Mary a Woman of Prayer

Pope Francis began his General Audience this past Wednesday by saying "Today we meet the Virgin Mary as the prayerful woman." He recalled her in her youth, "the young girl of Nazareth wrapped in silence, in dialogue with God, who would soon entrust her with a mission." Although she was already full of grace and immaculate from the moment she was conceived, the Pope said, she knew nothing "of her surprising and extraordinary vocation and the stormy sea she will have to cross." "One thing is certain," he said. "Mary belongs to a great host of the humble of heart whom the official historians never include in their books, but whom God used to prepare for the coming of His Son."

For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the first fruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ; then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to his God and Father, when he has destroyed every sovereignty and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death. When everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to the one who subjected everything to him, so that God may be all in all.

Gospel – Matthew 25:31-46

Jesus said to his disciples:

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit upon his glorious throne, and all the nations will be assembled before him. And he will separate them one from another, as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will place the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. Then the king will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?' And the king will say to them in reply. 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me.' Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you accursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, a stranger and you gave me no welcome, naked and you gave me no clothing, ill and in prison, and you did not care for me.' Then they will answer and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison, and not minister to your needs?' He will answer them, 'Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.' And these will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

From Fr. Mike's Desk

Today is the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year, as we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King of the Universe. As you know, next weekend when we gather, it will be the First Sunday of Advent and the start of another Liturgical Year. For the Church, 2020 will be over and 2021 will begin. So Happy New Year, and I am sure that most of us are extremely happy that 2020 is coming to an end. This year has certainly proven to be a year of great challenges, and so many changes have been placed in our lives. Some of us have experienced a great deal of sorrow, we have lost a loved one to COVID19 or because of it we were not allowed to visit loved ones in the hospital or nursing homes. Some of us struggled through the virus and have expressed how terrible it was, and some feared for their lives. Doctors, nurses, and other hospital workers, First Responders, and all who were part of the fight had their lives totally disrupted, and put their lives on the line, as so many got sick and many died trying to help others. Many of us experienced the feeling of being trapped in our homes as we could not leave, and teachers and parents had to navigate through virtual learning, which some liked and some did not. While it was hard to visit the sick, we offered prayers for them, we communicated with them, we fed the hungry as so many people came to the food pantry for assistance and continued to drop off food and necessivou ties. So many also made cash donations to the Pantry and St. Vincent De Paul Society so they could keep up the good work. I would say that so many of us did a good job of seeing Jesus in the faces of the brothers and sisters we helped. The task ahead is simple, keep on doing the good work

we have begun, and if by chance you were not able to participate in these good works, well let us start now as we all carry out the Corporal Works of Mercy.

Today's Gospel also reminds us that at the end of our lives, we will stand before God and we will discuss how we lived out our lives. None of us will be perfect (except our dear Blessed Mother) and most likely none of us will be so terrible. However, with that being said, we must still strive to do better each year, month and day. We must allow the Gospel to change and mold our lives The world provides us with many constantly. distractions and obstacles, and these are placed in our way to stop us from preparing the way of the Lord. We have the power and grace of the Holy Spirit, the prayers of all the angels and saints, and we have each other. As we enter Advent. we will truly be asked to prepare the way of the Lord.

Let us pray, Holy Father you anointed your Only Begotten Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, with the oil of gladness as eternal priest, and king of all creation, so that by offering Himself on the altar of the cross he might accomplish the mysteries of human redemption, and that He might present to you an eternal and universal kingdom, a kingdom of truth and life, of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice, love and peace. We thank you and ask your help to assist in building this kingdom. Amen

Fr. Mike's Letter for Week 35 of the Corona Virus Crisis

The following letter was posted last week, prior to The 33nd Sunday in Ordinary Time, on the St. Edward's website as well as on Flocknote.

At this writing, we still do not have a clear winner of the Presidential Election and some other offices which are outstanding. This of course, adds to our unrest, and it is another cause for fear and anxiety. In Jesus' Name do not let this happen to you or your loved ones. Remember it is Jesus who is totally in charge and it is His will that will prevail. If it is God's will that the person declared is not your choice, then hopefully your response will be prayer. Pray for our nation and the world, pray that whoever is declared elected will listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit.

We sometimes fail to realize the great power of prayer, but it cannot be just a few people praying, no all of us must pray. I know that at times we might think that our prayers do not change anything, and praying is a waste of time! But if you are listening to that voice, I can tell you that this is the voice of the devil, and not the voice of Jesus who tells us we are to take Heaven by storm with our prayers, which I have mentioned in this space several times. Even if the outcome is discouraging, we must not be discouraged, and we must not give into despair. That is what Judas did, as he failed to see the love that God had for him, and how quickly he would have been forgiven for betraying Jesus on that first Holy Thursday Night. Let us pray for our country, our world and ourselves. Let us pray for an end of the virus, and hope that the newly announce vaccine will really work and bring us some relief.

While it may seem early to do this, Christmas is just a few weeks away. While at this time we do not know what conditions and rules will prevail for Christmas, we must make plans based on what the conditions are now. So, we will be issuing a survey (which will be seen on Flock Notes, Our Parish Web Page and in the Bulletin) to simply inquire as to what Mass you plan to attend on Christmas Eve or Day. At present the Church's capacity is little over 200 people and we cannot exceed that. As a result, we will not be allowed to pack people in the back of the Church even if they are standing. To help this, we will also hold Mass in the Gym at the same time Mass will be in the Church. The Gym should allow us an additional 200 people. But this is if they are needed because we know some people will not come out because they are afraid, they will get sick, and we totally understand that. Please keep in mind that this is not a seat reservation, seating will be on a first come first served basis and please know that masks and social distancing rules are to be followed. This survey optimistically will help us plan. This year we will need everybody's patience and understanding. Thank you in advance for helping make this a true celebration of the Birth of Our Lord.

We close with a prayer for peace, the one we all know from St. Francis -

Lord, make me a channel of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me bring your love; where there is injury, your pardon Lord; and where there is doubt, true faith in you; where there is despair in life, let me bring hope; where there is darkness, only light; and where there is sadness, ever joy. O Master grant that I may never seek so much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love with all my soul. For it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, in giving of ourselves that we receive, and in dying that we are born into eternal life. Amen.



We Need Your Help

We have **good news** and **bab news**... The **good news** is that we are starting to see a slow but steady increase in the number of people who are coming back to Mass on Sundays. We are so happy to see you again and we look forward to having everyone back together as a faith community. Now the **bab news**... the Federal Communication Commission is phasing out the 600 MHz frequencies currently in use by many Church congregations including St. Edward's. What this means is that our current sound system will not be able to comply or function with the new required frequency. Our sound system, which has served us well until recently, is the same system originally installed when our church was built, and includes the Holy Family Room and Auditorium. It has become antiquated and has failed several times. Replace our sound system for the church, Holy Family room and Auditorium. Unfortunately, this does not come without a considerable cost. The best estimate we have received is approximately \$40,000. This could not have come at a worse time. Although we are blessed by your kind generosity, our weekly collections are lower than anticipated and as you know our fundraisers have been cancelled because of the pandemic.

So, we need your help! I am asking you to consider being a donor to help defray the cost of this system. I know times are tough for many and we are experiencing the need to tighten our belts as well, but the sound system is imperative for our liturgical services and school functions.
