growing up in northern Ontario as an asset.) Then came the hard part ... waiting for his application to change status from "pending". It took about four months before Jacob received an email indicating that he had been selected to serve during the Second Term of the Fall 2022 parliamentary session.

While at Queen's Park, Pages work under the direction of the Page Program Coordinator (currently Mr. Franco Gutierrez) who is a certified Ontario teacher. Pages also receive an honorarium of \$25 per day during their term of duty. Jacob and his fellow Pages were required to attend an Orientation Day at Queens Park on Friday, October 14, 2022. He and his dad, Rene, flew to Toronto on Thursday, and enjoyed a short visit with family before attending the Orientation session. The Page group and their parents/guardians were taken on a tour of Queens Park and the Pages had their ID badge photos taken. Page roles and responsibilities were also outlined. After a full day at Queen's Park, Jacob and Rene hopped on a plane back home. The following weekend, the duo drove back down to Toronto as Jacob's term officially began on Monday, October 24, 2022. The Page Program covers transportation and accommodation costs as needed. Jacob had the good fortune of being able to stay with family in Toronto.

Although Jacob's two-week term as a Parliamentary Page was on the short side, he quickly fell into the routine. Each day, the Pages had schooling in addition to their duties. On Parliamentary Days (Mondays and Wednesdays for Jacob) a 10-hour shift included lessons on parliament. On Math Days (Tuesdays and Thursday for Jacob), an 8-hour shift included time spent on math lessons. Every day started with an 8 AM Briefing (requiring a 6 AM wake-up to get there on time), followed by Orders of the Day and Question Period before lunch at noon. After lunch there were additional Orders of the Day followed by the presentation of Bills, Motions and Petitions before the end of day Debrief.

Pages are expected to memorize the names and ridings of all 144 Members of Provincial Parliament. According to Jacob, this is more challenging than you might expect. The job also entails more than bringing water to the MPPs. Jacob particularly enjoyed being sent up to Hansard on the fifth floor. Everything said in The Chamber is recorded by Hansard reporters, who then give the Pages large files to bring up to Hansard. Once there, Pages can keep track of the goings on in The Chamber on the large screen TV and take a breather while the files are photocopied. Once the copies are made, the Pages return to The Chamber and distribute the copies to the MPPs recorded on file.

Pages need to follow parliamentary protocol. For example, Pages assigned to the Dais are required to sit and stand in lockstep with the Speaker of the House. Jacob and his fellow Pages got quite the leg workout on Wednesday, November 2, 2022 when sixteen members of the Ontario New Democratic Party were escorted out of the legislature one-by-one during Question Period after making outbursts over Bill 28 (legislation that would prevent education workers from striking). Bill 28 was repealed on November 14, shortly after Jacob's term as a Page ended. Being cognizant that Pages are to present themselves as non-partisan, Jacob will only comment that November 2 was the most interesting day he experienced at Queens Park.

Some of the unique opportunities Jacob was afforded while at Queens Park included a group meeting with Premier Doug Ford and a question-and-answer lunch session with Head Clerk Todd Decker. Jacob served as a Page Captain on November 3 and got to lead the Daily Procession Line with Sergeant at Arms Jackie Gordon, Head Clerk Decker and Speaker of the House Ted Arnott. Jacob was also invited to lunch with Timmins MPP / Minister of Mines George Pirie who took care to introduce Jacob to The House as being from Schumacher. Jacob and a fellow Page from Sudbury (Molly Farrell) were interviewed by CBC Radio's Markus Schwabe about their experiences. Jacob's time at Queens Park was not all politics and schooling. The Page group had a fun excursion to the Museum of Illusions. Jacob also got to Trick or Treat with his cousins in the big city and take in *Harry Potter and the Cursed Child* with his dad. Overall, Jacob had a great experience. He met lots of nice people, made new friends, and learned how government operates.

GRAND DEMOLITION

When the burnt-out remains of the Grandview Hotel were scavenged by the History Channel's Salvage Kings in September of 2020, most locals expected that the building's demolition would soon follow. As things turned out, and for reasons not widely known, that was not the case. The building continued to sit vacant and become more of an eyesore and safety hazard for another two years before a local demolition crew reduced the much-loved watering hole to a dusty pile of rubble.

Landowners and tenants in the buildings on either side of the Grandview were informed by a letter from Arcwood Industries (located on Fogg Street in Timmins) that the demolition would take place on September 27 and 28, 2022. RINK REJUVENATION

After a long hiatus, the outdoor rink at Schumacher Public School is ready for the return of skaters. Lifelong resident Jasmine Chenier took it upon herself to get permission from the school for local residents to take over the maintenance of the rink. Thanks to the efforts of her team of volunteers, ice has been installed for the first time in several years. Lorne Feldman (Ward 2 Councillor and owner of Feldman Timber BMR located within walking distance of Schumacher near the intersection of HWY 101 and HWY 655) donated a 100 foot hose to the cause. Ward 3 Councillor Bill Gvozdanovic has taken a few turns at flooding the ice. Jasmine is looking for a few more volunteers to share the workload. 
