From Fr. Mike's Desk

"The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit."

This is Jesus' answer to Andrew and Philip when they tell Him some Greek visitors wanted to meet Him. What a strange answer Our Lord gives to the two Apostles. Most of us would have said, "ok, bring them over". Yet Jesus uses this reference to a grain of wheat! What does it mean, why does He offer this answer? John wants us to see, in his gospel, that Jesus has come into the world for all people, not just the Chosen People. In a way, the Greek visitors represent the gentile nations of the world. So, now Jesus can and will be glorified by the Father, for His mission is coming to its completion. However, Jesus' glorification is not what the world thinks it would be. Jesus is glorified by the Father in the greatest act of love the world has ever seen, the Crucifixion! He is the grain of wheat that must fall to the ground and die. This is true for every seed, because if a seed remains a seed, it cannot produce a new plant. This is true for every plant from a weed to the Great Red Woods of California. So, when the seed dies to its seed hood, it comes alive as many strands of wheat. These in turn can feed many people and sustain life.


When Jesus dies on the Cross, He dies to this life, but this is not the end of His relationship with us. His death brings true glory to God the Father because through His death all humanity is saved from spiritual death, sin, and darkness. His, and our new life, are manifested in the Resurrection, which we will celebrate in two weeks' time. For Saint John, Jesus' death and resurrection are joined as the Great Glorification of God the Father through His Son. As we continue with the Gospel, Jesus says, "I am troubled now. Yet what should I say, Father save me from this hour? But it was for this purpose that I came to this hour. Father, glorify Your name. Then a voice came from heaven, I have glorified it and will glorify it again." How will the Father glorify Jesus' name again after He rises from the dead? The Father will do this through each of us. We who believe, who died and rose with Him in the waters of Baptism, we will glorify the name of Jesus. Each of us must proclaim and live out the Good News. We must show the world that Jesus does indeed

make a difference in our lives. We must change the world, and not allow the world to change us, which seems to be happening more and more. We, like Jesus, must die to this world so we can grow into the next. We, like Jesus, must seek to glorify God by offering our lives.

Lent is almost over, but we still have time to use this great season to change the areas in our lives where we have not died to this world. Next weekend is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. Please check the bulletin for a schedule of events for this Holy Week. Remember, we will be hearing Confessions on Monday of Holy Week from 3PM to 9PM. On Thursday, Friday, and Saturday mornings we will have Morning Prayer at 9 AM, since we are not allowed to have any other Mass except the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday night, The Passion of the Lord on Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night. Let us use this last full week of Lent wisely and make the most out of Holy Week.



Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 52 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to the Fourth Sunday of Lent, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

This coming Wednesday, March 17th we celebrate with the whole Church around the world the great feast of Saint Patrick of Ireland. Not only is he the patron Saint of Ireland, but as I mentioned a few weeks ago he is the patron saint of Nigeria, locally the Archdiocese of New York, and several parishes in our own diocese.

While we are not certain about the day and year that he was born, we do know that it was in Great Britain. According to the autobiographical confessor of Patrick, he was about 16 when he was captured by Irish Pirates and sold into slavery. During his enslavement, he was charged with looking after animals and lived there for a period of six years before he escaped and returned home. After his return, he felt that he was being called to return to the people who held him captive. It was during his captivity that his Christian Faith came alive to him. Before he was merely a Christian in name, even though his father was a Deacon, and his grandfather was a Priest. But enduring his slavery, he sought comfort and strength in Jesus. He also fell in love with the simple people of Ireland who he befriended. As so, he was called to return. Not knowing what he was to do, he also realized that he was called to the priesthood, so he went to mainland Europe to study, he was ordained, and under the guidance of the Holy Spirit he was sent to Ireland to preach the Gospel. He returned, and while the date of his return is not totally clear, we do know that when he arrived, he faced opposition. Yet, as time went on and by the grace and power of God, he made converts and the faith began to grow.

March 17th is believed to be the date of his death and he is said to be buried at Down Cathedral in Downpatrick, and he is alongside St. Brigid, and St. Columba. St. Patrick is also honored with a feast day in the Episcopal Church (USA) and with a commemoration in the Evangelical Lutheran Church. St. Patrick is also venerated in the Orthodox Church, as he is considered a pre-Schism Saint. One of the legends about Saint Patrick is that he forced the snakes out of Ireland. While this is probably not true, I do not think we would be in the wrong, if we asked this great saint to banish COVID19 from here and the whole world.

Pope Francis on Safeguarding God's Presence

At the General Audience on March 17th, the Holy Father focused in particular on the role of the Holy Spirit. "The first gift of every Christian existence is the Holy Spirit," he said. The Holy Spirit opens our hearts to Christ, and allows us to invoke God as "Abba," that is, "Father." Citing the Catechism of the Catholic Church, Pope Francis noted that it is the Holy Spirit, "by His prevenient grace," that draws us to pray to Jesus. At the same time, the Church reminds us that we must pray to the Holy Spirit as well, encouraging us to address our prayer to Him "every day, especially at the beginning and end of every important action." This, said Pope Francis, "is the experience of so many who pray, men and women whom the Holy Spirit has formed according to the 'measure' of Christ, in mercy, service, prayer." It is the experience not only of monks and hermits, but of ordinary people who "have woven a long history of dialogue with God." Seeking God, the Pope said, "they safeguard His presence" – in the Gospel, in the Eucharist, and in the faces of those in need – "like a secret flame." Pope Francis said that keeping this flame of God's presence alive is "the first task of Christians," a task symbolized by the lighted lamps that burn night and day before the Eucharist present in the tabernacles of Catholic churches. Again quoting the Catechism, Pope Francis said the Holy Spirit is the "interior Master of Christian prayer... the artisan of the living tradition of prayer." It is the Spirit Who inspires "the many paths of prayer," which are as unique and varied as the individual people who pray.

Lenten Prayer Loving and gracious God, I have given gold, but there is only so much gold. I have given blood, but I have only so much blood to give. I have given my time, but days have only so many hours. I have given my strength, but even that has its limits. So I give my love. Because love is gold, and love is blood, and love is time, and love is strength. But love is also so much more. Because love is God, and God is love, and only you, God, have no limits. Amen



We are celebrating Harvest Houses 35th Birthday!

Holiday and birthday celebrations with family (via Zoom or our front window) became a "happening" for everyone. We managed together to successfully plan our Easter dinner—now that was a challengel

During the early days and months, we frequently heard from or called Senior friends whom we knew lived alone, to check on them. These calls saddened our hearts: "I am so lonely.". "I am frightened.". "What if I get dicid" However, as our residents adjusted to their 'new normal, we heard the following comments: "We are not afraid.". "We are together." And most importantly. "We find safe and secure."






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The 2021 Lucky Leprechaun / Triple Century was a Great Success!

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
