The Readings for The Second Sunday of Lent

Reading 1 - Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18

God put Abraham to the test. He called to him, "Abraham!" "Here I am!" he replied. Then God said: "Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a holocaust on a height that I will point out to you."

When they came to the place of which God had told him, Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood on it. Then he reached out and took the knife to slaughter his son. But the LORD's messenger called to him from heaven, "Abraham, Abraham!" "Here I am!" he answered. "Do not lay your hand on the boy," said the messenger. "Do not do the least thing to him. I know now how devoted you are to God, since you did not withhold from me your own beloved son." As Abraham looked about, he spied a ram caught by its horns in the thicket. So he went and took the ram and offered it up as a holocaust in place of his son.

Again the LORD's messenger called to Abraham from heaven and said: "I swear by myself, declares the LORD, that because you acted as you did in not withholding from me your beloved son, I will bless you abundantly and make your descendants as countless as the stars of the sky and the sands of the seashore; your descendants shall take possession of the gates of their enemies, and in your descendants all the nations of the earth shall find blessing—

all this because you obeyed my command."

Brothers and sisters:

If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him?

Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us, who will condemn? Christ Jesus it is who died—or, rather, was raised—who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us.

Gospel - Mark 9:2-10

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves.

And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them.

Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus.

Then Peter said to Jesus in reply,

"Rabbi, it is good that we are here!

Let us make three tents:

one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified. Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice,

"This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them.

As they were coming down from the mountain, he charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone, except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead. So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what rising from the dead meant.

Prayer to St. Michael

May God rebuke him we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly host, by the power of God, cast into hell Satan and all the evil spirits who prowl about the world seeking the ruin of souls. From Fr. Mike's Desk

How strong is your faith in God? Have you ever asked yourself that question or had someone ask it of you? Perhaps you have asked others this question, and how did they answer it, how would you answer it? This season of Lent gives us a perfect opportunity to contemplate this question, and now we are given a full forty days to come up with an answer. Actually, we have a lifetime to come up with an answer, as some of us, if not most of us, will need that long. But Lent allows us the time to focus on these and other questions. Today these questions are being asked in our Old Testament and Gospel Readings for this Second Sunday of Lent.

The reading from Genesis tells of how God put Abraham to the test. God tells Abraham, "'Take you son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go up to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a holocaust...'" Scripture Scholars and Tradition tell us that God asked Abraham to sacrifice his son to test his true faith and his love of God. They believe that God wanted to see if Abraham loved Him more than Isaac. This could be true, but remember God prohibited the Hebrews from offering human sacrifice, as the pagans who surrounded them carried out. So why does God ask such a thing? If it is to test Abraham's faith and love, God has no need to see this, because He knows our hearts and thoughts better than we know them ourselves. So, He must want Abraham to see how much he loves God and how strong his faith truly is, so he can carry out all God has called him to accomplish. Abraham may have doubted his faith which explains why God decides to put him to the test at such an advanced age. This is sometimes why God puts us to the test, not trap us, but to remind us how much we must grow in our relationship with Him. Thus, Abraham, in this test, sees the true strength of his faith and love of God and he acknowledges that whatever God asks of him will result in something good, even if we do not understand it now. Abraham's faithfulness becomes an example for all to follow so that he can rightly be called our Father in Faith.

Abraham's example can serve the Apostles in today's Gospel when they are put to the test. Peter, James, and John are given the great gift of joining Jesus in His personal prayer; they are given this invitation because of what happened six days earlier. Jesus asked the Apostles, who do people say that I am, and after they answer and He

confirms that He is the Messiah, He tells them that He will go to Jerusalem, be betrayed and would suffer and die on the Cross. Jesus also told them that three days later He would rise from the dead. but that part the Apostles did not seem to hear. At this point their faith in Jesus was put to the test, so to help them regain their faith, Jesus brings them up to the mountain to pray. As we are told, while He was praying His appearance changed and he became as white as light. As Jesus continued in His prayer, Moses and Elijah appeared one on His left and the other on His right, and they were conversing with Jesus. Peter was so caught up in this wonderful event, that he wanted it to last forever, so it appears that his faith in Jesus was not as weak as he may have thought. And when it seemed that nothing more could happen on this day, the voice of God the Father tells them once again who Jesus is, "'This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him!"

Abraham needed to see that his faith was greater than he realized, and the Apostles needed to see that they could indeed have true faith in Jesus, and they were given this glimpse of the Resurrection so that when the events of Holy Thursday and Good Friday occurred, they would believe on Easter Sunday when they were told by Mary Magdalene that she saw the risen Lord. They were given this boost of faith so that like Abraham they could be examples of faith and trust for all who follow including you and me.

These readings are presented to us today to help us when we seem to lose faith, and they are present to encourage us on our Lenten Journey toward Easter. Let us use them well.

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 49 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

Wednesday, we entered the holy season of Lent. While much was different from past years, much was also the same. What was different is we had to wear masks, observe social distancing, and we could not impose ashes on peoples' foreheads. So, we improvised and packed the ashes in little plastic bags, and we distributed them to everyone who came. While this was not our usual procedure, and many regretted that we had to do it this way, they were also happy that they could at least receive the blessed ashes. As I said to many, this is better than nothing! What was the same, was the people who came to Mass or to the 7AM prayer service, to receive ashes, also came to begin this holy season with a focus on Jesus in their lives.

This forty-day season is really a very special and blessed time for us. Many people look at Lent as being the worst time of the year because we may have to give something up. Many think it as a solemn and sad time, and while it may be solemn, it does not have to be sad. It should be solemn because we have asked (may be even forced) to take a good look at our lives and see where we are not doing so well. We must look in the spiritual mirror and view all our imperfections. This is like looking in the bathroom mirror when you first get out of bed (not always a pleasant sight, at least not for me). For the most part we do not enjoy looking at our imperfections as we make our spiritual journey. Yet, if we are to improve, we must go beyond looking and try to change. Lent gives us the time to do this. Lent gives us the space we need to come closer to God. This is what is needed for each of us. We need to grow closer to God, because we are not able to change our imperfections without God. God knows us better than we know ourselves and is always there to guide us on the right path. At times it may seem we are walking that path by ourselves, but nothing could be further from the truth. Even in the world we are living in, God is with us and walking the path with us, sometimes carrying us. But then why can we not feel it? Well again it is due to our imperfections. Are things in the world perfect? Obviously not, but are you perfect, am I perfect, obviously not! So, use this time wisely, do not refuse to look at that mirror because it may be painful. If we refuse, we will always remain in the dark, and that is not compatible with our lives with Jesus who is the light. Turn to the light, let God be God and allow God into your dark places and change them to places of light, peace, and love. There is indeed great light even in this time of COVID 19 darkness.

During this time, try to get to Mass more often, take time to pray more, maybe say the Rosary and invoke the intercession of the Blessed Mother. On Friday evenings come to the Church at 7PM for Stations of the Cross and Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. On Thursday evenings we have the new St. Joseph Prayer Group for Men which will gather to pray the Rosary and other prayers. This group is hoped to meet every Thursday evening (weather permitting), and yes women are invited too. Make the most of this Lent.

Message of His Holiness Pope Francis for Lent 2021

In our Lenten journey towards Easter, let us remember the One who "humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross" (Phil 2:8). During this season of conversion, let us renew our **faith**, draw from the "living water" of **hope**, and receive with open hearts the **love** of God, who makes us brothers and sisters in Christ. At the Easter vigil, we will renew our baptismal promises and experience rebirth as new men and women by the working of the Holy Spirit. This Lenten journey, like the entire pilgrimage of the Christian life, is even now illumined by the light of the resurrection, which inspires the thoughts, attitudes and decisions of the followers of Christ.

Fasting, prayer and almsgiving, as preached by Jesus (cf. Mt 6:1-18), enable and express our conversion. The path of poverty and self-denial (fasting), concern and loving care for the poor (almsgiving), and childlike dialogue with the Father (prayer) make it possible for us to live lives of sincere faith, living hope and effective charity.

1. Faith calls us to accept the truth and testify to it before God and all our brothers and sisters.

In this Lenten season, accepting and living the truth revealed in Christ means, first of all, opening our hearts to God's word, which the Church passes on from generation to generation. This truth is not an abstract concept reserved for a chosen intelligent few. Instead, it is a message that all of us can receive and understand thanks to the wisdom of a heart open to the grandeur of God, who loves us even before we are aware of it. Christ himself is this truth. By taking on our humanity, even to its very limits, he has made himself the way – demanding, yet open to all – that leads to the fullness of life.

Fasting, experienced as a form of self-denial, helps those who undertake it in simplicity of heart to rediscover God's gift and to recognize that, created in his image and likeness, we find our fulfilment in him. In embracing the experience of poverty, those who fast make themselves poor with the poor and accumulate the treasure of a love both received and shared. In this way, fasting helps us to love God and our neighbor, inasmuch as love, as Saint Thomas Aquinas teaches, is a movement outwards that focuses our attention on others and considers them as one with ourselves.

2. **Hope** as "living water" enabling us to continue our journey.

The Samaritan woman at the well, whom Jesus asks for a drink, does not understand what he means when he says that he can offer her "living water" (Jn 4:10). Naturally, she thinks that he is referring to material water, but Jesus is speaking of the Holy Spirit whom he will give in abundance through the paschal mystery, bestowing a hope that does not disappoint. Jesus had already spoken of this hope when, in telling of his passion and death, he said that he would "be raised on the third day" (Mt 20:19). Jesus was speaking of the future opened up by the Father's mercy. Hoping with him and because of him means believing that history does not end with our mistakes, our violence and injustice, or the sin that crucifies Love. It means receiving from his open heart the Father's forgiveness.

3. **Love**, following in the footsteps of Christ, in concern and compassion for all, is the highest expression of our faith and hope.

Love rejoices in seeing others grow. Hence it suffers when others are anguished, lonely, sick, homeless, despised or in need. Love is a leap of the heart; it brings us out of ourselves and creates bonds of sharing and communion. "Social love' makes it possible to advance towards a civilization of love, to which all of us can feel called. With its impulse to universality, love is capable of building a new world. No mere sentiment, it is the best means of discovering effective paths of development for everyone".

Love is a gift that gives meaning to our lives. It enables us to view those in need as members of our own family, as friends, brothers or sisters. A small amount, if given with love, never ends, but becomes a source of life and happiness. Such was the case with the jar of meal and jug of oil of the widow of Zarephath, who offered a cake of bread to the prophet Elijah (cf. 1 Kings 17:7-16); it was also the case with the loaves blessed, broken and given by Jesus to the disciples to distribute to the crowd (cf. Mk 6:30-44). Such is the case too with our almsgiving, whether small or large, when offered with joy and simplicity.

Dear brothers and sisters, every moment of our lives is a time for believing, hoping and loving. The call to experience Lent as a journey of conversion, prayer and sharing of our goods, helps us – as communities and as individuals – to revive the faith that comes from the living Christ, the hope inspired by the breath of the Holy Spirit and the love flowing from the merciful heart of the Father.
