Most people who follow The Popchuck Chronicles know that the first novel in the series. Popchuck's Ghost, is set at Camp McAbre, a fictitious summer camp based on the real Camp Bickell. Book two, Popchuck's Revenge, is set in Nimmitsville, a play on words for the City of Timmins. Then of course, there's the ghost!

Popchuck was crafted from the imaginations of decades of kids who attended Camp Bickell, kids who thought the camp was haunted by the resident ghost. Of course, if you happen to be a Camp Bickell alumnist, you will know that the name of the ghost who lives out there (pun intended) is really Arnold Poopchuck!

What a lot of people don't know is the link between the story and the town of Schumacher. If not for George Delich and Joe Campbell, this novel series might never have been written. Back in the day, Schumacher Public School principals, in concert with Joe Campbell, hired the Camp Bickell Director each year. It so happened that in the mid-1980s I was teaching at SPS and George asked me if I wanted to run the camp. After meeting with Joe, I became the Director for two summers.

At the time, about half of the kids who attended camp came from Schumacher, South Porcupine and Porcupine. It was the Schumacher kids who inspired me to write the story - two students of mine in particular. I would describe these guys as two of the best kids I've ever known. Great little athletes, always willing to go the extra mile to help by shoveling the rink in the winter, moving things around the school for the teachers and principal, and always being good to their peers.





Thank God for Camp Bickell and that very synchronistic circumstance of my being the Director. These two guys came to the camp, excitedly told me story after story about Arnold Poopchuck, and were thrilled when I carved out the first draft of the novel – using them as the main characters. These guys couldn't get enough of the story, wanted their own copies, and began picking up other books with mystery and suspense – among them, the Hardy Boys. The rest is history!

Thanks Schumacher! Thanks Schumacher Public School where the first drafts of books one and two were written! Thanks George Delich. Thanks Camp Bickell and Joe Campbell! My time as Director was one of the highlights of my life. Of course, thanks to my two students (who shall remain nameless)! You inspired me, while I was trying to inspire you. The best part is that **The Popchuck Chronicles** is a once-upon-a-time Schumacher story!



CELEBRATING A CENTURY



Schumacher Public School staff and students celebrated the school's 100th anniversary in style on Friday, June 7, 2019. A variety of activities helped to make the once in a century occasion a memorable one. A significant anniversary is just not complete without a celebratory cake and congratulatory wishes from local dignitaries; rest assured, the SPS 100th was no exception. A large banner acknowledging this milestone was also hung prominently in the main hallway.

Additionally, former staff and students, as well as current Schumacher residents, were invited to an Open House. Current students proudly gave tours of every nook and cranny of the school. The students were excited to show off some of the building's recent acquisitions (including a new day care facility, a Snoezelen Multi-Sensory Room and a well-equipped Maker Space amongst others). They were also interested in listening to visitors' stories about the good old days at SPS.

The gym was converted into a walk down memory lane. Current students created posters depicting highlights of what was going on in Canada and the world during each decade of the school's existence. SPS memorabilia (including plaques, photos, and newspaper clippings) was also on display. A model of an old-school classroom was created using odds and ends from around the school. The efforts of the organizing committee did not go unnoticed.









A highlight of the event was the opening of the 800-pound safe on the second floor. (For those wondering, a crane was apparently used to lift it up there through a window.) At some point many years ago, the keys to the safe were lost. To get it open, school staff convinced a local locksmith to briefly come out of retirement. The effort was worth it as the safe held a few treasures including school ledgers, a stamp of the school, a piece of gold, and a bunch of \$2 bills. (As a point of reference, the last time a \$2 bill was printed in Canada was in February 1996. It is likely that no current SPS student had ever seen a \$2 bill before in their life.)

Another highlight of the event was the creation of a time capsule to be opened fifty years from now, in 2069. This specific time capsule has been given a prominent location at the front entrance of the school. A large tree was painted on the wall and students used their handprints to create its leaves. The time capsule vessel is a wooden birdhouse that has been attached to the wall. To help ensure that the time capsule isn't opened early, Principal Kelly Pearce threw away the key.

SPS staff opted not to bury the time capsule due to their ongoing struggle to locate two existing capsules that are supposedly on the property. Rumour has it that one may have been buried underneath the gym (which was built in the 1980s) and that a more recent one may have been placed in a basement wall. If you happen to know more specific details about the exact location of either of these time capsules, please get in touch with Schumacher Public School or let us know (we'll be sure to pass on the details to school staff).





Summer took its time arriving, but now that it's here, there's been much to celebrate and plenty of activities to keep everyone occupied.

A warm welcome is extended to SACHA's newest board member, Darrell MacGregor. He will be taking on the role of community relations.
