Fourth Sunday of Easter

Reading 1 - Acts 13:14, 43-52

Paul and Barnabas continued on from Perga and reached Antioch in Pisidia. On the sabbath they entered the synagogue and took their seats. Many Jews and worshipers who were converts to Judaism followed Paul and Barnabas, who spoke to them and urged them to remain faithful to the grace of God.

On the following sabbath almost the whole city gathered to hear the word of the Lord. When the Jews saw the crowds, they were filled with jealousy and with violent abuse contradicted what Paul said. Both Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly and said, "It was necessary that the word of God be spoken to you first, but since you reject it and condemn yourselves as unworthy of eternal life, we now turn to the Gentiles. For so the Lord has commanded us, I have made you a light to the Gentiles, that you may be an instrument of salvation to the ends of the earth."

The Gentiles were delighted when they heard this and glorified the word of the Lord. All who were destined for eternal life came to believe, and the word of the Lord continued to spread through the whole region. The Jews, however, incited the women of prominence who were worshipers and the leading men of the city, stirred up a persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and expelled them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in protest against them, and went to Iconium. The disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

Reading 2 - Revelation 7:9, 14b-17

I, John, had a vision of a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation, race, people, and tongue. They stood before the throne and before the Lamb, wearing white robes and holding palm branches in their hands.

Then one of the elders said to me, "These are the ones who have survived the time of great distress; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

"For this reason they stand before God's throne and worship him day and night in his temple.

The one who sits on the throne will shelter them.

They will not hunger or thirst anymore, nor will the sun or any heat strike them.

For the Lamb who is in the center of the throne will shepherd them and lead them to springs of life-giving water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."

Gospel - John 21:1-19

From Fr. Mike's Desk

Our reading from the Acts of the Apostles tells us of Paul and Barnabas' arrival in Antioch in Pisidia. It tells how they first went to the synagogue to preach, for Paul always believed that in every city where there were Jews, he would preach the Gospel to them first. What we do not see in today's passage is what Paul preached about, but you can see it in Chapter 13 of Acts. Scholars tell us that this is one of Paul's greatest sermons on salvation history. He connected Jesus to the House of David and told them how He is indeed the one who fulfills all the promises God made to David, and to the promises God made to all the people through the prophets. Paul, even includes John the Baptist and how Jesus was handed over to Pilate out of jealousy. It appears that those who consisted of Jews, new Jewish converts, and gentiles were looking for something new in their lives and they were pleased with Paul. They were so pleased that they invited him back to speak at the next Sabbath. But the scholars tell us that something happened between the two Sabbaths and Luke tells us it was jealousy. "When the Jews saw the crowds, they were filled with jealousy and with violent abuse contradicted what Paul said." The leaders were upset that Paul attracted so great a following in such a brief time, or after thinking about what he said about Jesus, they could no longer believe him. Either way they were no longer receptive and ordered Paul and Barnabas to leave, and even started a persecution against them so that they had to leave the city.

Notice what Paul said in reply to their jealousy, "It was necessary that the word of God be spoken to you first, but since you reject it and condemn yourselves as unworthy of eternal life, we now turn to the Gentiles..." The Gentiles were delighted because they understood that the word of God and the Good News was now coming to them with all the stops pulled out. We must also remember that some of the Jews who heard Paul also became followers of Jesus, but we are led to understand not in the same numbers as the Gentiles. Those who followed Paul, and became Christians heard more than the voice of the Apostle, they heard the voice of the Holy Spirit, who conveyed to them the voice of Jesus, and thus they too became His sheep.

This is a wonderful example of what Jesus means, in today's Gospel, on this Good Shepherd Sunday. As Jesus said, *"My sheep hear my voice;*

I know them, and they follow me." The people of Antioch heard Jesus call them and they followed Him, they learned how to attune their ears and their hearts to the sound of His voice and His alone. This same Good Shepherd is calling us to Himself, so do we have the ears to hear, do we have the will to focus on His voice and on the voice of the one who sent Him? How do we focus on His voice? We must spend time in prayer and meditation, read the Scriptures and receive Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, and we should also read the Lives of the Saints as they can tell us how they heard the voice and followed it.

This Sunday is also a day we traditionally pray for vocations to the priesthood as we ask the Holy Spirit to call men to follow in the footsteps of the Good Shepherd and to serve as He served. Please pray for an increase of vocations to the priesthood and help to foster vocations by asking a person you think might have a vocation, if he ever considered it. Encourage the idea of the priesthood among your children or grandchildren, believe me it is a very fulfilling life, and it is one I highly recommend. Sometimes all we need is someone to suggest it. Keep in mind vocations is everybody's job not just the priests' job.



Brían Murphy Memoríal Fund

It was thirty years ago this past March 17th that our son Brian was diagnosed as suffering from a very unusual cancer, and so it was! In just six months Brian surrendered his life with us for an eternity of joy and happiness with Our Lord. It often seems as if it was yesterday that we, him parents, his brother Jim and Stacey said good-by, but that is the way it is supposed to be when you lose someone you love. Any parent who has suffered the loss of a child, regardless of the child's age, knows exactly of what I am speaking. The six months between learning of Brian's cancer and his death were filled with hope, pride, love, prayer, thanks, and grace.

Hope exists wherever there is life. When the doctors advised that we could take Brian home to prepare for his death there remained the hope of a miracle. A hope fueled by the reality that God intercedes in our lives and that all is possible with the Lord. We marveled and were so proud of the way Brian accepted the reality of his death, trading his wishes and dreams for the promise and belief of what was to come.

Our family was surrounded by a faith community composed of students and teachers from St. Edward. Walks were organized, student visits to the hospital were a regular occurrence, and Brian was welcomed in class between hospital stays. Our Jewish friends prayed with us and shared in Brian's memorial mass. Brian's journey to eternity became truly ecumenical, it was a circle of love sharing in a singular hope.

Our parish has always been blessed by the presence and prayers of the Sisters of Mercy and Saint Dominick, and so it was for us during Brian's illness. The power of their prayers, their words of encouragement, and love of these holy women exceeds any meaningful description. Sr. Margaret Ann Hartigan, the school principal and Fr. Ed Kealey were ever present in our home and at the hospital, they will forever be in our heart.

Brian's death was a tragedy and one that we share with every parent who has lost a child. We have just celebrated the Resurrection of our Lord, a reality that our deceased children share in a more intimate way than we could ever imagine. The Risen Christ which replaced the crucified Lord over our altar is dedicated to all the deceased children of our parish. It is the grace of God, flowing through our community that nurtures us through these impossible days.

Brian was a gifted student who loved St Edward's school. In his name a scholarship fund was established to assist students, who due to family financial circumstances would not be able to continue at St. Eds. Over the past 30 years families have benefited from Brian's Fund; however, during these challenging times, as we can all understand, the need has increased. The practice remains that those who benefited from the fund are not expected to repay the assistance they received, although some have for which we are grateful. If you are able to donate, a check can be written to the Brian Murphy Memorial Fund and left at the rectory or with our school Principal, Mr. Vincent Albrecht. Please keep the parents of all deceased children in your prayers and in thanksgiving we will be praying for your needs.
