In 2020 Christmas traditions around the world were impacted by Covid19. Here at home, children could not gather with their families at the McIntyre Ballroom to select a Christmas gift from Mr. Schumacher. Local seniors were not able to gather at the Lions' Den for their annual Christmas Dinner.

In this time of social distance protocols, mandatory face masks, and frequent handwashing, it would have been disappointing, but not surprising, if these events had been cancelled. Instead, the Schumacher Volunteer Fire Department and the Schumacher Lions Club rose to the occasion and delivered pandemic-friendly versions of these longstanding festivities. 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## CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

With senior citizens being the most vulnerable group with regard to the novel coronavirus, there was no doubt that their annual Christmas gathering would need to be cancelled. Instead, the Schumacher Lions Club opted to deliver a festive meal to Schumacher seniors on the evening of December 9, 2020. The meal, prepared by Marc and Judy Duciaume and their staff at the McIntyre Coffee Shop, consisted of roast turkey and all the trimmings. Schumacher Lions Club members and their families added festive touches to the meal including handmade Christmas cards and homemade holiday treats. Although the seniors missed the chance to socialize at the Lions Den, they were appreciative of the gesture nonetheless.

Mr. Schumacher started providing Christmas gifts to local children back in 1916. In his younger years, Mr. Schumacher himself would help shop for the gifts and come to town to present them to the school children. After his death, the FW Schumacher Foundation was created and money was set aside to ensure the gift giving tradition would continue. The task of purchasing, wrapping, and distributing the gifts was taken on by the Schumacher Volunteer Fire Department. For the past few decades, elementary school-aged children would gather at the McIntyre Ballroom to receive their gifts. Presents were separated into piles for boys and girls and further divided into age groups. Children could pick whatever gift they wanted

from their designated group. Pandemic restrictions meant that a new approach was needed for 2020.

Working with the four local school boards, lifelong Schumacher resident and volunteer firefighter Ryan Hartling compiled a list of the 160 or so children eligible for gifts this year. Contact was made with each family and each child was asked to submit a wish list of two or three gift ideas. With a budget of about \$40 per child, Ryan and his team used these wish lists to purchase a specific gift for each child. The gifts were wrapped and tagged with each child's name. Then, on the snowy afternoon of December 18, 2020, members of the SVFD loaded up their vehicles and set off to deliver the gifts to each child's house and spread holiday cheer throughout the community.

### **OLD FRIENDS CELEBRATE**

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

## SOS PAST MEETS PRESENT



### MCINTYRE HEADFRAME



In the late 1930s, Sudbury journalist Leslie McFarlane (who grew up in Haileybury and whom many will associate with the original Hardy Boys mysteries that he wrote under the pseudonym Franklin W Dixon) ventured to the bottom of the McIntyre Mine. His experience is recounted in the February 15, 1938 issue of Maclean's magazine. What follows is the beginning of that lengthy article.

"It's seven o'clock on a frosty winter night. Three hundred miners are waiting at the McIntyre shafthead to go on shift. Shovellers, scraper men, machine runners, timbermen, scalers, trammers, loaders, nippers, motormen, switchmen, helpers, chute loaders and just plain laborers. Men in hobnailed boots and overalls, each with a battery strapped to the back of his belt and an electric lamp clipped to his collar or the front of his hard hat. They wait in the draughty, lofty shafthouse, with its narrow-gauge railway tracks.

Steel beams tower to the roof of the headframe 175 feet above. Steel cables glimmer black and slick, descending from the upper shadows into the shaft beneath. Metal gates and grills guard the mouth of the huge rectangular pit that has been hewn and blasted out of solid rock, straight down, down, down - Number Eleven, main shaft and lifeline of the McIntyre, deepest mine in the Porcupine gold country."

From its completion in 1927 until operations ceased in the late 1990s, many men toiled in the tunnels under the imposing No. 11 shaft. For a brief time in the 1980s, local Grade 4 students, clad in oversized overalls and steel-toed rubber boots, had the opportunity to go underground at the McIntyre as part of their unit of study on mining. Nowadays, with the shaft flooded, the structure that overlooks Schumacher remains an iconic landmark and a

symbol of our heritage. It continues to be the most photographed headframe in the world.




Not long after purchasing the building, Tanya opened a new store, Thurston Stained Glass Shoppe & Studio, on the main floor. She loves her little shop and does her best to keep it well-stocked with glass, tools, and supplies. Other than online, there aren't any stained glass suppliers this far up

north. Having material readily available in the shop is appreciated by many stained glass crafters in the area. An added benefit for Tanya is that she gets to meet others who share her interest and passion for stained glass. She still marvels at the friendliness of the people she meets.

Prior to the pandemic, Tanya regularly offered daytime and evening stained glass classes. They were well-received by participants and were a lot of fun for Tanya as well. Since Covid restrictions have come into effect, classes have been put on hold. Although things have been quiet, Tanya is patiently waiting for sunnier days.
