THE RAVEN'S HONESTY

Over the summer, a colourful mural was painted on the Timmins Chamber of Commerce Building (located across the street from the McIntyre Arena). The mural is part of a youth art initiative that began in early 2018 as a means of honouring Indigenous culture and teachings in our city. Kristin Murray (who was elected to City Council in October 2018) spearheads the project.

The goal of the project is to have elders share Indigenous teachings with local youth, who then depict those lessons in murals. To date, at least fourteen murals have been installed throughout the City of Timmins. Mique Michelle, a Franco-Ontarian graffiti artist from Field in West Nipissing is the lead artist. Funding for the murals has been provided by the Ontario Arts Council and various local organizations.

The raven that adorns the Chamber of Commerce building teaches us about honesty or Gwekwaadziwin. He reminds us to be truthful to who we are and to walk tall with integrity. The raven does not seek the power, speed or beauty of others. He uses what he has been given to survive and thrive. We too must strive to accept ourselves and learn how to use our unique gifts.

Murals can also be found at the Timmins Airport, City Hall, Timmins Museum, Timmins & District Hospital, Misiway Health Centre, Porcupine Advance Printers, Timmins Flower Shop, Gibby's Tavern, 208 Third Avenue, Timmins & Area Woman in Crisis, Northern Cash Advance, underneath the Mattagami River Bridge, and at The Urban Farm in South Porcupine. There are future plans to create print material that lists the location of each mural and outlines the teaching behind each one.

Porcupine Ski Runners is well known for its cross country ski and snowshoe facilities. Perhaps less well known is that the beautiful chalet is typically available for rent during the offseason. There have been many business meetings, birthday parties, baby and bridal showers, and even a few wedding receptions held at the PSR. Due to the restrictions of the pandemic, the club did not offer its facilities for rent during the summer of 2020. Following consultation with the Porcupine Health Unit; however, an exception was made for Marc Tessier's brace and artificial limb clinic.

Tessier, from North Bay, typically runs his clinics at the Timmins & District Hospital. The dates he needed for July were not available. Since many individuals were months overdue for his service, Tessier set about looking for a wheelchair accessible building that could provide space for his equipment and a place for private consultation with patients. The PSR chalet fit his needs and the two-day clinic exceeded Tessier's expectations. Arrangements were made for Tessier to return to the chalet for his clinics in September and October. While rentals are a challenge at best during the winter months, this is just one more example of how 2020 has brought people together in unexpected ways.

SPRUCED UP

Since the Summer 2020 edition of the SOS went to print, some noticeable changes have happened throughout the community. Much of the graffiti has been painted over, large sections of sidewalk and roadway have been repaired, and the back house at 34 Fourth Avenue was demolished as part of the Salvage Kings deal entered into by the City. (The vacant, fire-damaged front house still stands; and although the sign was removed from the Grandview, it too still stands.) Much work has been done at Schumacher Public School including the installation of new windows, HVAC system upgrades, and the creation of an outdoor classroom. There is still much work to be done, but the community is definitely looking a bit better.

BUY A BRICK FOR THE HALL



For 88 years, the Croatian Hall in Schumacher has provided opportunities for the community to gather for cultural events, weddings, dinnerdances, birthday parties, meetings, concerts, Christmas parties, and other special occasions. A major fundraising campaign for the building, Save the Hall, Buy Bricks in the Wall, is now underway.

Throughout the years, members have given their time and labour to keep this community hall functioning. Necessary funds have been raised by selling annual memberships, renting the hall, hosting dinner-dances, selling cabbage rolls, and participating in the annual Timmins Multicultural Festival. During these pandemic times, sources of fundraising are limited. Fortunately, the Croatian Society of Schumacher is still a member of the Timmins Charity Bingo Association and is thankful for the funds they raise by working at the Timmins City Bingo Hall on a biweekly basis.

The Croatian Hall building was built in the 1920s as the Maple Leaf Theatre. At present, extensive repairs are needed on both the roof and foundation of the building. The estimated cost of these repairs is \$150 000 and current fundraising streams will fall short of this target. After much consideration, and for the first time since its inception in 1932, the Croatian Society of Schumacher has decided to seek donations from the public.

To raise the funds required to complete the building repairs, the community is being asked to purchase "a brick in the wall to save the hall". Ultimately, the Croatian Society board members want to ensure that the Croatian Hall maintains its presence in the Porcupine Camp for years to come.

The Buy-a-Brick campaign features the following donation levels: Bronze (\$50+), Silver (\$100+), Gold (\$200+), Platinum (\$1000+) and Diamond (\$5000+). Donors will be honoured with their name or business name engraved on a permanent plague which will be displayed in the front lobby of the Croatian Hall.

On behalf of the Croatian Society of Schumacher membership, heartfelt thanks and gratitude is extended to Randy Gattesco, owner of the Victory Tavern in Downtown Timmins, who launched this campaign with a donation of \$3100. Randy decided to donate all ticket proceeds from a week long celebration of The Vic's 90th Anniversary to the Save the Hall, Buy Bricks in the Wall campaign.

NARDUZZI'S RESTAURANT







Melissa Narduzzi has a wealth of experience working in the restaurant industry. She has called Schumacher home for the past 25 years and many will recall her smiling face and cheerful demeanour from her days at the McIntyre Coffee Shop. Melissa had long dreamed of opening her own restaurant. When the opportunity arose in early 2017, husband Kevin (a lifelong Schumacher boy) and daughters Jordan and Marli gave her their full support. Narduzzi's Family Plaza restaurant, located beside the Porcupine Mall off HWY 101 in South Porcupine, officially opened its doors in April 2017.

Over the past three years, Narduzzi's has developed a loyal customer base. This is no doubt due to the quality food and friendly service. Two must-try signature dishes include the taco perogy bowl and the breakfast poutine. Over the past year, homemade pizza (including sauce from scratch) has been added to the menu. There was a learning curve to mastering the authentic stone oven, but they have found their stride and serve up pies that outshine any chain pizza joint.

Like so many local businesses, Narduzzi's has not been immune to the impacts of the Covid19 pandemic; however, they innovated and adapted to make the best of the situation. The restaurant started offering delivery and take-out options and these have been well-received. The delivery area is officially only Porcupine and South Porcupine, but they have been known to accommodate calls from Schumacher. Adjustments have been made to the dining room area to accommodate physical distancing requirements. Perhaps the biggest change has been to the restaurant's hours of operation. They are now closed on Mondays and open from 11 AM to 7 PM Tuesdays through Fridays, from 7 AM to 7 PM on Saturdays and from 8 AM to 2 PM on Sundays.

One upside to the downtime experienced in the spring was an opportunity to do some renovations to the dining room including painting and new flooring. An interesting collection of old sports photos featuring athletes from Schumacher and South Porcupine continues to be proudly displayed. The restaurant can be rented for weddings, baby showers and other gatherings. With large gatherings curtailed by public health restrictions, the restaurant has hosted a number of small weddings over the past few months. For more info, call 705-235-2777 or 705-266-5618.

Things will be very different this season, but SDMH players started returning to the ice on October 3rd.






