### The Readings for the Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

### **Reading 1 - Deuteronomy 6:2-6**

#### Moses spoke to the people, saying:

"Fear the LORD, your God, and keep, throughout the days of your lives, all his statutes and commandments which I enjoin on you, and thus have long life. Hear then, Israel, and be careful to observe them, that you may grow and prosper the more, in keeping with the promise of the LORD, the God of your fathers, to give you a land flowing with milk and honey.

"Hear, O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD alone! Therefore, you shall love the LORD, your God, with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength. Take to heart these words which I enjoin on you today."

Brothers and sisters:


The levitical priests were many because they were prevented by death from remaining in office, but Jesus, because he remains forever, has a priesthood that does not pass away. Therefore, he is always able to save those who approach God through him, since he lives forever to make intercession for them.

It was fitting that we should have such a high priest: holy, innocent, undefiled, separated from sinners, higher than the heavens. He has no need, as did the high priests, to offer sacrifice day after day, first for his own sins and then for those of the people; he did that once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints men subject to weakness to be high priests, but the word of the oath, which was taken after the law, appoints a son, who has been made perfect forever.

### Gospel – Mark 12:28b-34

One of the scribes came to Jesus and asked him, "Which is the first of all the commandments?" Jesus replied, *'The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.* 

The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these." The scribe said to him, "Well said, teacher. You are right in saying, 'He is One and there is no other than he.' And 'to love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." And when Jesus saw that he answered with understanding, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." And no one dared to ask him any more questions.

### From Fr. Mike's Desk

Many times, we have seen in the Gospel accounts someone will approach Jesus with a question, or a moral situation. This was a common occurrence during Jesus' time because the question which was asked was to lead to debate. The debates could go on for a long time and may not reach a conclusion that either side liked or agreed with. However, sometimes the debate could help the other person see the logic and reason behind the teaching of the first party. When it came to a person like Jesus, who looked at the Law differently from others, and who had a new teaching, it was designed usually to trap Him, so that they could use His answer to denounce Him and declare that He certainly could not be the Messiah. As we have also seen, the person who tried to trap Jesus could not because He spoke with His own authority, the authority of the Son of God.

Today we see a scholar of the Law presenting Jesus with a very important question, "'Which is the first of all the commandments?" However, there is a difference with this scribe. He is not trying to trap Jesus or engage Him in debate for debate's sake. He truly wants to hear Jesus' answer as he hopes to learn from Jesus. Jesus' answer comes right from what we see stated on our first reading from Deuteronomy. Moses tells the people to follow all the statues and commandments given to them by God. He tells them, "Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone! Therefore, you shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart...soul...and with all your strength." So, Jesus' answer is that which we see above, but His answer does not stop there. Jesus adds a second commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no greater commandment than these." Our Lord has done what no one has done before. He has united love of God with love of neighbor. Jesus also has expanded the definition of neighbor. Before Jesus, a Jew's neighbor was simply another Jew. Therefore, one did not have to consider others, now Jesus has told them that everyone was their neighbor no matter where they come from.

Now we might think that the scribe would be upset with His answer, yet he is not. And he answers Jesus with, "Well said, teacher. You are right in saying, He is the One and there is no other than he. And to love him with all your heart...understanding...strength, and to love *your neighbor as yourself is worth more than all* burnt offerings and sacrifices." This person got it! He knew what truly is important in God's eyes. Now, in no way was Jesus, or the scribe putting down worship. No, they were placing worship in its proper place. Meaning, that worship is indeed important, but if you focus only on worship and ignore the needs of others, we will be failing in our call to be true disciples. If all that matters to me is that I offer up my prayers and sacrifices, and I think nothing about my neighbor, then my prayers and sacrifices are not as effective. We are to bring our worship, our prayers, and our sacrifices into every action of our lives. Remember, the Eucharist is given to us by God so that we can be empowered to make God present. Christ gives us His very Body and Blood, Humanity and Divinity, so we can always stay close to Him, so He can stay close to us. When we put all ourselves into our pravers and worship and expand that to outside the Church or home, we are truly loving God above all things and our neighbor too. This will allow us to hear Our Lord telling us, "You are not far from the kingdom of God "

On Monday November 1<sup>st</sup>, we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints. Since this day is a Monday, it is not a Day of Obligation, but we will celebrate Masses at 9 AM and 12:10 PM.

### Why do I have to return to Sunday Mass?

This is a question that is heard a lot since the bishop lifted restrictions about Mass attendance and re-instituted Sunday as a Holy Day of Obligation. Personally, I have always disliked that term... "holy day of obligation." For believers, for those who truly believe in God and His True Presence in the Eucharist, why would we want to think coming together, as a Catholic family, an obligation?

The dictionary defines "obligation," as "an act or course of action to which a person is morally or legally bound... a duty." Going a little further, synonyms for obligation include, "burden, charge, commitment, duty and incumbency."

For those of you who have adult children living outside your home... how would you feel if that was in the minds of your children... that they feel obligated to visit you, it's a burden, rather than they want to see you because they love you?

Some may think, "I watch the Mass on TV every week... it was fine during the pandemic lockdown, and it should be fine now." That's reasonable to think... but it's shortsighted. Today, there are many means of communicating, telephone, texts, facetime, messaging... and so many more; and it's great to be able to stay in touch, but does it even remotely take the place of being with a loved one in person? Of course not, not even close! Coming together in our Father's house as a faith family to pray, to share and to receive Our Lord in the Eucharist is a gift beyond any other and it is a gift we also give each other.

Sadly, statistics tell us, that only 25% of all baptized Catholics regularly attend Sunday Mass. Since restrictions have been lifted, only about 25% of the 25% have returned to Sunday Mass.... Certainly, for those who have health concerns and conditions, staying away for the time being is the better choice and we pray with you, but for those who have just fallen out of practice... it's time.

Because you love them, and not only care for their physical well-being but their spiritual well-being too, please encourage your friends and family to return, not because it is an obligation but to return in thanksgiving for all the graces, we all have received, and to be with our loving God together as family.

It's time to come home... let them know, we've all been waiting for them, and we can't wait to see them again!
