Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading 1 - Exodus 32:7-11, 13-14

The LORD said to Moses, "Go down at once to your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt, for they have become depraved. They have soon turned aside from the way I pointed out to them, making for themselves a molten calf and worshiping it, sacrificing to it and crying out, 'This is your God, O Israel, who brought you out of the land of Egypt!' "I see how stiff-necked this people is, " continued the LORD to Moses. Let me alone, then, that my wrath may blaze up against them to consume them. Then I will make of you a great nation."

But Moses implored the LORD, his God, saying, "Why, O LORD, should your wrath blaze up against your own people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with such great power and with so strong a hand? Remember your servants Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, and how you swore to them by your own self, saying, 'I will make your descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky; and all this land that I promised, I will give your descendants as their perpetual heritage." So the LORD relented in the punishment he had threatened to inflict on his people.

Reading 2—1 Timothy 1:12-17

Beloved:

I am grateful to him who has strengthened me, Christ Jesus our Lord, because he considered me trustworthy in appointing me to the ministry. I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and arrogant, but I have been mercifully treated because I acted out of ignorance in my unbelief. Indeed, the grace of our Lord has been abundant, along with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. This saying is trustworthy and deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners. Of these I am the foremost. But for that reason I was mercifully treated, so that in me, as the foremost, Christ Jesus might display all his patience as an example for those who would come to believe in him for everlasting life. To the king of ages, incorruptible, invisible, the only God, honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

Gospel — Luke 15:1-32

Tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to Jesus, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." So to them he addressed this parable. "What man among you having a hundred sheep and losing one of them would not leave the ninety-nine in the desert and go after the lost one until he finds it? And when he does find it, he sets it on

his shoulders with great joy and, upon his arrival home, he calls together his friends and neighbors and says to them, 'Rejoice with me because I have found my lost sheep.' I tell you, in just the same way there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who have no need of repentance. "Or what woman having ten coins and losing one would not light a lamp and sweep the house, searching carefully until she finds it? And when she does find it, she calls together her friends and neighbors and says to them, 'Rejoice with me because I have found the coin that I lost.' In just the same way, I tell you, there will be rejoicing among the angels of God over one sinner who repents." Then he said, "A man had two sons, and the younger son said to his father, 'Father give me the share of your estate that should come to me.' So the father divided the property between them. After a few days, the younger son collected all his belongings and set off to a distant country where he squandered his inheritance on a life of dissipation. When he had freely spent everything, a severe famine struck that country, and he found himself in dire need. So he hired himself out to one of the local citizens who sent him to his farm to tend the swine. And he longed to eat his fill of the pods on which the swine fed, but nobody gave him any. Coming to his senses he thought, 'How many of my father's hired workers have more than enough food to eat, but here am I, dving from hunger. I shall get up and go to my father and I shall say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers." So he got up and went back to his father. While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him. His son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son.' But his father ordered his servants, 'Quickly bring the finest robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Take the fattened calf and slaughter it. Then let us celebrate with a feast, because this son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found.³ Then the celebration began. Now the older son had been out in the field and, on his way back, as he neared the house, he heard the sound of music and dancing. He called one of the servants and asked what this might mean. The servant said to him, 'Your brother has returned and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' He became angry, and when he refused to enter the house, his father came out and pleaded with him. He said to his father in reply, 'Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders; yet you never gave me even a young goat to feast on with my friends. But when your son returns, who swallowed up your property with prostitutes, for him you slaughter the fattened calf.' He said to him, 'My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."

Next Week's Gospel Question

Next week's Gospel speaks about trustworthiness in our dealings with God and man, and that God should come first. So, we need to ask ourselves, "Do we put our attention on the things of this world and just give lip-service to God, or is God really in our lives?

From Fr. Mike's Desk

"Jesus Christ is the face of the Father's mercy. These words might well sum up the mystery of the Christian Faith. Mercy has become living and visible in Jesus of Nazareth, reaching its culmination in him...Jesus of Nazareth, by his works, his actions, and his entire person reveals the mercy of God... Our salvation depends on it. Mercy... the word reveals the very mystery of the Most Holy Trinity. Mercy, the ultimate and supreme act by which God come to meet us... Mercy the bridge that connects God and man, opening our hearts to the hope of being loved forever, despite our sinfulness."

With these words Pope Francis declared the Year of Mercy a few years ago. God's mercy, and our response to it, is the major theme of our readings for this weekend.

St. Paul in his 1st Letter to Timothy, tells us how he acted out of ignorance in his unbelief when he persecuted the Church, but through the mercy of God he came to know the truth of whom Jesus is, and then went out to proclaim the Good News. Moses reminds God of His mercy when the Israelites turn from Him and make the golden calf, holding it up as their god. At first, we are told that He intends to destroy the people, but Moses convinces God to change His mind. While God does seem to reconsider, because of His great mercy, chances are, God wanted to see how Moses would respond to His call to destroy the people. Of course, Moses acted correctly when he reminded God of all He did for the people of the Exodus.

Now we come to the Gospel, and Jesus' lesson to the Pharisees on mercy. Jesus begins with the example of the lost sheep and the lost coin. He relates how happy the shepherd is when he finds his lost sheep and how happy the woman is when she finds the lost coin. The Pharisees understand the feelings and how God would feel this way about a lost person. But they still do not understand the fullness of God's mercy that Jesus is speaking about and why He always eats and associates with sinners and tax collectors. So, the Lord then offers the wonderful story of the Prodigal Son or the Loving Father. A story we are all familiar with. This story carries a most powerful message and shows us the full extent of God's mercy as the father forgives the son who hurt him. Certainly, the actions of the father are wonderful, and they show us the true love and forgiveness of God the Father, but there is one necessary element that we must have for God's mercy to be fully experienced. We must seek it out! The younger son who left and spent his inheritance had

to take the first step of coming back to his father. While he was not sure how he would be received, he still decided to return home. When we are seeking God's mercy and forgiveness, we must take the step of seeking God out, acknowledging our sins, and make a full intention to amend our lives, and give God our full trust; remember the message of Jesus the Divine Mercy, "Jesus I trust in you." The Pharisees and Scribes could not believe that sinners and tax collectors were worthy of God's forgiveness and mercy, and they were right, but neither were they and likewise neither are we. But Jesus tells us that God gives it to us anyway. We must remember this when someone hurts us or acts in a way we do not like. This is hard to do, but with God's help we can follow the actions of the loving father.

Twenty-one years ago today, our nation, our world, and our way of life was brutally attacked by terrorists who flew planes into the World Trade Center, The Pentagon, and a hillside in Pennsylvania (thanks to the people on the plane that prevented them from flying into the White House or the Capitol Building). Many of us lost loved ones or know people who did and, of course, many paid the ultimate price years later, because of the fact they were first responders or worked at the site, either as workers or volunteers. Also let us not forget those who later gave up their lives or where seriously wounded in the military actions that followed these attacks are still being conducted today. Let us never stop praying for peace, the peace that only God can give, and let us pray that the hearts of those who hate can be converted to hearts that love. Let them follow the example shown by the people who bear God's Love, Peace, Mercy, and Forgiveness in their hearts.

May God bless you always, and may God bless America!

Registration Info for Religious Education Classes for the 2022-2023 School Year



St. Edward's Religious Education is an 8 year religious education program. Public School Students are required to begin their religious studies in grade 1 and finish their formation classes in grade 8.

Preparation for the reception of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion takes place in grades 1 and 2. Students will receive their First Confession in March of grade 2 and then their First Communion in May of that year. Grades 3 through 6 are required continuation study years for students in their religious formation. Preparation for Confirmation occurs in grades 7 and 8. Students receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in the Fall of grade 9.

In person Religious Education Classes will begin the week of September 25th.



<u>Families whose children were already enrolled in Religious</u> <u>Education Classes last year</u> should have received a Registration Email on June 8th. The registration emails were sent out again a number of times over the summer. 
