The Readings for The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Reading 1 - Revelations 11:19a; 12:1-6a, 10ab

Reading 2 – 1 Corinthian 15:20-27

God's temple in heaven was opened, and the ark of his covenant could be seen in the temple.

A great sign appeared in the sky, a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars. She was with child and wailed aloud in pain as she labored to give birth. Then another sign appeared in the sky; it was a huge red dragon, with seven heads and ten horns, and on its heads were seven diadems. Its tail swept away a third of the stars in the sky and hurled them down to the earth. Then the dragon stood before the woman about to give birth, to devour her child when she gave birth. She gave birth to a son, a male child, destined to rule all the nations with an iron rod. Her child was caught up to God and his throne. The woman herself fled into the desert where she had a place prepared by God.

Brothers and sisters:

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through man, the resurrection of the dead came also through man. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the first fruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ; then comes the end, when he hands over the Kingdom to his God and Father, when he has destroyed every sovereignty and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death, for "he subjected everything under his feet."

Gospel – Luke 1:39-56

Mary set out and traveled to the hill country in haste to a town of Judah, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice and said, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

And Mary said:

"My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant.

- From this day all generations will call me blessed: the Almighty has done great things for me and holy is his Name.
 - He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation.
 - He has shown the strength of his arm, and has scattered the proud in their conceit.
 - He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, and has lifted up the lowly.
 - He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty.
 - He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he has remembered his promise of mercy, the promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children forever."

Mary remained with her about three months and then returned to her home.

From Fr. Mike's Desk

On November 1, 1950, his Holiness Venerable Pope Pius XII, after consulting with leading theologians and conducting a Sensus Fidelium (a consensus of the faithful), proclaimed the second infallible statement issued by the Holy Father. The statement regarded one of the aspects from the ancient tradition of the Church. What was always tradition was now being elevated to official teaching, and that is: "That at the end of her life here on Earth, the Blessed Virgin Mary was Assumed body and soul into Heaven." This means that she, like her Divine Son, took on at the end of this life, the Glorified Body. No decay of death touched her body, for it was through her body that Jesus, the Son of God, took on our humanity and was born into this world.

As mentioned above, this teaching was always a part of the ancient tradition, and even though it is not found written in the New Testament, it was known from the very early days of the Church. So, if this was the case, why was it necessary to make it an official teaching of the Church? The answer is revealed as we look at the year this was announced. It was five years after the end of World War II, which occurred only twenty years after World War I, and second war was followed by the Cold War and all the military conflicts that have followed from 1945 right up to today. There was then, and is now, a total disregard for human life, and a total disrespect for the human body. During the second war, civilian populations were killed, great cities on both sides were bombed out of existence. We witnessed the brutal treatment of prisoners of war, and the mass murder of people in concentration camps. The mass genocides that were carried out by Hitler, Stalin, Mussolini and Tojo. Likewise, there were new types of weapons and warfare which led to a weapon which could even destroy the world.

Pope Pius knew that our help could only come from heaven, and for each of us to refocus our lives to the holiness and respect of all human life and the human body. By stressing the Dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, he wished all Christians and the whole world to see the high destiny that is in store for all humanity when Christ, Our Lord comes in His full glory at the end of time! Our dear Mother's Assumption into heaven is indeed a great gift and privilege for her, but it is also a gift for us; first because as she has gone so will we, and second because she can continue her role in salvation history. How does she do that? Well think about how she has appeared in many different places throughout our history and how she has given us messages from her Son. She can do this because she has the Glorified Body, and again like Jesus at Easter she is not a ghost, nor a figment of the imagination. No, she is truly present and can talk to us. And, of course, she constantly intercedes for us as she is the Queen of Heaven and Earth.

This weekend, speaking at all the Masses, is *Father Bernard Olszewski who represents Cross Catholic Outreach*. This worthwhile group has been here before and we have always been very generous to them. He WILL NOT be taking up a second collection but will be asking for our help.

We close with the prayer from today's Masses: All powerful and ever-living God, you raised the sinless Virgin Mary, mother of your Son, body, and soul to the glory of heaven. May we see heaven as our final goal and come to share her glory. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, God forever and ever. Amen

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY



Today, Sunday, August 15th, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This feast day recalls the spiritual and physical departure of the Blessed Mother from earth into heaven. Mary was assumed into heaven—body and soul—at the hour of her death.

Venerable Pope Pius XII confirmed this belief about the Virgin Mary as the teaching of the Church when he defined it formally as a dogma of Catholic faith in 1950. Invoking papal infallibility to proclaim, "that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." "Papal infallibility" means that the Pope cannot err or teach error when speaking on matters of faith and morals ex-cathedra, or "from the chair" of the Apostle St. Peter—that is, in his role as the supreme teacher of the Church.

Although not explicitly stated in Scripture, Catholic tradition identifies Mary's bodily assumption with the "woman clothed with the sun," described in Revelation 12:1. The verse speaks of a woman's appearance "a great sign" which "appeared in heaven," indicating that she is the mother of the Jewish Messiah and has "the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars." Accordingly, Catholic iconography of the Western tradition often depicts the Virgin Mary's assumption into heaven in this manner.

The Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary is one of the six Holy Days of Obligation. To honor this special day spend time on your own with the daily readings, or offer a Rosary. Understandably the difficulty over the past year of attending liturgies may cause some to feel disconnected from the Church and her traditions. However, with prayer and even a little creativity, it is possible to use this time to grow even stronger in your faith.

We can turn to the Blessed Mother for comfort, encouragement, and intercessory prayer. Her role in the Church is always to lead us to her Son, Jesus Christ. As Pope Saint John Paul II said so well in his homily for this Solemnity in 1999, "Taken up into heaven, Mary shows us the way to God, the way to heaven, the way to life. She shows it to her children baptized in Christ and to all people of good will. She opens this way especially to the little ones and to the poor, those who are dear to divine mercy. The Queen of the world reveals to individuals and to nations the power of the love of God whose plan upsets that of the proud, pulls down the mighty from their thrones and exalts the humble, fills the hungry with good things and sends the rich empty away" (cf. Lk 1:51-53).



We've missed all of you and look forward to having everyone back once again.




St. Francis Hospital - COVID-19 Walk-In Clinic
